School board approves new calendar for 20-21

At its meeting Monday night, the Pulaski County School Board voted to approve a new school calendar for the 2020-2021 school year.

The calendar, approved on a 4-1 vote, features a post-Labor Day opening, an extended school day and a May 27 last day of school.

Board members Dr. Paige Cash, Timmy Hurst, Bill Benson and Penny Golden voted for the new calendar, while Massie District representative Beckie Cox voted against.

The approved calendar represents a change for the school district from a traditional 180-day calendar to an hourly calendar.

The state allows school divisions to select either calendar, as long as the minimum requirements of 180 days or 990 hours are met. The calendar approved Monday night provides 1,076 instructional hours.

The first day of school next year will be September 8, 2020 and school will end May 27, 2021.

Pulaski County Middle principal leaving for Galax

The Patriot has learned that Adam Joyce, named last May as the first principal for the new Pulaski County Middle School, has resigned to take a new job in the Galax School System.

Joyce previously served as principal of Dublin Middle School for five years before taking over this school year as the principal of Pulaski Middle School.

The switch to PMS was made to provide Joyce with the opportunity to establish a working relationship with faculty and staff members from both schools prior to the opening of the combined middle school next fall.

During this school year Joyce has been in charge of leading the middle school consolidation effort by coordinating joint faculty meetings, planning collaborative middle school professional development sessions, building a master schedule for PCMS, and overseeing the eventual move from both current middle schools.

At Galax, Joyce will serve in the new position of Director of Instruction in that city's school system.

He will start his new position in the coming weeks.

To achieve that schedule, school days will be extended.

Elementary school days will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 3:15 p.m., while middle and high

school hours will run from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The teacher workday will be from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. with Thursdays ending at 5 p.m.

Citizens upset over transgender students' use of RHS bathrooms

A controversy has been simmering in Radford for the past month or so concerning transgender students' use of bathrooms at Radford High School. That controversy boiled over Monday night when several citizens approached the school board on the issue.

In February, The Patriot contacted Radford School Superintendent Robert Graham concerning a new policy the paper had been told was approved by the school board that allows students to use the bathroom of the gender they identify with.

Graham responded to the paper on Feb. 25 that the Radford

School Board had "not adopted and does not currently have a policy specific to transgender students' use of bathrooms."

Monday evening four individuals – Mike London, Kenny Alderman, Mick Turk and Kevin Hite – addressed the board on their concerns.

"The school board has stated in its goals to ensure the continued safety of all children and youth who attend Radford High School," said London. "Parents are a major part of the frontline safety of our children and need to be made aware of any changes that are made at the school that can impact the children's welfare."

London noted that, "to date transgender use of the bathrooms

has not been communicated to the parents. Parents are being informed through social media and word of mouth in addition to contacting the school board directly."

"This does not lend itself to a positive, proactive working relationship between the school board and parents, nor is it reflective of the school board's goal of maintaining safety of the children," London stated.

He said parents with concerns had learned "through emails with the school board" that policies specific to transgender students' use of bathrooms do not exist.

"However, transgender stu-

No charges planned in jail death of Radford student

DUBLIN, Va. (AP) — Police in Virginia say no charges will be filed in the death of an 18-year-old Radford University student who was found unresponsive in his cell at the New River Valley Regional Jail.

In a news release Tuesday, state police said they have completed their investigation into the death of Aris Eduardo Lobo-Perez, of Culpeper.

State police said that on the night of Sept. 11, 2019, Radford University police responded to a call at a campus facility concerning Lobo-Perez. Police took the college freshman into custody shortly before midnight on a public intoxication charge and brought him to the jail.

The next morning, jail personnel approached Lobo-Perez to offer him breakfast, which he declined, police said. About 30 minutes later, jail personnel found him unresponsive in his cell, state police said.

The state medical examiner's office said he died of opioid toxicity compounded by asthma, and ruled his death an accident. His mother rejected the finding.

"It was neglect," Dixiana Perez told the Washington Post in December. She said police, and then jail guards, "should have taken him to the hospital."

State police said no charges will be filed "in accordance with the findings" of the medical examiner and at the advisement of the City of Radford Commonwealth's Attorney and Pulaski County Commonwealth's Attorney.

Four seeking council seats in Radford; five running for city's school board

Four people have been certified to be candidates in Radford's City Council race, while five people are seeking seats on Radford's School Board.

Vice Mayor Dick Harshberger is the lone incumbent on City

Council seeking re-election. He is joined on the City Council ballot by Andrew Crane, Forrest Hite and Onassis Burress.

A second incumbent, Rob Gropman, announced recently he would not seek re-election.

Voters will elect two members to City Council.

In the School Board race, two incumbents — Joe Hester and Adam DeVries — chose not to seek re-election this time around.

Five people are vying for those two seats — Jenny Riffe, Chris Calfee, Justin Mosby, Jody Ray and Mary Knarr Smith.

dents are now being allowed to use the bathroom they identify with," London said.

"I was informed the schools will work individually with the students who identify as transgender and their parents to ascertain the type of accommodations appropriate for that student with respect to the facilities. Any other student who enters a bathroom or locker room designated for the opposite gender who does not identify as transgender will be subject to discipline," London said.

"I have two daughters in the Radford school system, and I am concerned that a boy, identifying as a transgender, will access the restroom or locker room — as has already been occurring here and in other schools. This raises potential safety issues, such as taking pictures of children in various stages of undress, sexual advances and possible assault.

"I was offered up a solution of my daughter using a uni-sex or single stall bathroom if she felt uncomfortable using the public restroom," London added.

"Why has this information not been publicly communicated to all the students since they are the ones impacted by this change," London asked the board.

London added that there are some restrooms in the school that are only locked at the bathroom stall, not the door.

