



## Registration deadline for Nov. 2 elections is Oct. 12

RICHMOND, VA - The voter their ballot and request an absenregistration deadline for the upcoming elections is Tuesday, October 12. Successful registration enables all eligible Virginians to cast ballots in the November 2, 2021 elections.

To register to vote or update voter registration information:

- By mail: Applications must be postmarked by October 12.
- In-person: Applications must be submitted by 5:00 pm on Octo-
- Online: Applications must be submitted by 11:59 pm on October

Any Virginian can check or update their registration information or register for the first time at the Department's Online Citizen Portal, vote.elections.virginia.gov. Registered voters can also preview tee ballot through the website.

"Online voter registration makes voting more accessible for residents of Virginia," said Christopher Piper, Virginia's Commissioner of Elections. To register to vote in Virginia, one must:

- be a U.S. citizen
- be a resident of Virginia
- be at least 18 years old by the upcoming November 2 General Election
- have had voting rights restored if convicted of a felony
- have had the capacity restored by court order if declared mentally incapacitated

In addition to registering online at vote.elections.virginia.gov, eligible Virginians may register at their local voter registration office.



## Democrats Target Natural Gas

Natural gas is a core fuel for the modern world. It is used to heat homes, power the electric grid, and make manufactured products, including plastics.

The United States has enjoyed a boom in natural gas for more than a decade. Advances in drilling technology and energy-friendly Trump Administration policies expanded the supply and drove prices down. Our country became a leading supplier of the fuel around the world.

Recent months have presented some ominous indicators, however, with prices rising and shortages increasing. A September 19 Wall Street Journal article explained:

Natural-gas prices have surged, prompting worries about winter shortages and forecasts for the most expensive fuel since frackers flooded the market more than a

The supply deficit is particularly acute in Europe, where inventories are thin thanks to hot weather, lackluster wind-power generation and lower imports from Russia. Goldman Sachs Group Inc. analyst Samantha Dart said that stockpiles in northwestern Europe have recently been about 24% below average.

The United States so far has been insulated from these price shocks due to our country's robust production. But some of the culprits for higher prices in Europe resulted either from the policies of President Biden and congressional Democrats or policies they would like to pursue domestically.

Ironically, if these trends continue and gas prices remain high, the Biden Administration will have restored coal as the country's lowest-cost fuel source.

Much of Europe depends on Russia for gas supplies, giving Russia leverage on the international stage. It has

weaponized its dominant position in the gas market before against other coun-9th District tries such as Trump Ad-

ministration realized this fact, which is why it staunchly promoted American gas exports and fought against the completion of the Russian Nord Stream 2 natural gas pipeline in Europe.

The Biden Administration, in contrast, dropped its opposition to Nord Stream 2. The pipeline's completion allows Russia to consolidate its dominance of the gas market in Europe. The reduced imports from Russia now contributing to Europe's gas crisis indicate the dire consequences that can result from the administration's

The "lackluster wind-power generation" described by the Wall Street Journal could also be a fact of life here should Democrats get their way. Despite the inadequacies of wind and solar power, the energy agenda of President Biden would favor them while discouraging more resilient and affordable power sources such as natural gas, coal, and nuclear.

Included in the Democrat \$3.5 trillion reconciliation bill is \$150 billion for a Clean Electricity Performance Program, a backdoor way to set national energy standards. The program works by providing money to utilities that meet the bill's aggressive thresholds for incorporating renewable power sources into their energy mix year after year until 2030.

Among the problems with the program is that it would remake the electrical grid faster than the grid can realistically be built to handle the renewables. A larger percentage of power would be comprised of wind and solar, intermittent sources that cannot always be relied upon. When they fail, other fuel sources such as natural gas or coal would be deployed to fill the gap, potentially increasing the price of energy across the board.

