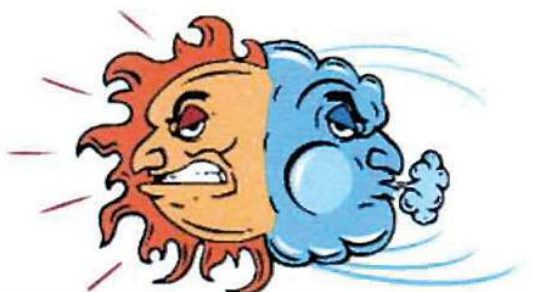

Supervisors get update on county's broadband project

The Pulaski County Board of Supervisors last week received an update on the Pulaski Network – the fully-funded, \$60 million universal fiber broadband project between the county and All Points Broadband.

Jimmy Carr, Chief Executive Officer of All Points Broadband told the supervisors, “Pulaski County is going to be in the first wave of counties in Virginia that achieve universal broadband, and you’re not doing it with any old technology. We’re doing it with fiber to the home using XGS PON technology and that means we’re doing it in a future proof way.”

Carr lauded County Administrator Jonathan Sweet and the county’s “team” involved with the project.

“Jonathan and his team have been focused on broadband, we’d like to say, before that was cool.

He has been working with All Points on improving broadband since he first came here several years ago,” he said.

Carr told the supervisors, “It’s no surprise to you all that people are very hungry for better broadband as soon as possible, and 10 percent of eligible locations have already contacted us to begin the signup process.”

That 10 percent represents some 800 county residents who have pre-registered for broadband service out of over 7,800 currently unserved locations in the county.

“Our No. 1 priority is to extend the network to as many locations as possible. That is our priority,”

Carr said.

Carr announced last week that All Points has agreed to offer a \$30 per month discount in broadband service pricing to any location in Pulaski County that qualifies for the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP).

ACP is a program through the Federal Communication Commission that is funded by \$14.2 billion in federal funds through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act signed by President Biden in November.

The \$30 discount is available to any household in Pulaski County that has a dependent receiving

Pulaski Appliance celebrates 35 years of business in March

free or reduced-price school lunches or who meet certain household income levels. For instance, a family of five with a household income of \$62,080 or less would also qualify. Pulaski's median household income, Carr noted, is \$53,866.

Carr provided All Point's expected service levels and pricing which include:

- 50 x 50 Mbps - \$59.99 (Undiscounted pricing) and \$29.99 (ACP pricing)
- 100 x 100 Mbps - \$79.99 and \$49.99
- 500 x 500 Mbps - \$99.99 and \$69.99
- 1000 x 1000 Mbps - \$109.99 and \$89.99

Carr explained that 50 Mbps (megabytes per second) is enough internet speed to "simultaneously stream 10 high-definition videos at the same time with no buffering."

"It's a very robust internet connection on an XGS PON fiber network that is the gold standard anywhere," Carr told the supervisors.

Carr invited residents to visit fiber.allpointsbroadband.com to confirm whether their location is included in the project and to pre-register for service.

Carr said there are all sorts of bureaucrat hurdles to get over in the days ahead before the actual construction of the project can begin. However, he said All Points had secured allocations of the supply it needs of all the key components to be used for

the project. He said manufacturers are committed to pricing and to deliver components over an extended period of time.

He said if things go well with all the bureaucratic hurdles, "make-ready" construction on the project - "the time when you see guys in the field with vests and hard hats" - will begin six months after final approval of the project is granted by the state.

Carr said All Points projects that the Pulaski Network project will be substantially completed within 18 months. "And we'll be trying to move that up," he said.

Carr said All Points will also be opening a regional office in Pulaski to support the rollout of the network.

"We've come a super long way, but we do have a long way yet to go," Carr stated. "We will be transparent with you all throughout the process. The fantastic news is that we will have a universal fiber network that is now fully funded."

Carr said it is possible the project could be completed by the end of 2023.

"If everything goes well. We can meet that, but there are all kinds of third parties involved in this," he added.

During Carr's presentation, he noted Pulaski County had last summer committed a local match of \$2.2 million to the project. But, he noted, that required amount had recently dropped to just \$2 million.

Sweet reminded the supervi-

sors that Pulaski County will have "no direct investment" of county funds in the project as the local match is coming from federal ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds.

Sweet praised All Points' work and planning on the project, along with the Board of Supervisors.

"All this is possible because this board has prioritized and made it very clear in so many ways of how important it is to provide broadband services to our citizens," Sweet said.

He termed universal broadband as "basic infrastructure in the 21st Century."

Sweet said the board's three priorities included the number of citizens served, cost and affordability and the need for the service "sooner rather than later, not in two years, but two years ago."

Sweet said All Points had put together a solution that accomplishes "every single objective set forth."

"This is really one of those perfect examples of a public - private partnership that I couldn't be more pleased to work with," Sweet stated.

"This is the way it should be done," Carr concurred in closing.

Youngkin urges lower gas tax as budget talks continue

(The Center Square) - Amid Republican and Democratic budget negotiations, Virginia Gov. Glenn Youngkin urged lawmakers to suspend the commonwealth's gas tax increase to alleviate soaring gas prices.

"We've constrained the development of American energy and it's made matters even worse," the governor said in a speech to the Greater Richmond Chamber of Commerce. "But we can eliminate unnecessary taxes that have been added on top of already increasing prices."

As of Tuesday, gas prices have climbed to an average of \$4.10 per gallon, according to AAA, which is the highest average in the state's history. Before Tuesday, the peak was \$4.01, which was set in 2008. Costs have spiked in recent days, rising from an average of less than \$4 per gallon Monday.

The global oil market, the Russian invasion of Ukraine and high inflation rates have contributed to the rising prices. Upon pressure from Republican and Democratic leaders, President Joe Biden announced Tuesday

he is issuing new sanctions on Russian oil and acknowledged it would exacerbate the gas price increases further.