"So, I still see this as a huge safety concern," he said.

Alderman, a former principal and board member in the Radford School System, expressed

concern over the fact no one knew of what he called "this procedure change."

"I talked to about 40 adults last week and nobody knew about this," Alderman stated. "It really surprises me that parents were not involved or given information about this procedure change. Then I went to talk to a class last week at the high school and before I got in there, I had an individual come to me — a child, female — who went to the girls bathroom. There was a young man in there. She came out tore all to pieces [emotionally].

"And what gets me is this — not even the children knew about it. Not even the children — the ones we're supposed to protect."

Alderman told the board there is no law in the state of Virginia about transgender bathroom use, and that there is only Title IX.

"We were very fortunate. We had an alumnus of Radford High School, Dr. Ruth Hammack Alexander. She was at the University of Florida and she helped implement what the true Title IX meant. At the time it was passed, girls and women were faced with difficulties and discrimination in pursuing an education. They basically were looking at sports. In 1972 President Nixon wrote it in as law. In May of 2016, we got that 'Dear Colleague' letter from President Obama basically telling us then anyone identifying what they have — they have the right to go to any bathroom they wanted to. Then in 2017 President Trump dismissed that. So, there is no law.

"What you're afraid of is getting sued. But you all need to understand I have two granddaughters and they can't speak for themselves, so I will speak for them. What would keep a citizen from coming in here and suing the Radford City School System? What's the difference," he asked.

"When Congress passed Title IX, no one thought that it meant gender identity. It didn't mean it then, and it does not mean it now," Alderman said.

He closed his comments by telling the school board, "Not informing us was wrong. Wrong!"

One speaker, Tina Tapp, an English teacher in Radford City Schools, said, "This is a very complicated issue for a lot of children to think about.

"I just want to say that I think the board, our administrators, try really hard to do what's best for children. It's a complicated issue that takes a lot of finesse to figure out what's best for everybody.

"So I just appreciate the fact that you guys (school board) are trying to think of everybody and trying to find a solution for all the children that go to our schools, because all of our children deserve dignity and safety and respect and love."

Va. lawmakers pass new budget amid downturn fears

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Virginia lawmakers approved a new state budget Thursday that includes heavy new spending on public education, social services and other areas, despite protests from some Republicans that the legislature should wait to see what impact the deepening coronavirus crisis will have on the state's economy.

Legislators approved a two-year state spending plan that

includes raises for teachers and state employees and funds for a one-year tuition freeze at public universities. The measure now heads to Democratic Gov. Ralph Northam, who can try to amend or veto parts of the budget.

The budget was supposed to be approved this weekend but lawmakers had to extend this year's legislative session a few days to get all of the work done. In that time, the spreading coronavirus

has panicked global financial markets and raised concerns about both the short-term and long-term health of the state's economy.

There's also been a cascade of cancellations and shutdowns around the globe and in Virginia, where several universities have suspended classes.

Republicans said lawmakers should take a few more days to reexamine their revenue assumptions and spending plans in the

budget.

"I was very comfortable with it when I left here on Sunday but the world has changed," said Republican Senate Minority Leader Tommy Norment.

But the budget easily passed, and Democrats said their recent efforts to pad the state's reserve funds will help the state weather the storm. Democratic Sen. Janet Howell, who leads the Senate Finance Committee, said it would send an "upsetting" message if the state delayed passage of the budget.

"I don't think that there is any need for us to act precipitously, I think we're in a good condition for the near future," Howell said.

The short-term effects of the coronavirus on the state's economy are not clear. But a prolonged economic downturn and slide in

stocks could severely stretch both state and local governments, and force officials to confront painful options like slashing services or raising taxes. Budget writers would have less tax revenue to spend while potentially having to make up higher contribution levels for the state's pension plan.

This was the first year that Democrats had full control of the budget process in more than two decades. Until recently, this year's budget process also has been made easier by higher-than-expected tax revenues.

House Speaker Eileen Filler-Corn said the budget delivers "the important legislative promises demanded by voters" with increased spending on public education and health care.

Some highlights include:

Coronavirus and illegal drugs

Coronavirus

The coronavirus outbreak has escalated in the United States, with 559 confirmed cases at the time of this writing. As a member of the Subcommittee on Health of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, I have been receiving regular briefings on the topic from the public officials and medical professionals responding to the outbreak.

On March 4, the House passed a \$7.8 billion supplemental spending bill providing additional resources to fight coronavirus. It was a "clean" bill, meaning unrelated provisions, including an extension of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA), were excluded.

These funds will go toward making tests more available, treatments and vaccine development, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). At this time, no cases have been confirmed in Southwest Virginia (three in Northern Virginia), but events have been cancelled out of caution. I had looked forward to attending an upcoming event honoring women veterans at the Salem VA Medical Center, but organizers understandably called it off to protect older veterans from the coronavirus.

Panic is not called for, but appropriate precautions are. Stay away from people who are sick, avoid touching the face, and wash your hands. They are simple but essential preventative techniques. You can stay up to date on the latest at the CDC's website, CDC.gov.

Illegal Drugs

Substance abuse continues to pose a threat to the health and well-being of our communities. Although in 2018, the most recent year data is available, drug overdose deaths nationwide declined by 4.1 percent, the rate of overdose deaths due to synthetic opioids such as fentanyl increased.

Further, there has been a surge in deaths due to psychostimulants such as methamphetamine. From 2012 to 2018, the death rate due to this category of substances increased nearly five times.

Increasing meth use is not just a national problem. Law enforcement and health officials in Southwest Virginia have observed a rise in meth here. Once a problem due to users making it at home for their own consumption, meth has surged this time because transnational drug cartels headquartered in Mexico are producing it on an industrial scale and trafficking it across the border into our country.