In addition to this poorly conceived and unrealistic program, the reconciliation bill pours salt in the wound by including a tax on – you guessed it – natural gas. Considering the many uses of natural gas, this tax would surely raise costs. Energy bills alone would increase from \$85 to \$242 per year, according to the American Gas Association, at a time when higher inflation is already eating away at family budgets. Increased home energy bills would accompany the soaring gasoline prices you pay when fueling your car at the pump.

These provisions threaten job creation and economic growth while providing little benefit to the environment. I opposed them when they came before the Energy and Commerce Committee in September, and I will continue to stand up against them as long as Democrats continue to pursue them.

Unfortunately, there is little reason to think the Democrats will back away from this approach. Since taking office in January, the Biden Administration has made it harder for the American energy sector by actions such as suspending new oil and gas leasing on federal lands, ending the Keystone XL pipeline, and rejoining the Paris climate agreement.

If this agenda is pursued, it will bring to a close the era of American energy dominance, an era that benefited our citizens every day through lower fuel costs and new

## The Pandora papers

"The rich put cream on their berries; the rich drive shiny black cars." - (from the Broadway musical "Carnival!")

The Pandora Papers, "an expose of the financial secrets and offshore dealings of dozens of heads of state, public officials and politicians," writes CNN, could not have come at a better time for congressional "progressives" who are seeking to win over enough Democrats to pass the massive Biden-Pelosi \$3.5 trillion infrastructure bill, which is loaded with enough pork to infect the nation with financial trichinosis.

The Pandora Papers, released by The International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ) on Sunday, is not equivalent to the Pentagon Papers, which revealed how the U.S. government lied to the public about the Vietnam War, but it might serve the political ends of the left.

ulous lie come to be embraced and promulgated by top officials of the United States government? Well, as it turns out, it's easy.

How does a stupid and ridic-

You start with an easily misinterpreted news photo that seemingly confirms the assumptions of progressive opponents of immigration enforcement that the agents policing our Southern border are cruel racists.

Then, you work up a Twitter mob saying that the photo has captured a tableau of hideous

You add open-borders advocacy organizations and civil rights groups denouncing the supposed misconduct in the harshest possible terms.

You throw on top a vice president and White House press secretary who have no regard for the truth and are happy to push any narrative convenient to them.

Finally, as the piece de resistance, you deploy a president of the United States who is too cynical or doddering to bother with the facts and is usually following the crowd rather the leading it and get him to make a statement endorsing the ludicrous fictions about the misleading photo.

This was the path to President Joe Biden condemning border patrol agents on horseback for having "strapped" Haiti migrants at Del Rio, Texas, and declaring that they "will pay" for their "horrible" and "outrageous" behavior.

Never mind that there was no strapping, that the border agents did nothing wrong besides trying to enforce a border crossing while working for an administration fundamentally uninterested in the task, and that there is an ongoing investigation of the agents -- itself a travesty

-- that Biden was pre-judging. Sawyer Hackett, an apparatchik running Julian Castro's PAC, was an early proponent of the whipping lie on Twitter. He tweeted the picture showing a border agent on horseback grabbing at the shirt of a migrant -his reins flying in the air -- and said agents were "rounding up Haitian refugees with whips," and this represented "unfathomable cruelty."

It was, to the contrary, entirely fathomable and not the least bit cruel. The agents were, in a common, long-standing practice, using horses because of the difficulty of the terrain and attempting to block migrants from entering the country illegally. They didn't have whips and were twirling reins to control their horses. Within hours of the photo creating a stir, these facts were readily ascertainable.

Even Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas defended the agents before getting the memo from his superiors that they had become hated figures to be used as punching

Days later, media stories still made reference to the nonexistent whips supposedly wielded by the agents.

Advocacy groups simply willed the whip story to be true, and for a swath of America basically anyone foolish enough

## Va. GOP candidate tests school fight message for 2022

LEESBURG, Va. (AP) When Democrat Terry McAuliffe said during the Virginia governor's debate last week that he doesn't believe "parents should be telling schools what they should teach," his opponent

Republican Glenn Youngkin quickly turned the footage into a digital ad, then announced spending \$1 million on a commercial airing statewide proclaiming that "Terry went on the attack against parents." Youngkin's campaign has since founded a parent-led group to circulate petitions and distribute flyers rejecting "McAuliffe's disqualifying position," while scheduling a "Parents Matter" rally Wednesday in northern Virginia's Washington exurbs.