Virginia levies a 26.2-cent-per-gallon tax on gasoline, but the governor proposed temporarily suspending the most recent tax increase and bringing the tax down to 21.2 cents per gallon until July 1, 2023, when the state would reimplement the tax. The House of Delegates, which has a slim Republican majority, passed legislation to implement the tax and included those cuts in its budget proposal. However, the Senate, which has a narrow Democratic majority, killed the gas tax cut legislation during the committee process and did not include it in their budget proposal.

Lawmakers entered into a joint conference committee with House and Senate leaders to negotiate a compromise budget bill and settle questions surrounding the gas tax and other points of contention. The Center Square reached out to House Republican leadership and Senate Democratic leadership for comment on the status of negotiations, but they were not available for comment.

Other tax proposals also caused a rift between the two chambers. House lawmakers sought to double the standard deduction, which would establish a broad tax cut. The plan would increase the deduction from \$4,500 to \$9,000 for single filers and from \$9,000 to \$18,000 for married filers. The Senate wants to leave the standard deduction untouched and keep current law in place. Under current law, the standard deduction is scheduled to decrease in 2026, which

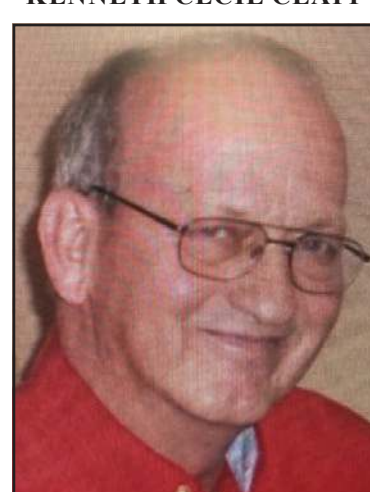

would increase taxes for some Virginians.

Stephen Haner, a senior fellow for state and local tax policy at the free-market Thomas Jefferson Institute, told The Center Square that doubling the standard deduction is his primary focus because it would be a long-term reform that would have a lasting impact.

“Several of the other tax reduction proposals have merit, but the standard deduction has the broadest impact and for most would mean more dollars in the weekly paycheck,” Haner said.

Lawmakers are also debating the specifics of a grocery tax cut. House lawmakers passed a bill

that would eliminate the entire 2.5% grocery tax. The Senate version of the bill would cut the tax by 1.5%, but keep the 1% option for local governments. The House version would divert state funds to localities to prevent revenue losses for local governments.

Both chambers also plan to increase teacher salaries, but disagree on the specifics. The House version would give teachers a 4% annual pay raise and a 1% bonus and the Senate version would give them a 5% annual pay raise and a \$1,000 bonus. The Senate version of the budget would also increase education funding and the House version would divert certain funds toward school choice programs.

The session is scheduled to end Saturday, but lawmakers could extend it if they fail to come to an agreement.

American Energy Can Counter Putin

The exigencies of war can lead to unexpected consequences. We are seeing this truth play out as Ukraine fights for its survival against Russian aggression. After the Russian invasion of Ukraine, a world leader who belongs to a political party on the left called for building a stockpile of coal and natural gas as well as the rapid construction of two liquid natural gas (LNG) terminals to import more of it.

Unfortunately, that leader is not President Biden but German Chancellor Olaf Scholz. But President Biden can

learn from the latter's example. Like much of Europe, Germany depends on Russian natural gas, and it was reluctant to jeopardize economic ties before war broke out. It continued to support the construction of the Nord Stream 2 pipeline directly between the two countries, a project that would only increase this dependence. Once Vladimir Putin unleashed war in Europe, Germany finally recognized the danger of its reliance on Russian imports to meet its energy needs. For families budgeting to heat their homes and fill their gas tanks and for meeting the demands of our economy, energy policy is important. The geopolitical importance of energy policy must also be appreciated: energy equals power on the world stage. Vladimir Putin knows this, and Chancellor Scholz has come to recognize it, too. I hope President Biden will follow suit.

While the United States does not depend on Russian energy imports to the same extent as Europe, our country still buys significant quantities of its oil and petroleum products -- approximately 200,000 barrels of crude oil per day in 2021, the highest level in a decade, and 500,000 barrels of other petroleum products per day. Russia's largest oil and gas companies are state-owned, so purchasing their products funds the war machine now devastating Ukraine.

Further, the United States enjoys advantages Europe does not. Our country leads the world in oil and natural gas production. We possess vast reserves of these fuels and coal as well. Our country can use it, and so can our friends, as Germany's decision after Russia's invasion to rapidly construct the new LNG terminals shows.

The current problem lies in turning these natural advantages to our benefit as a world power. President Biden has shown no interest in using our energy resources to bolster American standing and support friendly countries; in fact, his actions in office so far have undercut that purpose.

On the first day of his Administration, President Biden shut down the Keystone XL pipeline that would have delivered crude oil from neighboring Canada to American refineries. Incredibly, he later lifted restrictions on Russia's Nord Stream 2 pipeline. Russian energy somehow warranted more lenient treatment in the President's eyes than a Canadian-American project.

The Administration followed up on these tremendous errors by imposing a moratorium on oil and natural gas projects on federal land, delaying or denying permits, and preparing burdensome new regulations.

Even now, with Russian aggression not just a threat but reality, the Biden Administration wavers. It has subjected the Russian economy to financial sanctions but exempts energy, its most crucial industry.

To force the Administration's hand, I am an original cosponsor of the American Energy Independence from Russia Act to boost our domestic production. House Democrats have already blocked one attempt to advance it. President Biden, however, still has the power to follow Germany's leaders and recognize that circumstances in Eastern Europe urgently demand a new course.

That course should be a reset of American energy policy. The sleeping giant of domestic energy production should be awakened.