Congress has passed significant legislation in recent years to tackle substance abuse, including the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act in 2016 and the SUPPORT Act in 2018. The Energy and Commerce Committee has been at the center of the action, and we continue to look at what needs to be done.

The Subcommittee on Health met on March 3 for a legislative hearing on several bills to fight substance abuse. We looked at fourteen bills, including one I had introduced, H.R. 4812, the Ensuring Compliance Against Drug Diversion Act.

This bill terminates the controlled substance registration of any registrant that dies, ceases legal existence, discontinues business or professional practice, or surrenders registration. A registrant who ceases legal existence or discontinues business is required to notify the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA). Also, registrants must receive written consent from the DEA in order to assign or transfer a registration.

Nine witnesses on two separate panels offered testimony on my bill and the others. They included representatives from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the DEA, medical professionals, and advocates for those struggling with or recovering from substance abuse.

These witnesses shed light on the various problems. For instance, we heard about the availability of counterfeit Adderall. Adderall has a legitimate medical purpose, but the version available on the street is of a much higher strength.

At a roundtable discussion I led at UVA Wise on March 6, local health care professionals, law enforcement officials, and other stakeholders discussed the topic and shared their specific needs and concerns regarding our region with Jim Carroll, Director of the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy, commonly called the country's "drug czar."

Director Carroll and I also met with a representative from the Health Wagon, a nonprofit providing medical services, including substance abuse treatment, to underserved populations in our region.

At both meetings, we discussed the most urgent drug threats facing Southwest Virginia as well as the necessity for more treatment opportunities to get help to the people that need it.

Substance abuse is a tragedy that affects many individuals and families. It is our responsibility to reduce the availability of illicit drugs, increase awareness of their dangers, and assist those struggling with addiction toward recovery.

Didn't Get Out On Time

During the closing days of a General Assembly session, one query was heard over and over around Capitol Square: "Will we be getting out of here on time?" That refrain was not only uttered by legislators, but by legislative staff, support personnel, and those working in government relations.

As we all now know, we didn't get out on time. My republican colleagues and I voted along with the majority to extend session. We have worked long and hard to come to compromises on several key issues. Allowing the bills that were still in conference Saturday night to die, would have essentially erased 60 days of hard work by all. Had the majority party not spent countless hours fighting amongst themselves, on issues such as redistricting, and minimum wage we may have completed our work on time.

Completing work on a budget is the key factor in determining whether a session will be completed as scheduled. Under transparency measures successfully promoted and instituted by Senate Republicans, reaching an agreement on the budget begins a process of review. The budget agreement must be printed, a task that takes between a half day and a full day to complete. Then, the printed budget agreement is provided to legislators who must be given at least 48 hours

to review it before they vote on it. During this period, the budget agreement is also made available to the general public through the Legislative Information System.

The purpose of the review period is to ensure legislators and their constituents, as well as the media, have an opportunity to know what's in the budget before it's enacted. Before these requirements, legislators would sometimes be asked to vote on the final version of the state's two-year spending plan within a few hours of a budget agreement being reached. Transparency – for the public or even the legislators – was not a priority. Now, it is. And to their credit, the new Democrat majority retained this Republican reform. The new plan is to vote on the budget Thursday, which should give us all time to thoroughly review the proposed budget.

Covid-19 Worries

The White House has been walking into a coronavirus trap. By pooh-poohing worries about the virus and saying everything is under control, it is setting itself up for the charge, if things get even a little bad, that it was self-deluding and overly complacent.

Although President Trump has recently struck a better tone, he's been a chief offender, wanting to downplay the virus for fear it will continue to suppress a stock market that has experienced vertiginous drops.

This is exactly the wrong approach. The moment doesn't call for market-reassuring Trump, but threats-aren't-getting-past-our-borders Trump, not Dow 30,000 Trump, but drawbridge-and-moat Trump.

Everything should be geared toward overreacting now, when the threat in the U.S. is still in prospect, instead of later, when circumstances may be beyond anyone's direct control.

That means appointing a point person for the coronavirus response with a medical background, who doesn't already have a full-time job, like current designee Mike Pence. The right pick could provide genuine expertise in public health and the workings of government, as well as being a reliable source of public information.

It means erring on the side of further travel restrictions, even if it will be impossible to exclude infected people from the United States, given its break out from China to countries all around the world.

It means not quibbling with Congress over coronavirus funding, with even Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy saying the administration's \$2.5 billion request is "a little low" (Trump has signaled a willingness to accept more).

It means making sure that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is working at maximum efficiency to make coronavirus tests widely available, which is the most worrisome shortfall in the federal response so far, and that government agencies are doing everything possible to push the development and deployment of a vaccine.

Finally, it means coordinating with localities, as warranted, on ways to slow the spread of the virus via "social distancing," or the avoidance of large gatherings and public transportation.

The coronavirus is not a modern-day plague. Many people infected will experience only mild symptoms, and it's not as deadly as SARS or Middle East respiratory syndrome.

Yet, it is not a creation of the fake news, either. It has hobbled one of the most important counties in the world, China, and is shutting down towns in Italy. There are now more new cases outside of China than inside it. The virus has killed nearly 3,000 people.

If it gets loose in the United States, there could well be a panic that in itself would be damaging to the social fabric and the economy.

Maybe none of this comes to pass, but it's better to be overly prepared and vigilant than play to catch up.

Besides, the political valence

The Shame of Chuck Schumer

Just when you may have thought that the low quality of political rhetoric in Washington could not get any worse, along comes Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) to prove otherwise.

At a pro-choice demonstration outside the Supreme Court, which is considering a Louisiana law requiring doctors who perform abortions to have admitting privileges at nearby hospitals, Schumer delivered what sounded to many ears like a physical threat to two of the court's conservative justices: "I want to tell you, (Neil) Gorsuch, I want to tell you, (Brett) Kavanaugh, you have released the whirlwind, and you will pay the price."