Youngkin is trying to capitalize on a surge of relatively small but vocal groups of parents or-

lums they view as "anti-American," COVID-19 safety measures and school board members whom they consider too liberal and closely aligned to teachers unions.

"I'm glad that Mr. McAuliffe said that, that more people can see the truth and that the Democrat Party wants control," said Patti Hidalgo Menders, a 52-year-old Republican activ-

ganizing against school curricu- ist and mother of six sons — the youngest of whom is now in high school — who spoke at a rally last weekend near Dulles International Airport organized by a group called Fight for Schools.

> Youngkin is looking to excite the GOP-leaning suburban voters he needs to win the Nov. 2 race. If the approach proves successful in Virginia, a one-time swing state that has become more reliably blue, Republicans across the country are likely to replicate his efforts during next year's midterms, when control of Congress is at stake.

"Glenn Youngkin is harnessing the energy of parents that are frustrated and fed up," said Youngkin spokesperson Macaulay Porter.

Virginia's most active parental activist groups maintain they are nonpartisan and not seeking to influence the governor's race, instead focusing on school board elections and efforts to recall board members, especially in growing areas outside Washington. But many such organizations have ties to Republican donors and party-aligned think tanks and are led by people who worked for the GOP and its candidates, which may make it easier to replicate the message nationally.

"The other side wants to say this is all geared toward helping candidates. I think it's the opposite," said Ian Prior, 44, a former Trump administration official who founded Fight for Schools, which aims to recall five school board members in Loudoun County, Virginia, where his two children attend school. "This exists, and smart candidates are picking up on it. Politically, I would say it's a byproduct."

Youngkin attended a fundraiser and rally last month for Fight for Schools, and his campaign has at times asked Prior's group for help building crowds for the Republican's campaign events. The rally it helped sponsor last weekend drew about 100 people in front of the Loudoun County Supervisors Building in the leafy town of Leesburg to protest "divisive educational programs being advanced in our very own backyards."

Loudoun County, across the Potomac River from Washington, has high concentrations of people who work in politics. As has happened in other states, a recent school board meeting erupted into parental shouting matches as officials discussed teaching racial equality and determining transgender rights policies.

Attorney General Merrick Garland has directed federal authorities to strategize with law enforcement to address the increasing threats targeting school board members, teachers and others, citing "a disturbing spike in harassment, intimidation, and threats of violence" toward them.

"I was impressed with (Youngkin) when he reached out to parents when he saw how disappointed they were with the school boards," said Susan Cox, a Youngkin campaign volunteer and 58-year-old dance instructor from Sterling, Virginia, who attended the Leesburg rally and whose two children graduated from Loudoun County public

McAuliffe supporters dismiss the blitz as Youngkin firing up the conservative base without appealing to the suburban swing voters who abandoned the GOP in droves during last year's presidential election.

"Youngkin is working to divide Virginians instead of keeping our children safe from COVID-19," said McAuliffe spokesperson Christina Freundlich.

Still, an effort to draw Loudoun County residents angry over school issues could squeeze McAuliffe in a typically low-turnout, off-year election. Last year, Democrat Joe Biden carried Loudoun County, population 420,000, with 61% of the vote. He won the state by 10 percentage points.

Republicans say Youngkin could win if he can get 40% of the Greater Washington area vote. But complaining about teaching racial awareness could also backfire in a county that has grown more diverse over the years. Just 53% of Loudoun's population is white, down from 69% as recently as 2010.

"Running a race in Loudoun County on this issue when it could create a backlash against nonwhite voters runs the risk of being counterproductive," said Mo Elliethee, a former campaign adviser to McAuliffe and other leading Virginia Democrats.