This is not what Putin wants or expects, but when wars break out, they can have far reaching and unintended effects. Our fight for independence from Britain contributed to the French Revolution of 1789, an outcome that would likely have surprised the minutemen of Lexington and Concord.

A U-turn by President Biden on energy due to war in Ukraine, while less dramatic, could be revolutionary and would send a strong message not only to Russia but also to China and the world.

A return to American energy dominance would reduce prices, create jobs, and give us leverage to counter the designs of current and future tyrants abroad.

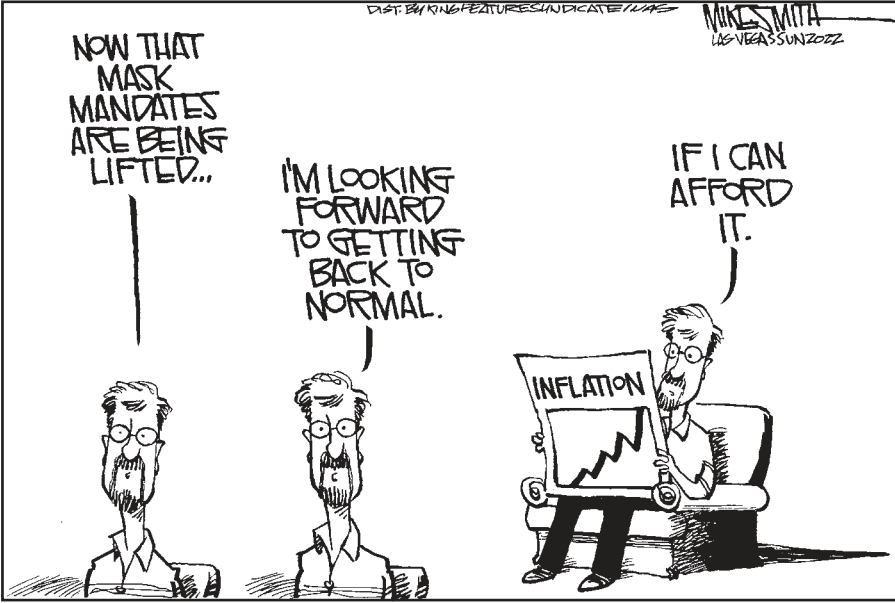

The cost of the Russian war keeps rising

From the start of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the U.S. stock market, which has been "stumbling since the beginning of the year," writes the New York Times, is down "10.3 percent from its most recent peak on Jan. 3," and the cost of gas is rising rapidly. Near record high oil prices -- it briefly topped \$130 per barrel on Monday -- means in some states it costs \$100 to fill up certain vehicles, more if you drive a truck for a living.

The stock market's decline is hurting retired people who rely on their 401k and IRA investments.

The Biden administration is engaging in mostly symbolic gestures and rhetoric, promising to bring down the price of gas, but without results. What's needed is obvious, including the restoration of the Keystone Pipeline and drilling for oil on federal land. During the previous administration, gas prices were more than \$2 a gallon lower on average than today, though it was due largely to supply and demand during the pandemic - more people working from home, fewer people buying gas.

While many environmentalists want to wean us from fossil fuels in favor of green energy, the problem for them - and the rest of us - is that fossil fuels are in virtually everything we buy and need. A Google search finds 144 products that contain petroleum. These include ink, upholstery, bicycle tires, dishwasher parts, food preservatives, petroleum jelly, antiseptics, shoes, trash bags and even fishing hooks. Windmills and solar panels won't create these products.

When it comes to the electric vehicles, here are some fun facts.

An electric vehicle (EV) battery, like all batteries, doesn't make electricity. It only stores it. The electricity must be produced primarily by coal, uranium, natural gas-powered plants, or diesel-fueled generators. The claim that EVs produce no emissions may be technically true, but there are emissions from substances that go into making them.

A typical EV battery weighs more than 1,000 pounds. It contains 25 pounds of lithium, 60 pounds of nickel,

44 pounds of manganese, 30 pounds of cobalt and 400 pounds of aluminum. Inside are over 6,000 individual lithium-ion cells.

The greens ought to be concerned that these toxic components come from mining. For example, to manufacture each EV auto battery requires 25,000 pounds of brine for the lithium, 30,000 pounds of ore for the cobalt (most is produced in Congo, which has a poor human rights record), 5,000 pounds of ore for the nickel and 25,000 pounds of ore for the copper. That's a lot of mining for a single battery.

Windmills, which along with EVs and solar panels, are not a viable alternative to fossil fuels. Not only can't they meet our energy needs, they also contribute to environmental destruction. Some windmills weigh more than 164 tons. Each blade lasts only 15 to 20 years at which time they must be replaced. There is also the harm caused by the spinning blades to birds, bats, sea life and migratory insects.

If fossil fuels are to be replaced, or our reliance on them reduced, technology must precede politics and wish lists. Otherwise -- and without a change in policies that return us to what as recently as 2016 produced energy independence -- prices will continue to rise.

Former Obama administration U.S. Treasury official Mark Mazur has revealed the goal of the greens. "We don't want lower prices for fossil fuel buyers, we prefer higher prices" to achieve "climate change goals." Americans are supposed to change our way of life based on a dubious claim about "climate change"? They told us something similar in the '70s when "experts" were certain a new ice age was coming.

Voters, who are paying more at the pump, are likely to make the politicians responsible for increased gas prices and inflation pay at the polls come November.

Nationalism's Finest Hour

If anyone had any doubt that Ukraine has its own national identity, the early days of the Russian invasion should have eliminated it.

There's been the stiff resistance of Ukraine's fighters, the former president giving interviews in the streets of Kyiv in battle gear, the ordinary men and women insulting and defying Russian soldiers, and above all, the comedian-turned-president, the now legendary Volodymyr Zelenskyy, refusing to leave his capital as Russian forces bear down on the city seeking to capture or kill him.