Chief Justice John Roberts issued a rare statement in which he said of Schumer's comments: "Statements of this sort from the highest levels of government are not only inappropriate, they are dangerous." Schumer responded that Roberts is "biased."

After heavy criticism, including denunciations from liberals such as Harvard law professor Laurence Tribe, who called Schumer's comments "inexcusable," Schumer took to the Senate floor and offered a wimpy non-apology: "I should not have used the words I used yesterday. They did not come out the way I intended ... I'm from Brooklyn. We use strong language." He added he was in "no way" threatening the justices. He later "explained" he was talking about the price Republicans will pay at the polls if Gorsuch and Kavanaugh vote to uphold the Louisiana law.

If you watch the video, you see Schumer turning and pointing directly at the court building. It is difficult to accept either of his explanations.

The left regularly reminds us that words have consequences. They regularly condemn speech from conservative talk radio hosts they claim contributes to everything from racism to violence. But when they spew incendiary language it is fine with their fellow ideological travelers and much of the media. It's good to be a Democrat.

There is a law prohibiting, among other things, verbal threats against federal officials. It is known in the legal community as 18 U.S.C. (United States Code) Section 351. It states that it is a felony to threaten "all Federal employees ... when such threat is done with intent to impede, intimidate, or interfere with" such federal

employee "while engaged in the performance of official duties, or with intent to retaliate against" such federal employee.

Schumer's comments clearly were meant to intimidate and even impede the court's deliberations on the Louisiana law. Otherwise, why did he make them? His fiery remarks were not made on the Senate floor and thus he is not protected by the immunity enjoyed by senators.

Schumer also resurrected the "war on women" label that Democrats have used in the past, hoping, no doubt, to scare suburban women especially into voting for Democratic candidates.

The real war on women is coming from Planned Parenthood and the left. Since the Roe v. Wade decision in 1973, sixty-one million babies have had their lives snuffed out before taking their first breath. Some politicians are fine with allowing babies to be killed when they are fully viable, and even in some cases should they survive an abortion. Forty-one Democratic senators voted against the "Born Alive Act," a bill that "would have required doctors to provide standard medical care to newborn infants who survive abortion procedures." The bill did not win a necessary 60-vote majority in order to pass.

Neither does one hear about the many women who have regretted their abortions and say they would have made a different choice had they seen a sonogram of their baby and been given more information about available alternatives.

Shame is something politicians in Washington abandoned long ago, but if it were to make a comeback, Schumer's remarks would be at the top of a list of bad examples.

-Funding for the state's share of 2% raises for public school teachers for the next two fiscal years, while many state employees would receive a 3% bonus this year and a 3% raise next year.

-Funding to freeze in-state undergraduate tuition as public universities.

With the conclusion of session, a decision has been effectively made on all 2,830 bills filed by legislators. My own bills fared pretty well, I had a 75 percent passage rate. The big win was keeping VCHC open until 2045 instead of the original proposed 2030. The house and senate bills (HB1526 and SB851) with the 2045 closure are both on their way to the Governor and all signs point to him signing those bills with the amended closure date.

Paul's Thorn In The Flesh

“And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure. For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me. And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ’s sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong.” (2 Cor. 12:7-10)

The Apostle Paul tells us in the bible that he had been given a thorn in the flesh. He said he prayed to God three times to get it removed but God told him, “My grace is sufficient for thee.”

If you read the text closely, you will see that Paul's thorn in the flesh was a messenger of Satan (A demonic spirit) sent to buffet him. It wasn't from God. But God allowed it remain to keep Paul humble and so that Paul would continue to depend upon Him for strength to cope with trials and persecutions brought upon him by the devil.

In Acts Chapter 16 we find an account of one of Paul's problems with the thorn in his flesh. “And it came to pass, as we went to prayer, a certain damsel possessed with a spirit of divination met us, which brought her masters much gain by sooth-saying: The same followed Paul and us, and cried, saying, These men are the servants of the most high God, which shew unto us the way of salvation. And this did she many days. But Paul, being grieved, turned and said to the spirit, I command thee in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her. And he came out the same hour.”

Paul always gave God all of the glory for all that he was able to accomplish and refused to accept praise, acclaim or approval of any kind from the devil.

“And when her masters saw that the hope of their gains was gone, they caught Paul and Silas, and drew them into the marketplace unto the rulers, And brought them to the magistrates, saying, These men, being Jews, do exceedingly trouble our city, And teach customs, which are not lawful for us to receive, neither to observe, being Romans.

And the multitude rose up together against them: and the magistrates rent off their clothes, and commanded to beat them. And when they had laid many stripes upon them, they cast them into prison, charging the jailer to keep them safely: Who, having received such a charge, thrust them into the inner prison, and made their feet fast in the stocks.”

At midnight, Paul and Silas prayed and sang praises unto God and God sent an earthquake to shake off their bonds and open the prison house doors, and an Angel down from out of Heaven to deliver them and to set them free. Paul was able to get the jailer saved as well as all of his family. When day came, the Magistrates set them free.

Lady Cougars' season ends

Girls fall to Millbrook

CHRISTIANSBURG -- Millbrook doubled up on the basketball on the perimeter and took the Pulaski County girls out of their half-court offense on the way to a, 65-58 state quarterfinal win Friday evening. The loss ended the Cougar girls' season at 21-7, and Millbrook moved to 27-2.