Many parent groups counter that their movement is multiracial and sprang out of the pandemic-driven surge in virtual learning — which gave parents of all backgrounds in-home views of what their children were being taught.

are no longer acceptable in our classrooms and woke culture.

Understandably, reasonable parents and grandparents are upset about a philosophy teaching divisiness, class warfare, sexual orientation, etc. being inculcated into classroom instruction. They are attending school board meetings and expressing their First Amendment rights by protesting the use of books and teaching curriculum that they believe is harmful to their children.

While researching this topic, I discovered books being made available to public school children that were not the equal of previous books used in the classrooms. Also, I came across these statements on the National Education Association (NEA) website. You will find more about social justice than Biblical justice.

Under the heading Racial & Social Justice it stated: "NEA EdJustice engages and mobilizes educators, allies, and activists in the fight for racial, social and economic justice in public education. We are working tirelessly to dismantle systems of oppression that prevent children from accessing a great public education because of their race, gender, sexual orientation, culture or nationality."

Everyone wants all children to have access to a good education, but the standards and definitions of education have changed. Terms such as "dismantle systems of oppression" are clearly targeting white middle class Christian Americans and can be offensive to some.

Also on the NEA website is a black and white poster featuring a raised clenched fist, and the words: "Support Black Lives at School All Year. BLM Black Lives Matter at School."

Isn't it curious that we can't display the 10-Commandments, but we can display these posters?

Last summer, there were 8,700 protests supporting BLM and 574 of those protests involved acts of violence. Can you understand why some parents would believe these posters on the NEA website could lead to feelings of intimidation? I wonder if any of those protesters were hunted down by the FBI the way the current administration is proposing to do to parents who protest, by defining them as domestic terrorists under the Patriot Act.

Want to know the titles and substance of a few books on the recommended reading list by the NEA for your school-aged child; some targeting the three- to seven-year-olds?

Here is one on witchcraft and is recommended reading for Read Across America.

Pahua and the Soule Stealer Pahua Moua is an eleven-yearold Hmong girl with a unique ability to see spirits. After she accidentally releases an angry spirit which takes her beloved brother's soul, Pahua teams up with Zhong, a student at the School for Shamanic Arts, on a near-impossible quest to rescue her brother from the Spirit

Another recommended book is about America's historic racism, entitled Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You. Here is the description: "Using humor and a conversational style, the author deftly reworks 'Stamped from the Beginning,' exposing young adult readers to the history of America's racist past that textbooks leave out.'

And then there is a recommended book with the title, "The Prince and the Dressmaker" with the following description:

"By day, Prince Sebastian is heir to the throne; by night, he's the fashionable Lady Crystallia made all the more fabulous by Frances, his secret dressmaker."

Another recommended book, 'One Person, No Vote (YA edition): How Not All Voters Are Treated Equally" claims to provide the "...history of unconstitutional voter rights supression in America...sure to inspire soon-to-be voters to take

I found these two books listed on other public school and library suggested reading lists: "A is for Activist." It is an ABC's book written and illustrated for the next generation of progressives: families who want their kids to grow up in a space that is unapologetic about activism, environmental justice, civil rights, LGBTQ rights, and everything else that activists believe in and fight for."

And this one, "The Hips of the Drag Queen Go Swish, Swish, Swish" which is part of Drag queen story hour and has been promoted by the City of New York Department of Education's "Let's Learn" public television program. They have been treating kids age 3 to 7 to a surprise "drag queen story hour" in a remote-learning program it recommends as supplemental material for students stuck at home amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

This book is also being promoted in California schools or libraries, where a character dresses up as a drag queen and reads to children. One such character dressed as a demonic figure with several two-footlong

Although former Va. Governor Terry McAuliffe believes that "...I don't think parents should be telling schools what they should teach," it appears that many thoughtful, concerned, reasonable parents believe otherwise. And after reviewing some of the recommended reading materials, who could blame them for wanting to let their local school boards know this is not the direction they want for their children. They are concerned that the curriculum is divisive, racially charged, and not teaching our children basic skills they will need to become happy, productive American citizens able to compete in the world market.