This is all so compelling because there is something inherently stirring about a people defending their homeland from a would-be imperial overlord.

The fight to save Ukraine represents a righteous nationalism. The Ukrainians aren't defending democracy per se or freedom in the sense of abstract rights -- although Vladimir Putin's Russia is a threat to both -- but their land and birthright. They are struggling for national self-determination, and even national survival.

Even in a globalized world, even when patriotism is not nearly as strong a force as it once was, even among Eurocrats who want to subsume Europe's nations in an EU superstate, Ukraine's struggle still strikes a profound chord.

In his speech prior to the war, making a direct appeal to the Russian people, President Zelenskyy spoke of his memories of Ukraine. "No one in Russia knows the meaning of these places, these streets, these names, these events," he said. "These are all alien to you, unfamiliar. This is our land, and this is our history."

"We are not part of one whole," he explained. "You cannot swallow us up. We are different. But this difference is not a reason for enmity. We want to determine our own course and build our own history -- peacefully, calmly and honestly."

Zelenskyy was speaking a nationalist's language of love for his people's history, land and traditions. As G. K. Chesterton once wrote, "Cosmopolitanism gives us one country, and it is good; nationalism gives us a hundred countries, and every one of them is the best."

Of course, Ukraine's status as a nation is contested by Vladimir Putin, who claims that it rightfully belongs to Russia. His revanchist vision is often described an aggressive nationalism, but it is really a drive for empire. In his own lurid speech before starting the war, Putin laid out a spurious version of history wherein Ukrainian nationhood was an invention of the Soviet Union. He attacked "the virus of nationalist ambitions," and claimed after the invasion began that Russian troops were only fighting against "nationalist groups" in Ukraine.

Putin is armed with newer weapons, but he's acting every bit the traditional Russian imperialist. Already in the 15th century, a crude Russian state ruled an enormous swath of territory. By the end of the 19th century, it had become one of the largest empires ever in terms of sheer landmass. This empire was lost

Island in New York...at the expense of the French people who had donated money for the statue.

The strong symbolism of the statue is inspiring. Lady Liberty, escaping the chains of tyranny, holds a burning torch aloft in her right hand, symbolically lighting the way for others. In her left hand, she holds a tablet, perhaps recognizable to some as a symbol of the 10-Commandments, inscribed with the date July 4, 1776. She is wearing the flowing robes of justice and upon her head is a crown.

Equally inspiring is the inscription on the base and the pedestal. It seems that, in an effort to raise money to help pay for the base, newspaper publisher John Pulitzer sponsored an art auction. One of the entries was from an outspoken Jewish poet and freedom

with Russia’s defeat in World I, reconstituted by the Soviets, and lost again at the end of the Cold War. Putin seeks to revive a version of this project and notably referred in his pre-war speech to “the collapse of the historical Russia known as the USSR.” Zelenskyy and the Ukrainians are fighting for independence against this behemoth and, in so doing, giving Ukraine new national heroes and national lore that will sustain it even if the worst comes.

The Russian tanks may roll into Kyiv, but Russia won’t ultimately triumph over Ukrainian nationalism.

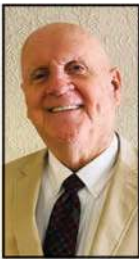

Jesus Transforms Lives

One of the greatest examples in the whole bible about how Jesus transforms lives is found in the life of Saul, also called Paul. Saul of Tarsus was arrested by Christ, while he was on his way to Damascus to continue in his persecution of Christians, and transformed him from who and what he was, to who and what God wanted him to be.

Acts 9: 1. “And Saul, yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the Disciples of the Lord, went unto the High Priest. And desired of him letters to Damascus to the synagogues, that if he found any of this way. Whether they were men or women, he might bring them bound unto Jerusalem. And as he journeyed, he came near Damascus: and suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven.”

Saul was threatening and slaughtering the followers of Christ. He wasn’t satisfied with just persecuting the Christians in Jerusalem, but it was his desire to follow them to the ends of the earth if need be, to lay hold on them, and to cast them in prison or worse.

Many Christians had fled from Jerusalem because of the severe persecution in Jerusalem. Saul wanted to track them down and all of them punished, because of their turning away from the Jewish Religion to Christianity.

Verse 4. “And he fell to the earth and heard a VOICE saying unto him, Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me? And he said, Who art Thou Lord? And the Lord said, I am Jesus Whom thou persecutest. It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks. And he trembling and astonished said, Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do? And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do.

Jesus said to Saul, “It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks.” This was a reference to the use of a goad, or a stick with a metal point on it, to guide an ox to the place intended for it to go. Sometimes oxen would kick against the pricks and kick out the goad, which only resulted in additional and deeper jabs with the goad. The more the ox rebelled the more it suffered.

“And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do.”

Acts 9:9. “And he was three days without sight, and neither did eat nor drink.” His physical eyes were blinded but his spiritual eyes were being opened by God.

Acts 9: 10. “And there was a certain Disciple at Damascus, named Ananias; and to him said the Lord in a vision. Ananias. And he said, behold I am here Lord. And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the street which is called Straight, and enquire in the house of Judas, for one called Saul, of Tarsus.

Then Ananias answered, Lord, I have heard by many of this man, how much evil he hath done to thy saints at Jerusalem: But the Lord said unto him, go thy way; for he is a chosen vessel unto Me, to bear My Name before the Gentiles, and Kings, and the children of Israel: For I will shew him how great things he must suffer for My Name’s sake.”