The numbers tell the story. Pulaski Co. shot better, much better, but it didn't get enough shots. The Cougars were 23 of 42, 57.2%. Millbrook was just 22 of 52, 42.3%, but the difference was in two areas. The Patriots helped themselves on the offensive backboards, but Pulaski Co. committed 26 painful turnovers. Twice in the game the Cougars had eight-point leads, but turnovers got Millbrook back in the fight. During one stretch of the second quarter Pulaski Co. was up eight, but then turned the ball over on five consecutive possessions.

Maddie Ratcliff hit a three in the final second of the first quarter to give PCHS a, 16-12 lead. But the turnovers kept mounting. The Cougars had 16 at the half, but Keslyn Secrist scored a drive off the baseline to tie the game at 29 at the break.

Millbrook led 48-42 after three quarters as the Cougars turned the ball over seven more times. Pulaski Co. hit six of eight shots but were hit down by six going into the fourth quarter. The turnovers kept taking away scoring opportunities from Pulaski Co. Millbrook turned the ball over 10

times in the game.

Millbrook used its height advantage and tossed the ball over the Cougar defense in the fourth quarter as the Patriots started to take time off the clock. It worked. The Cougars were forced to foul, and the Patriots hit six of nine from the stripe.

The Cougars pulled within six with 1:02 left but Emily Magee hit four straight free throws and

Millbrook hung on.

Kennedy Rooks led the Patriots with 17 points, Avery O'Roke scored 15, Magee and Ali Houck both 13. Pulaski Co. was led by Maddie Ratcliffe with 19

points, Secrist finished with 13, Ally Fleenor 12, and Taryn Blankenship 11. Erin Russell suffered an ankle injury early in the game and was not able to return for the Cougars.

Time to put playoffs back at home sites?

Is the current playoff system fair? Don't get me wrong. The VHSL has nothing but good intentions. But I believe that VHSL playoffs in all major sports need to be evaluated. I'm speaking of where the games are played and the decision-making process.

Take the present ongoing state basketball tournament in all classifications. Auburn was in the Class 1 semifinal. They had to go all the way Wise County to play Grundy Tuesday. Congrats to the Eagles for making the final.

Under the current playoff system, a team can win its region and get the home region advantage so to speak, but some school's home region advantage is greater than others. In the state basketball tournament, the championship games will be played in Richmond, but only the six finals for both boys and girls. The rest will be played at locations of the earned region home court.

This is basically a rural vs. urban situation. If your school is located around Richmond, Roanoke, Tidewater, or most anywhere in the northern region you don't care. You have earned the home court for your region, but you can't play on your home court. You must play at some other site within your region, but you hardly leave your neighborhood.

So, what does that mean? It means that Loudoun Valley has its region home court advantage and it moves its game to another school in Loudoun County basically a five-minute drive away. There are 13 high schools in that single county. Pulaski County's girls won the same region advantage but had to play in Christiansburg. Nothing wrong with CHS, but that's a 30-minute to 40-minute drive for some Cougar fans. Still, PCHS had a great crowd, and plenty of support, but the game should have just been played on the Cougars' home court.

If you are the higher seeded team and you have earned the home court, why not just play the game there? I understand the VHSL tries very hard to be politically correct. It is the public-school system and I understand the attitude, but doesn't making a buck come into play somewhere down the line? Maybe we should try to earn a dollar instead of just spending dollars all the time.

Just go ahead and play the games at home sites, sell a bunch of tickets, make some money, and be able to better provide for public high school sports. Either that or put the entire tournament at a central location. Do you think that will happen? No, you don't, and I don't either. Why? Money!

The travel situation and cost are unfair to rural schools and certainly to the families and fans of those schools. The Halifax boys team had the region home court and still had to drive over an hour to play the game. Like a lot of things in Virginia, things are more difficult for the southwest region of the state. There needs to be a better understanding.

And I'm not just talking basketball. I subscribed to a closed-circuit setup and watched all six state championship football games. Class six and five were played in Hampton and the fan turnout was horrific. Which is to say

Where Have All The Huckleberries Gone?

A couple weeks ago I wrote about Luke, a Golden Retriever talking with another bird-dog, a Brittany-Spaniel, Anna Marie. They were telling each other what they had overheard their two men and one women discussing on the loss of game birds, most notably grouse and quail. There were found to several things that bought this all about, but I won't go into all the reasons again other than one thing that goes into conjunction with what I feel another has led to the demise of grouse and the quail that made the beautiful sound I miss hearing i.e. "Bob-white."

I was in the U. S. Forest Service last week getting some information and saw this big upright poster advocating controlled burns that are in many ways beneficial to forest lands and wild life. I related to the personnel how I wrote an outdoor column for this paper and they gave me some addition handouts. I was captivated by their info but what impressed me most was the two side-by-side images that was were depicted on the poster. I got the Forest Service's permission to take a pic of the poster and is shown as a sidebar. A beautiful ruffled grouse is shown by a log with a wing drumming the familiar sound that in the old days was heard throughout the forest lands. The caption below reads, "It increases forest and browse for wildlife." Below this pic is another familiar scene that I remember from growing up that was one I recognized right off i.e. the pretty berries, most notably called, Huckleberries." The caption reads, "It promotes the growth of berries, wildflowers and other plants."

As you see in a lot of cartoons, a light bulb went off over my head as I realized, "Hey, I haven't seen any Huckleberries in years and often would hear "Old Timers" even when there were still patches of the berries to be found to say, "We need to have to have some forest fires to get some good crops of huckleberries to coming back". The bushes themselves are only a couple feet high and easy pickings for ground dwelling birds such as grouse and quail which love them – our local Black Bears love them as well and I have heard a few jokes in this regard (won't repeat in print). One holdback in picking these berries is that copperheads and rattlesnakes like to lie beneath these bushes, (I once climbed up a shale bank along Little Creek Road after some huckleberries growing there and spied a big snake coiled there right at eye level). Needless, to say, I got down a lot faster than I went up,

and its species remains a mystery even today. In Class three and four in Lynchburg there was a nice crowd for the Class 3 matchup between Lord Botetourt and Hopewell, no doubt because it was close to Botetourt County. Two hours later when Tuscarora and Lake Taylor played for the class 4 title, you could hear fans voices echoing off the concrete. It was a horribly small crowd. If Pulaski County played just a regular season home game and the crowd was that small, there would be a panic.