Despite the haze of misinformation, the fact-checkers didn't descend en masse. No Twitter accounts were suspended. All the people who pride themselves on purportedly defending American democracy from falsehoods and propaganda spreading on social media (and there's unquestionably a lot of it) stood aside or joined the pile-on.

Press outfits went out their way to label falsehoods promulgated by President Trump as such, indeed gave every indication that they relished doing it.

In contrast, The New York Times story about Biden castigating the agents didn't suggest that he might be wrong. In fact,

the original version of the article reinforced his smear by referring to "the images of agents on horseback chasing, and in some cases using the reins of their horses to strike at running migrants." The paper had to run a correction.

It's long been the case on college campuses that woke narratives have the power to trample facts and fairness. This phenomenon has escaped the confines of academe and now plays out at the highest echelons of American political power. Neither hacks on Twitter nor the president of the United States cared what really happened at Del Rio, not when the lie was more seductive and useful.

## Logan Smith nears five years since devastating crash

October 16th marks the fifth year of twenty-three-year-old Logan Smith's survival after a devastating truck accident. The accident resulted in severe damage to Logan's C6 and C7 cervical vertebrae.

"It was only by the grace of God that Logan survived the 35foot drop down a steep incline after his pickup truck hydroplaned in 2016," says his mother Robin Dian Smith. "He is blessed by his remarkable faith in God and courage in the face of overwhelming circumstances. Logan has an amazing 'never-give-up' attitude and numerous times he has exceeded the expectations of the medical professionals."

Logan has continued to progress with rehabilitation and strength training, going beyond the boundaries that others might set for him. He has developed tricep muscles and can now lift weights which is a huge milestone in his recovery. He has gained more balance and core body strength and can do 100 situps in a row. His mother says that is another miracle to add to the many they have seen during the past few years. Amazingly, his activities include driving his own car, fishing, camping, kayaking, sky diving, snow skiing, scuba diving and rugby.

Rehabilitation costs \$10,000 a year and insurance no longer covers that cost so the family pays those fees out-of-pocket. Due to that expense, they are not able to afford a new everyday wheelchair, which Logan needs. Currently, he is using an eight-year-old used chair that does not conform to his body. Since Logan is very active, an everyday chair would be a great benefit to his health and continued progress. The Smith family has requested that the insurance company provide a new everyday chair, but the request has not been granted.

Thanks to the 2020 Walk With Logan Car Show and Fundraiser, the Smiths were able to purchase a rugby sports chair at the cost of \$15,000. Logan will be using the new chair as he participates in the upcoming invitational USA Wheelchair Rugby Olympic Camp taking place in November. The USWR just won a Silver medal in the Tokyo Olympics, so he is so excited to participate in

## Seeing more spiders this fall? Here's what you should know

FAIRFAX, Va.--(BUSINESS more notice of them." WIRE) -- Have you noticed more spiders recently? Fall is peak season for many spider species making sightings more abundant throughout parts of the U.S. While spiders play vital roles in all ecosystems, they are not something one would want in their living space. To help consumers keep these creepy crawlers out of their homes, the National Pest Management Association (NPMA) is offering expert prevention tips.

"Plentiful rain in a region can cause insect populations to boom, creating more food for spiders," said Brittany Campbell, BCE, Ph.D., staff entomologist at NPMA. "Spiders may also become more obvious this time of year as they grow larger, build webs and actively mate. In the spring when spiders emerge from egg sacs as spiderlings, they are inconspicuous, but as they continue their life cycle and become larger this time of year, you may take

Spiders have lived amongst humans for centuries. While some may bite if disturbed, most species are not harmful to humans. However, there are two species with particularly potent bites that can lead to severe symptoms such as pain and swelling or an open sore at the bite site, redness, cramping, nausea, vomiting, fever, chills, tremors, sweating, and more:

Black widow spiders are black and shiny with a telltale red hourglass shape on the underside of their abdomen. This spider tends to seek out dry and dark locations. Female black widow spiders are known to be aggressive and bite in defense, especially when guarding eggs. In rare cases, black widow spider bites can be fatal.