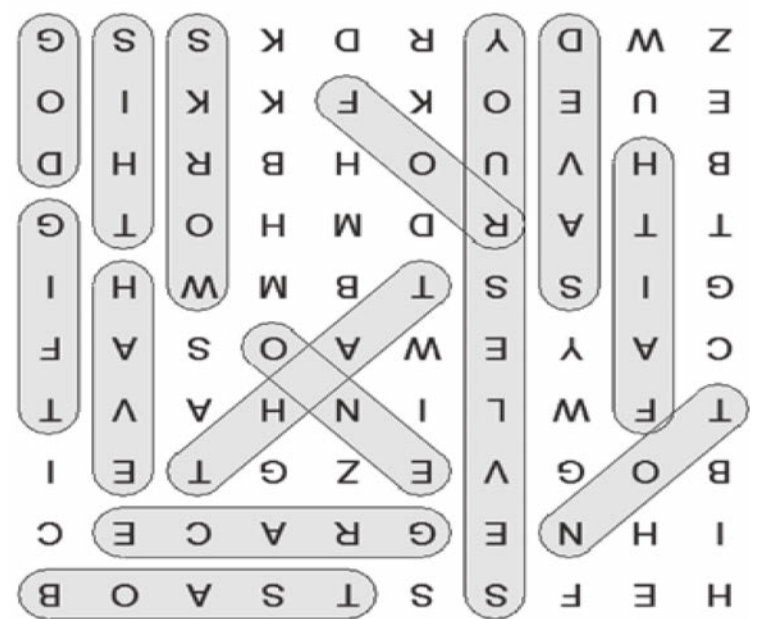
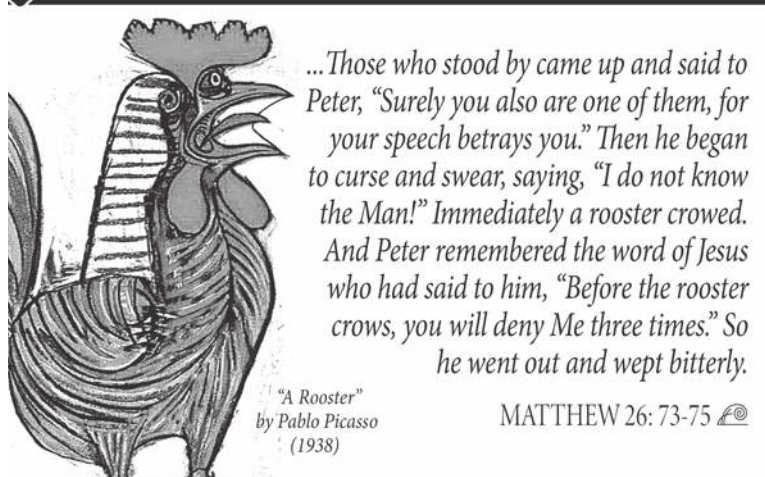

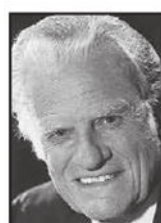
Peace comes from God alone

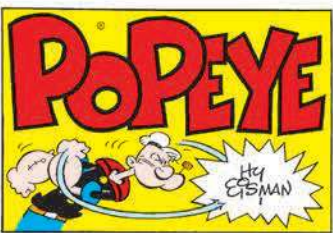

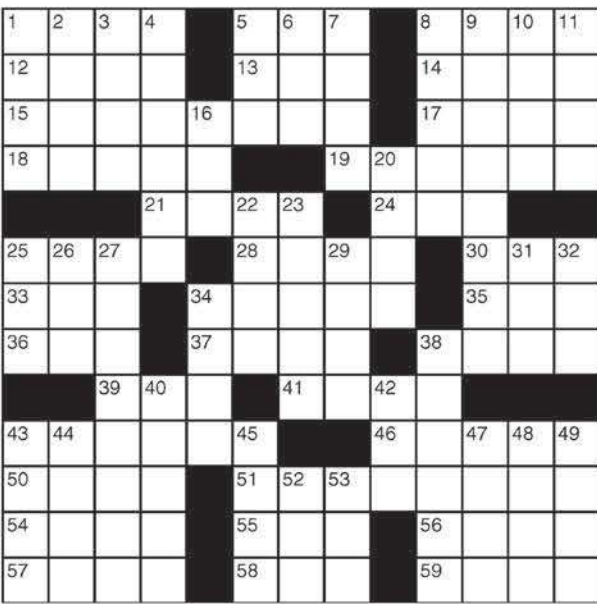



PCHS CTE program opens new welding lab

Pulaski County Public Schools

The Pulaski County High School Career and Technical Education Center held a very special ceremony Wednesday, March 2, to cut the ribbon and officially open a new state of the art welding lab that will be a great benefit to the students.

Welding, which is one of 27 programs in seven different career fields offered by the CTE department, has been a very popular program through the years and has seen consistent growth.

“We are allowed to have 20 students maximum in a Welding class at a time,” Megan Atkinson, Director of CTE and the Governor’s STEM Academy said. “This year, we have 95 who were able to be in Welding I, II, and/or III. Due to the popularity of the class, we pay Mr. Petty to teach an additional block each year. We’ve done that for the past four years to meet the demand of student requests.”