The largest attended state championship game was obviously Class 1, Galax vs. Riverheads in Salem. The championship game between the two smallest schools had the largest attendance. Just think about that. It makes no sense, but then it does. Just like what happened in Lynchburg for the Class 3 game. Rural communities support their local schools more than people support urban schools. If somebody wants to argue that, show me the numbers.

So, if rural communities support the best, then why not try to be a little more understanding to those people. They do the traveling; they buy the tickets. Northern Virginia is the highest populated region in Virginia, but they didn't drive down to see Tuscarora play in Lynchburg, and that's not a bad trip at all. Nobody from Newport News came down to watch Lake Taylor either. If the four class 5 and 6 schools had any significant support at all in Hampton, it was hard to see. A regular season home game in Dobson Stadium would outdraw four of the six state championship games last fall. That's not the way it's supposed to be.

Back in the 80s and 90s there was a lot of people that wanted to see the state title games put at major venues. I was one of them. I thought it was a great idea. Pulaski County would get in the playoffs and if the game was two

The local more urban schools didn't even have half the support of Pulaski County's football team even though the game was in their own backyard. The Cougars took over, not only on the field, but around the field with their fan support. It wouldn't be any different today either. That brings us back to who supports high school athletics. It's rural America.

And things change in time. I think the state championship football games should be played on home fields now. That way you at least have a state championship type crowd, the setting would feel special, certainly ex-

penses for the VHSL would have a sharp decline, and you would have excitement, fans! A crowd of 2,000 people in a 20,000-seat stadium is not very exciting and it doesn't look good. And if you spend less, and make more, the result is more profit, and that should mean good things for the kids that play sports, and the VHSL.

In this opinion there was just not enough excitement at many venues during state championship Saturday this past football season. I'm sure all the teams gave their all, but a state championship afternoon should also mean there's a great atmosphere around the game, and fans in the stands! The VHSL needs to look at the playoff system, and it certainly needs to try and be more understanding to the rural areas of the state. If the playoffs were more profitable, maybe we wouldn't be looking to make cuts in other areas.

UNC keeps season alive, throttles Tech, 78-56

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina coach Roy Williams joked that he nearly broke his dadgum neck Tuesday night because there was a light bulb out in the hallway steps leading up to the press room at the Greensboro Coliseum.

"If we lost this game I was going to do it intentionally," Williams joked.

Instead, the Tar Heels will live to play another game.

Garrison Brooks scored 20 points, Brandon Robinson added 17 points on five 3-pointers and North Carolina extended its season with a 78-56 win over Virginia Tech in the opening round of the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament.

Armando Bacot added 12 points and 11 rebounds and Cole Anthony chipped in with 10 points and eight rebounds for the Tar Heels (14-18).

UNC entered the tournament as the last seed, No. 14 overall, following what has been a disappointing regular season for a school with a proud history of winning 18 ACC Tournament championships, second only to Duke's 21 titles.

But the Tar Heels left no doubt

about this one.

North Carolina used a 17-3 first-half run to build a 32-26 lead at halftime and then scored the first seven points of the second half, including a spinning layup by Anthony that resulted in a 3-point play.

The lead grew to 20 when Robinson hit back-to-back 3-pointers, including one where he froze the defender and stepped back to drill the jumper and shouted to the crowd "I'm here!" A few minutes later the senior buried another 3 to push the UNC lead to 68-43 with 5:26 left.

"I was just fired up," Robinson said. "I get another opportunity to put on this jersey. I don't want it to end."

The Tar Heels held a significant height advantage over Virginia Tech and used it, continually pounding the ball inside to Brooks. The Tar Heels went to the line 25 times, making 19. Brooks shot 10 free throws, one fewer than the entire Hokies team.

Brooks did most of his damage in the second half — after he removed his goggles.

"I shoot better without them," Brooks said.

Virginia Tech beat North Carolina earlier this season in Blacksburg, Virginia, 79-77 in overtime — but that was without Anthony and Robinson, who were injured at the time.

Anthony added a different dimension to the Tar Heels offense this time around.

"The game was a lot faster," said Virginia Tech guard Jalen Cone. "They play faster with Cole on the floor. When we miss shots he's getting the ball on the 3-point line and pushing it full speed. It is causing us to have to get back full speed in transition. The last game they didn't have much transition."

Hunter Cattoor had 14 points off the bench for No. 11-seed Virginia Tech (16-16).

BIG PICTURE

Virginia Tech: Mike Young's first season with the Hokies didn't end the way he would have liked and there's reasons for that. It's pretty clear Young will need to add some "bigs" to the roster if the Hokies are going to compete in the ACC next season. "This isn't the best league to be young and small in," Young said. "We're going to look a lot different next year, I can assure you that."

North Carolina: Top reserve Christian Keeling injured his left ankle in the first half while running down a loose ball when Virginia Tech's John Ojiako inadvertently stepped on him. Keeling had to be helped off the floor. He returned in the second half but ran with a noticeable limp at first, but remained in the game. It's unclear how much of a factor he will be moving forward for the Tar Heels.