Brown recluse spiders are light to dark brown, with a characteristic dark brown violin marking on their back. The brown recluse spider also bites in defense when disturbed and prefers closets, attics, and crawlspaces as they provide warm, dry, and dark environments. Severe bite wounds from brown real. from brown recluse spiders may take longer to heal and can result in scarring.

Dangerous or not, most people prefer not to have any spiders in their homes. The best way



### attics, and basements clean and clutter-free and seal up cracks or crevices around the home. Shake out and inspect shoes and clothing before dressing and remove webs around the house. If you're concerned about spiders in your home, contact a licensed pest control

Better FCPS, which focuses on neighboring Fairfax County schools, is a former Republican National Committee consultant. She said her group was "not connected at all" to statewide races, only school board ones, which are nonpartisan.

"It's funny to me, the accusation that, 'Oh well, this is obviously a conservative-run movement," Zoldak said. "The only reason that we're the ones that speak up is because all the school boards are packed with liberals.

The funding behind such activism can be substantial. The Free to Learn Coalition launched in June with more than \$1 million in television advertising centered on public schools in Fairfax County and in Peoria, Arizona, as well as a New York City private school.

The schools were chosen to represent rural, suburban and urban areas, as well as the east and west. Within weeks, Free to Learn had heard from parents in every state and is now approaching 10,000 members, said its president, Alleigh Marré, who served as special assistant and chief of staff to the Air Force secretary during the Trump administration.

Her group followed up with a TV ad that aired during the Washington Football Team's season opener. It decried Loudoun County officials for having spent lavishly on a "divisive curriculum promoted by political activists" and accused "powerful education unions" of using "dirty political campaign tactics to go after parents."

More ads are planned elsewhere soon, said Marré, who lives in Virginia and has two children who have yet to reach school age. She said her group wants to build "like-minded coalitions of parents" and "elevate their voices where they can't necessarily be ignored."

Marré said parents who have criticized school policies have faced sanctions from school districts and sometimes had neighbors complain to their employers or seen things like their child's soccer team playing time decrease - making it little surprise the issue came up at the gubernatorial debate.

"It's something that is absolutely on the forefront of everyone's mind," Marré said. "It definitely has people fired up."



What is the main difference between people who follow your plan, stick with it and succeed, and those who fall off along the way?

### Dear Damon,

I've walked with thousands of families through financial problems. Some of them were speedbumps that just needed to be smoothed out, while others seemed like mountains. The biggest factor I've noticed separating those who stick with it and gain control of their finances, from those who give up and go back to their old ways, can be boiled down to one simple word—hope.

About 2,650 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in men in 2021. A man's lifetime risk of breast cancer is actually about 1 in 833.

As of January 2021, there are more than 3.8 million women with a history of breast cancer in the U.S. This includes women currently being treated as well as women who have finished treatment.






For many years Dan was the



Q: The Bible says over and over again, "Fear not," but it also says to "fear God." Why does the Bible contradict itself? - F.R.

A: There are different kinds of fear. Not all fear is wrong. It is right for a child to fear a hot stove or a sharp knife, because those can harm the child. It is right for us also to fear sin and Satan, for they can bring devas-

tell us to fear God, it doesn't mean that we're to be in terror or Him, shrinking from Him and even fleeing from Him. What we should fear, however, is His judgment, and this is why God has made a way for people to escape His judgment by receiving His salvation. When He becomes our Savior, we have a reverence and respect for Him, knowing that He is holy and all-powerful.

This can be a wonderful word study using Scripture. When we hear preachers or others talk about things of God, it pleases

the Lord when it drives us to His Word. He Himself will teach us the truth about all things.

Think of the fears that so easily grip us, even keep us enslaved. There is the fear of problems we face and what might happen to us. Jesus declared,

"These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Fears are real, but Christ has come to take away the source of our fears. "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives ... let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27).