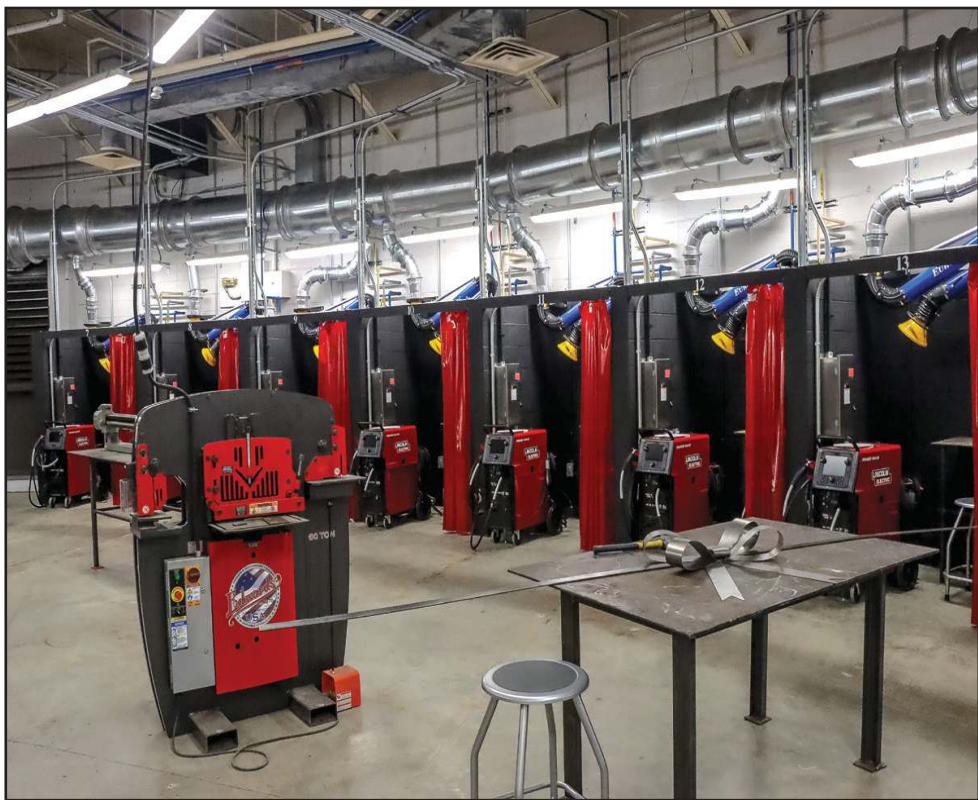
“Students who complete the welding program through Welding III complete their SENSE, Entry-Level Welder Certification through the American Welding Society,” Mrs. Atkinson said. “Mr. Petty, our instructor, is a CWI (Certified Welding Inspector) and is an adjunct instructor at New River Community College. The students who complete this program are prepared to enter the workforce and hold a good paying job right out of high school.”

According to Indeed, local Entry Level Welders in this area start out around \$15 per hour, but that can also go up to as much as \$26 per hour. With a high demand for skilled workers at many local companies such as Volvo, a student who is certified and with a solid work ethic can make even more.

The new welding lab, which houses 20 booths for students to work in separately, has been a project in the works for several years.

“The new welding lab/switchgear replacement project for PCHS CTE has been on the capital improvement plan list for around six years now,” Chris Stafford, Assistant Superintendent for Finance and Business Operations said. “In the summer of 2016, when I served briefly as acting superintendent, Mr. Petty and I, along with some members of the School Board and Board of Supervisors, toured the Giles County CTE Center to look at their state-of-the-art welding lab. It was after this tour that Mr. Petty’s vision was added as a priority on our capital improvement plan and it took this many years to work through other capital projects and save the necessary funds to make this a reality.”

The total cost of the lab was \$1,030,764. That included \$212,487 for the new welders and stools and \$818,277 for other expenses in the lab and the new switchgear. Money for this project was taken from the school system capital improvement fund. Local businesses also offered some assistance with the project. Imperial donated the metal that our students used to fabricate all of the tables for each welding booth. NRCC supported the effort as well. The drill press and band saw currently in the shop are on loan from the col-

lege.

In addition to welding, which falls under the Trade and Industry Program with Automotive Body Technology, Automotive Technology, Building Management, Carpentry, Cosmetology, Criminal Justice, Electricity, and TV/Media Production, the PCHS CTE Program also offers a wide variety of other programs.

In Agriculture Science, students can focus on Animal Science, Horticulture, or Agriculture Production. In Business and Information Technology, student can take Accounting, Computer Information Systems, Computer Programing, or Cybersecurity.

Family and Consumer Sciences offers Culinary Arts, Early Childhood Education and the Virginia Teachers for Tomorrow program. Heath and Medical Sciences offer Nurses Aid, Pharmacy Technician and Sports Medicine. Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) will be offered beginning next year. Marketing offers Marketing class-

es and opportunities. Technology Education offers Engineering, Manufacturing, and Robotics.

Each of these courses offer students a chance to earn industry certifications or licensing before they even graduate high school. The CTE program also works to find students internships with local businesses to help students

gain real world work experience in their chosen professions.

PCHS junior Danielle Bolling, a welding student who recently placed third in the SkillsUSA welding competition who assisted with the ribbon cutting and is serving as an intern for Mr. Petty, spoke at the event.

“I plan to take Welding III next year,” she said. “Upon graduation, I plan to continue my education at NRCC and enter the industry and develop my skills further with the goal of one day becoming a welding teacher. I am most excited about the new welding lab because it will allow more space for one-on-one instruction. This lab will also give more students an opportunity to weld in a much safer environment. We’ll get to use state-of-the-art Lincoln welding machines that will allow us to practice all three welding processes using one machine. This new lab will greatly enhance our students’ opportunities to learn and we’re excited for you all to see our new shop.”

Before leaving, Mrs. Atkinson surprised Bolling by presenting her with her medal from the recent SkillsUSA competition. She also commented that upon the retirement of Mr. Petty, she hoped to see Bolling back at PCHS as the Welding Teacher.

As for the ribbon cutting at the welding lab, it seemed only appropriate for Mr. Petty to cut the metal ribbon with a torch. The ribbon will now be displayed at the lab to commemorate the event.

After the ribbon was officially cut, community members and leaders toured the lab. Refreshments were provided by the Culinary Arts Department.