Keselowski looking to repeat in Atlanta

Brad Keselowski has been the cream of the crop - the car on top - when it comes to Atlanta Motor Speedway's most recent NASCAR Cup Series races. He's won two of the last three and finished second in the other. And after a frustrating near-miss at Phoenix Raceway's trophy last Sunday, the 2012 series champion arrives at Atlanta Motor Speedway for Sunday's Folds of Honor QuikTrip 500 (2 p.m. ET on FOX, PRN and SiriusXM NASCAR Radio) primed and ready to celebrate that first victory of 2020.

Results have traditionally met high hopes for the Team Penske driver there.

In 11 starts at the 1.5-mile Atlanta track, Keselowski has earned four top-five and seven top-10 finishes. He's finished in the top 10 in the last five consecutive races. And he is the defending champion of this weekend's race.

Last year after winning at Atlanta (which was the second race on the schedule instead of the fifth, as it is now) — Keselowski earned top-3 finishes in three of the next four events. He won his second race of the year at Martinsville Speedway four weeks after celebrating in Atlanta's Victory Lane.

The driver of the No. 2 Team Penske Ford could use a dose of that good energy now. After a frustrating early exit in the season-opening Daytona 500 — he finished 36th after being collected in an accident — he rallied to seventh-place (Las Vegas) and fifth-place (California) finishes. Last week he pitted from third with only a handful of laps remaining at Phoenix, and returned to salvage an 11th-place finish. He won Stage 2 and his recovery was good enough to move him inside the top 10 in the driver points (10th place) for the first time this season.

He led 82 laps at Phoenix — a mark only bettered by Chase Elliott's 93 laps out front — and advanced Keselowski from a 30th-place ranking after the Daytona 500 to a season high 10th place heading to Atlanta. He's 46 points behind the leader Kevin Harvick.

And Keselowski has proven himself to be an absolute favorite at the Georgia track — where he owns two wins. Of his 30 career wins, 13 of them have come on 1.5-mile venues such as Atlanta; the largest win tally among the NASCAR Cup Series style of race tracks.

Harvick takes over points lead

No one's been more consistent than Kevin Harvick this season. ... his series best four top-10 finishes in four races backs that up. And thanks to a season-best runner-up finish at Phoenix Raceway on Sunday, Harvick has earned the NASCAR Cup Series points lead — by a single point over two-race winner Joey Logano.

But as great as the perch atop

the standings may be, the driver of the No. 4 Stewart-Haas Racing Ford would like to firmly secure that championship opportunity with a victory. And soon.

Atlanta Motor Speedway has been both a productive and sentimental venue for the 44-year old Californian.

He scored his first career NASCAR Cup Series win at Atlanta in 2001 in the No. 29 Richard Childress Racing Chevrolet — the same car that Dale Earnhardt drove (as No. 3) when he died in that season's Daytona 500. A then-25-year-old Harvick, in only his third career series start, earned one of the most emotional wins in the sport's history that afternoon.

He answered it 17 years and 27 Atlanta races later with a victory in 2018. And he's a favorite this weekend too.

Should you still pay debts that are in collections, even if they have been dropped from your credit report? The one in question is from 2011, and I assume it isn't showing on the credit report anymore because it's nine years old.

There are two good reasons to go back and deal with this debt. One, even if it's off your credit report, you may still legally owe the money. Even if the statute of limitations has run its course, things like this have a habit of popping up and causing problems at the worst possible times. About the time you decide to buy a home, this is liable to raise its head again and mess things up. So, the fact that something

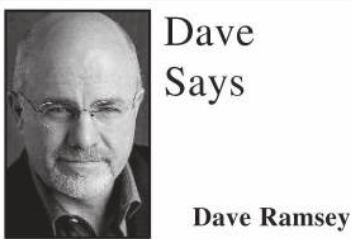
doesn't appear on a credit report doesn't mean you're not legally liable, or that they won't bother you about it later.

The second thing to think about is a simple matter of fact—you owe the money. Regardless of what the legal system or credit report says, you morally owe the money. March is National Nutrition Month. Most of us know and have heard that nutrient dense foods (low in calories, high in vitamins and minerals) can positively impact our bodies as well as health.

In honor of National Nutrition Month, let's talk appetite! Appetites, in general, are constantly changing. Some days we feel famished and other days, two bites can fill us up... and that's okay.

Children are very much in the same boat – some days they will have the best appetite, eating anything placed in front of them; but the next day, they won't touch a Cheerios™. Hey, you do the best you can!

There are different circumstances that can trigger a change in appetite such as, physical activity, exercise, stress, illness, hydration and sleep. We know that the more physically active we are and the more exercise we incorporate daily, can increase our appetite. This is because the body is burning more calories and using more energy.

Exercise can also have an opposite effect by suppressing our appetites, allowing us to become fuller, quicker. Stress is definitely a factor that can increase our appetites or severely diminish it. When you are stressed your body releases a hormone called cortisol, which increases the appetite. Comfort foods become more ap-

peeling when we are stressed. This is why doughnuts, fried foods, macaroni and cheese, and enriched pastas with cream sauce are on our minds, and sometimes our plates. Thank goodness there are healthy habits that can be used for instances like these. Crunchy foods have been deemed a good food during stressful times, as they help release tension in the jaw.

Wythe County trash and recycling centers have new guidelines

WYTHEVILLE, Va. – Preparing to drop off your recyclables at a Wythe County Trash & Recycling Center?

Residents should anticipate and be prepared for a change in their plastic recycling practices starting in April 2020.

Wythe County Trash & Recycling Centers will only be accepting #1 and #2 plastics, while plastics #3 through #7 will no longer be accepted as a recyclable material. Plastics labeled as #3 through #7 must be disposed of with regular trash. Examples of #1 and #2 plastics are plastic soda and water bottles, milk, juice, water jugs and laundry detergent containers. Resident's are encouraged to review the labeling typically found on the bottom of the container.

The change in rules is a result of the lack of market opportunity for expanded recycling in the materials produced by plastics #3 through #7. Plastics #3 through #7 are defined as: #3– Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC), #4 Low Density Polyethylene, #5 PP—Polypropylene, #6 PS—Polystyrene, #7—Mix of various compounds.

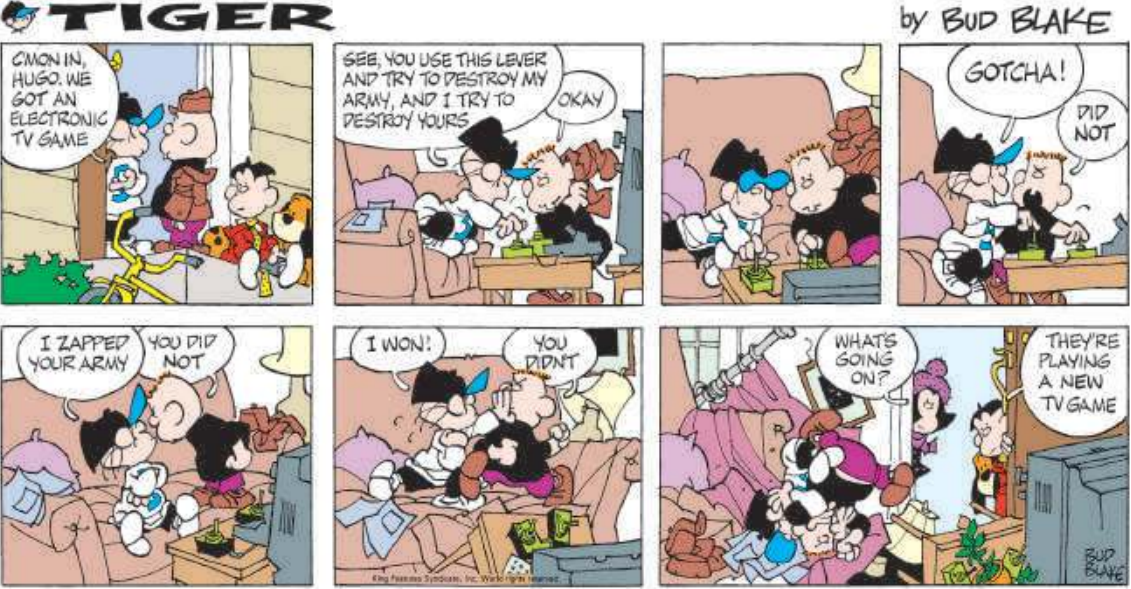
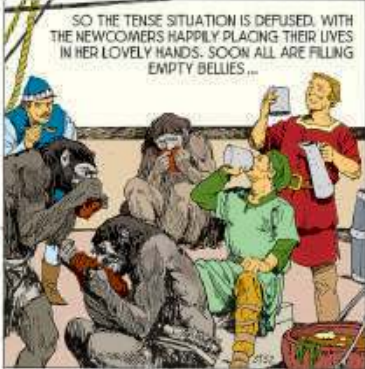
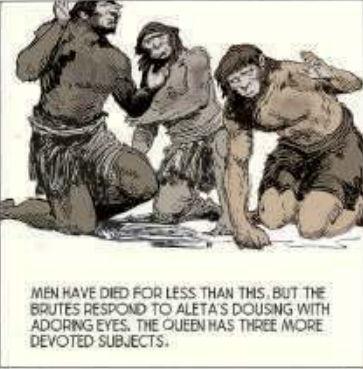

This leprechaun probably was inspired by "Paddy and the Pig," a caricature used by British political cartoonists since the 1840s to represent Ireland and the Irish

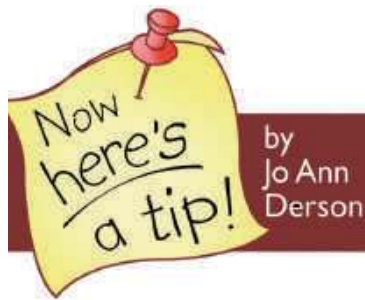

A version made by Lehmann, a German toy manufacturer, depicts Paddy trying to ride an uncooperative pig that moves back and forth while Paddy holds on for dear life. It sold at a Bertoia auction in New Jersey for \$1,320.

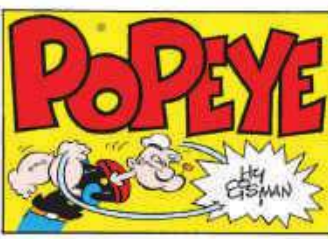

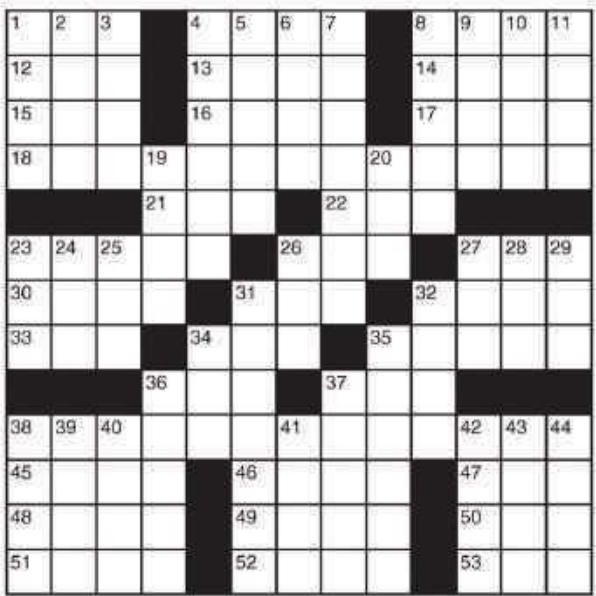