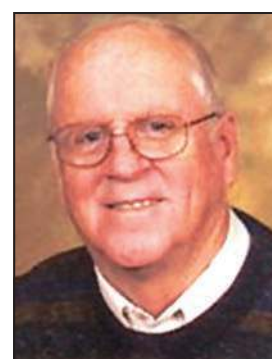

The Walleye, A Unique Fish

When I grew up on Little Creek, I had a couple of great fishing buddies, Jim & Pete Deck. We fished the “CREEK” for its many fish most notably: perch, chub, Horney heads, redeyes and smallmouth bass and hooked white and hog suckers with treble hooks and ate them as well. Their dad, Alvin, an avid fisherman in his own right, also fished the “CREEK” and the New and Claytor Lake on weekends. There were bottom lands that overflowed during heavy rains that left washed out ponds that teemed with perch. We often seined these to furnish Alvin minnows that he took to the New and/or Lake. I recall one occasion where Alvin and his buddies had a great week-end of fishing and gave my family a part of these walleyes and we enjoyed a few meals that were out of this world.

Sander vitreus is the scientific name of the walleye and a very unique fish of the New River. John Copeland, a biologist, of the Virginia Department of Resources is working to ensure the walleye species thrives for all anglers to enjoy catching and dinning on as well. Since 2000, he has worked to improve the strain through selective breeding by collecting stock in the spring and raising their young from this unique fish. Wes Billings is another WDWR Conversation Officer who is doing much along the same lines as Copeland. He as Copeland, is using genetic testing to insure they are the native strain of walleyes and raising fry and bringing them back and stocking them.

out from any other found in the world today. They grow into a very large fish. Two fishermen are noted for the largest caught on record on the New. In December, Tom Duncan, in December 2000, caught one weighing in at over 15 pounds and is a state record; Roy Barrett in August 1973, landed a whopper at 22 and ½ pounds. According to some of the expert professional walleye anglers and biologists, they believe that with the favorite climate of Virginia and the unique genetics of this fish, we could see someday a world record of over 25 pounds.

I have recently tied the streamer that was introduced by Matt Reilly, the Muskie and small mouth guide of the New River at the 13th of January at the old Newport School. I feel it would be a great lure to be used to catch some trophy Walleyes along with other favorites used by anglers on the New & Claytor. Do not fish for these without using a wire leader as their teeth will easily sever a standard leader. The Lord Jesus was a great fisherman, but he was not only the son of a carpenter, but the Son of God, who called his first four disciples (brothers Peter and Andrew and two other brothers, James and John) to be fishers of men. John

21:6KJV states “Cast the net on the right side of the ship, and ye shall find. ACC Unveils 2021-22 Men’s Basketball Awards

BROOKLYN, N.Y. (theACC.com) – Wake Forest graduate guard Alondes Williams has been chosen as the Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year and Demon Deacons head coach Steve Forbes is the ACC Coach of the Year, highlighting the 2021-22 All-ACC Men’s Basketball Team and award winners.

The 2021-22 All-ACC Team was determined by a 78-member panel consisting of the league’s 15 head coaches and 63 members of the media.

Duke earned two season awards, as forward Paolo Banchero was tabbed ACC Rookie of the Year, while sophomore center Mark Williams earned Defensive Player of the Year honors. Florida State freshman guard Matthew Cleveland received Sixth Man of the Year laurels, while NC State redshirt sophomore guard Dereon Seabron claimed ACC Most Improved Player honors.

This marks the 11th time a Demon Deacon has earned ACC Player of the Year honors and the first since Josh Howard in 2003. A native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Williams averaged 19.3 points, 6.7 rebounds and a league-high 5.3 assists per game in the regular season in his first season at Wake Forest. Entering the ACC Men’s Basketball Tournament, he is just one point behind Syracuse’s Buddy Boeheim for the ACC scoring lead and has the potential to finish the season

as the first player in league history to lead the league in scoring and assists.

In just his second season at Wake Forest, Forbes is the first Demon Deacons head coach to win ACC Coach of the Year honors since Skip Prosser in 2003 and the eighth all-time. Forbes has led Wake to a remarkable turnaround, with the Demon Deacons going from a 6-16 record (3-13 ACC) last season to a 17-win improvement and a 23-8 record (13-7 ACC) and fifth-place conference finish this year. The Deacs were projected to finish 13th in the preseason media poll. Wake Forest’s 13 ACC wins match its most in program history.

Banchero ranks second nationally in scoring among all freshmen this season with a 17.1 points per game average. The native of Seattle is sixth overall in the ACC in scoring and fourth in rebounding (7.7). He also owns eight double-doubles, fourth among all ACC players. He is the fourth Blue Devil in the last five years to win the Rookie of the Year award, joining Marvin Bagley III (2018), Zion Williamson (2019) and Vernon Carey Jr. (2020).

Williams led a Blue Devils defense that was the ACC’s best in field-goal defense (41.3%), three-point defense (30.2%) and blocked shots (5.5/game) this season. A native of Virginia Beach,

Virginia, Williams topped the ACC in blocked shots per game (2.81).

Cleveland is the fourth straight Seminole to earn Sixth Man of the Year honors, joining Mfiondu Kabengele (2019), Patrick Williams (2020) and Scottie Barnes (2021). The freshman from Atlanta averaged 11.4 points and 4.6 rebounds in 28 games (20 off the bench).

Seabron averaged 17.3 points and 8.0 rebounds this season. His scoring output has improved by 12.1 points per game from the 2020-21 campaign, the best improvement among any ACC player. A native of Norfolk, Virginia, Seabron ranks fifth in the league in scoring and second in rebounding. He owns 11 double-doubles, second most in the ACC.

County announces Experiential Center to display assets

PULASKI COUNTY, VA – Pulaski County announces Experiential Center project that will creatively and strategically showcase the County’s assets and resources.

Due to COVID-19’s economic impact, the project aims to recognize and elevate Pulaski County’s untouched economic potential and Pulaski County’s assets, including education, industry, housing, health systems, lifestyle and outdoor recreation.

“It is essential that we differentiate ourselves from other communities that compete in our market for available talent and investments,” said Jonathan Sweet, Pulaski County Administrator. “It is now more important than ever that we enhance our assets and innovation marketing sales methods to be a winner in this highly competitive post-COVID environment.”

Pulaski County’s Experiential Center will serve as a one-stop-shop resource and sales center for residents, developers, investors, employers and visitors. The Center aims to celebrate and serve the Pulaski County community by celebrating all aspects of the Pulaski County community as well as the County’s future.

“The number one commodity of the 21st Century is people, and people are what is going to make our economy strong, our community sustainable and our future prosperous,” Sweet said. “Thus, we need to utilize every strategic approach to showcase all the exceptional elements of the County and grow to a healthy and favorable population of 40,000 by the year 2030.”

The Experiential Center will be located at Pulaski County’s current Visitor Center located in Dublin off of exit 98 on I-81.

“Our building is beautiful and enriched with Pulaski County pride, but it is underused,” said Peggy White, Pulaski County

Tourism Director.

Pulaski County built the Visitor Center in 2002 and saw its peak in 2009 with 12,000 visitors. By 2018, visitors declined to 6,000 with the influx of technological advancement and online resources. With COVID-19 and online reservation systems, the Visitor Center has declined to 495 visitors per year.

“What some see as the end of an area, we see as the beginning of an opportunity,” White said.

Visitor Centers across the commonwealth are shutting down or reinventing themselves due to lack of utilization and online trends. Various visitor centers across the New River Valley have shut down in recent years.

As the Pulaski County Experiential Center idea developed, Pulaski County leadership experienced a similar project first-hand at the VDEP’s Talent Accelerator in Richmond. That encounter grew excitement and initiative among leadership when they saw what a synergistic approach could do to promote, grow and serve Pulaski County.

“The Experiential Center will position Pulaski County with the unique ability to showcase all the assets we have to offer under one roof,” said Bill Cunningham, Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce President and Pulaski County Economic Development Authority Board Member. “This concept along with all the other forward-thinking projects we have in our County will provide us the opportunity to become a next-level rural community.”

The Experiential Center project and transformation will begin in Spring 2022.

The transformation aligns with Pulaski County’s strategic plan and future housing and lifestyle developments.

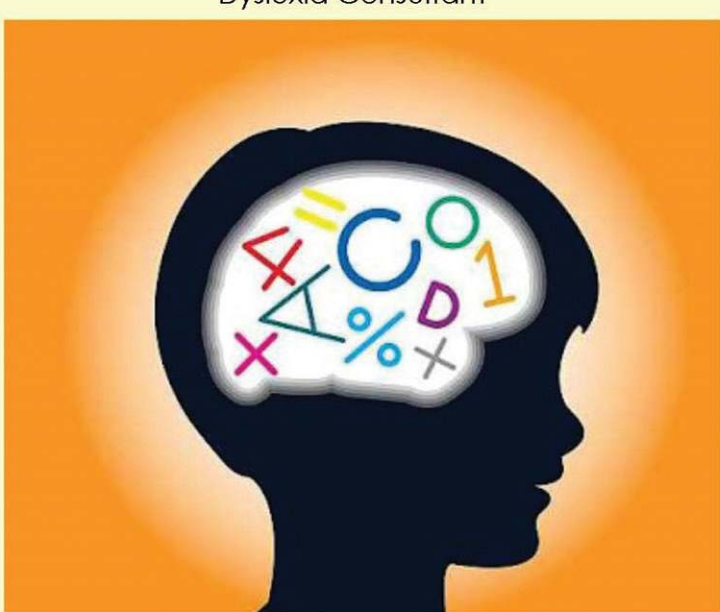

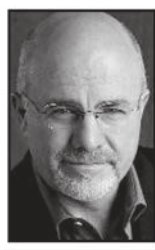


AD&D Insurance? No, thank you

Dear Dave,

My wife and I both work, and we have been looking at level term life insurance policies. A friend says it would be a good idea for us to have accidental death and dismemberment insurance, too. Do you agree?

Dear Aiden,
You both definitely need good level term life insurance policies. Stick with 15- to 20-year level term life insurance, and make sure that coverage is separate from anything provided by your employer.

Each one of you needs 10 to 12 times your yearly income wrapped up in a policy. If you make \$50,000 a year, that means you need a policy with \$500,000 to \$600,000 worth of coverage. The idea of life insurance is to take the place of income. If you or your wife died, the other could invest the insurance money and replace that lost income.

You do not—I repeat, not—need accidental death and dismemberment (AD&D) insurance. These policies are cheap, but they're pretty much worthless because of the long list of conditions they won't pay out for. Most pay out only a small portion in cases of dismemberment, and many won't pay a death benefit if you die from a medical procedure, health-related issue or drug overdose. The devil's in the details, and AD&D policies are chock-full of them.

If you have long-term disability insurance in place, which is what I

recommend, you can be covered for a substantial part of income lost due to an injury or disability. One study says 25% of today's 20-year-olds will become disabled by age 67. In my mind, those odds are way too high for you to skimp on long-term disability insurance—especially when it's very affordable in most cases. If you're in your prime income-earning years, a permanent disability could derail your dreams of homeownership, paying for your kid's college or having a dignified retirement.

I hope this helps, Aiden!

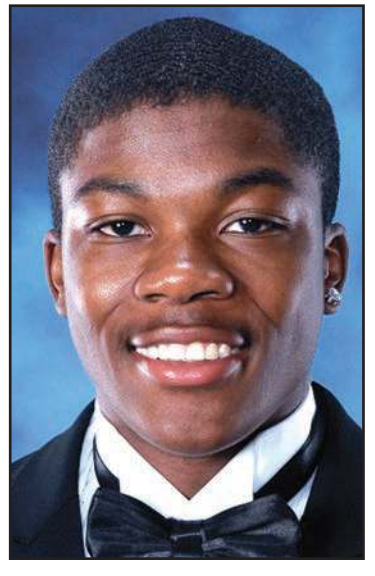
