Fate of SW VA Governor's School remains undecided

A November 3rd article published in the Patriot revealed that Pulaski County Public Schools will no longer provide a location for the Southwest Virginia Governor's School nor will PCPS serve as Fiscal Manager for the SWVA Gov School.

According to the PCPS administration, the primary reason for divesting in the SWVA Governor's School was financial, as Superintendent Dr. Kevin Siers was unable to convince other school systems sending students to the school to help pay for a roof repair at the old Northwood Elementary School where the school is housed, costing \$150,000. Siers also listed the time and effort associated with acting as the SWVA Gov School Fiscal Agent, as a reason to divest.

Since then, both alumni and others associated with Gov School have voiced their concern about this course of action, which was done without any formal an-

Heart Winery, graduated from the SWVA Gov School in 2003, when it was still located at Pulaski County High School.

"I had a fantastic experience with the Southwest Virginia Governor's School," said Farris. "I think that promoting accelerated education for our bright children is a priority ... or should be a priority in the county. There's an opportunity for Pulaski County to shine in that regard to say, 'Look, not only are we paying for this, but we're happy to pay for this."

The SWVA Governor's School admits intellectually advanced students who attend high school in Pulaski, Montgomery, Wythe, Smythe, Floyd, Carroll and Giles nouncement and with no public Counties as well as Radford and Galax cities. Students attend the

Adam Farris, owner of Iron Gov School in the morning and then commute to their local high schools for afternoon classes. SWVA Gov School curriculum is weighted toward courses in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM). The courses are highly advanced and the homework load is more than substantial, which reflects the complexity of their studies.

> According to Giles County Superintendent Terry Arbogast, who acts as the Superintendent-In- Charge at the Governor's School, no decision has yet been reached as to where the SWVA Gov School campus will be in the fall of 2023.

Frank said the clinic, located at 25 4th Street, N.W. in Pulaski has the capacity to serve between 500 and 600 patients.

She added the Free Clinic is in a unique position regarding continuity of care.

"What we can do that no other clinic or doctor's office can do is, say you're working and have Medicaid. We'll see you. Then you get a raise and no longer qualify for Medicaid. We'll still see you and continue to keep you healthy," Frank said.

"Pulaski is trying to revitalize itself and the health care of our citizens, I think, should be at the top" of the list of priorities, Frank continued, especially for those who are below a certain income level.

"We've got a 38-year track record of people loving us and wanting to be here [as patients]. It's a win-win for everybody."

Frank says, looking into the future of the clinic, "the same way we've undertaken to fill the gap in Pulaski right now with Medicaid, we also want to look at what are the other gaps?

"Obviously mental health, obviously routine dental, maybe women's health. We don't know exactly yet what we are looking forward to doing. But as we possibly can, we want to be the hub of healthcare in Pulaski. We want to fill whatever gaps are remaining," Frank said.

She and Board President Jim Kelly noted the clinic – an independent non-profit organization - has enjoyed wonderful support from both the Town of Pulaski and Pulaski County, as well as from the Virginia General Assembly, a variety of foundations and from donors since it began in

All of them, Frank said, are supportive of the clinic's addition of service to those county residents with Medicaid.

About the Pulaski Free Clinic

It's mission is "to provide quality healthcare to uninsured adults and those with Medicaid in Pulaski County, Virginia."

The Pulaski Free Clinic was founded in 1986 by community leaders who believed that everyone has the right to health care.

Lawmakers asked to amend spending to address education

BY MADISON HIRNEISEN

(The Center Square) - Virginia lawmakers are being asked to amend their proposed spending my proposed budget," Youngkin plans to address an error with a whole the calculation tool, that will result Center Square. I am requesting in schools across the state receiving millions less in state aid than they initially expected.

The Virginia Department of Education confirmed this week a calculation tool estimating the amount of state funding each school division will receive had an error. The tool did not account for funding changes after the state cut the grocery sales tax on Jan. 1, according to Charles Pyle, director of communications for the Virginia Department of Ed-

This error, which the department discovered last week, overstated the amount of state aid school districts could expect to receive by roughly \$201 million, as first reported by Richmond Times-Dispatch. The Virginia Department of Education expects to release an updated and corrected calculation tool next Thursday, Pyle told The Center Square.

"School divisions have used the estimates for local decision making, for local decisions about spending as we move through the current fiscal year," Pyle said. "They've used these estimates in developing their local budgets for presentations to school boards for the upcoming fiscal year, so it's certainly had an impact at the local level."

They based their budgeting on these flawed estimates," Pyle later added.

The error has provoked concern from lawmakers, particularly as the House and Senate are set to unveil proposed amendments to the state budget Sunday afternoon. Wednesday, Gov. Glenn Youngkin sent a letter to the chairs of the Senate Finance and House Appropriations committees asking them to include the "necessary resources" in their proposed budget amendments to

address the error. "This situation is frustrating

for us all and even more so that it came to light after I submitted

that as you finalize your budget amendments this week that you include the necessary resources to address this error." Once the House and Senate introduce their proposed budget

amendments, negotiators will meet to iron out modifications to the budget, which will now likely include conversations about how to best address the state calculation error related to school funding. Gianni Snidle, a spokesperson

for the Virginia Senate Democratic Caucus, told The Center Square Thursday "Democrats are going to ensure we fix this error caused by the Youngkin administration and ensure our public schools are fully funded."

Snidle said he expects lawmakers to debate Youngkin's proposed \$1 billion in tax cuts alongside school funding. Republican lawmakers have pointed to the state's \$3.6 billion budget surplus as an indication Virginians are overtaxed, while Democrats have said they don't view it as a budget surplus since schools have been underfunded since the Great Re-

As lawmakers meet to negotiate budget modifications, Snidle said he expects to "see a big battle between corporate tax cuts and fully funding our schools, teacher pay raises and cutting taxes for the wealthiest Virginians.

"That's where I think the real battle is and where these funds [for schools] are going to come from at

the end of the day," Snidle said. Del. Barry Knight, chair of the House Appropriations Committee, testified on the floor Wednesday that the amended budget intro-

Start young for tasting experiences

The first three years of a child's life will shape and pave the foundation for many different life behaviors. Those first three years determines a child's attachment style, emotional intelligence, food preferences and interest in literacy and learning.

These factors also can come full circle to either positively or negatively impact our health over a lifetime. According to research, children who have early exposures to fruits, vegetables, whole grains and varying proteins (i.e. beef, chicken, nut, beans, tuna) tend to choose and follow healthier eating patterns throughout adulthood.

Typically, complementary foods are introduced around six months of age, and this is a prime time to introduce nutrient-dense foods including leafy greens, sweet potatoes, avocados, bananas, pureed and cooked lean meats, mashed beans, and many more! These nutrient-dense foods are not only loaded with vitamins and minerals, supporting brain development and physical development; but they also help set up a path for taste buds early in life. Babies and toddlers who are regularly given fruits and vegetables are positively influencing their taste bud preferences, therefore leading to more adventurous eaters in childhood and beyond.

Some great pieces of advice that have come from parents and nutrition experts combined include the following:

First, never force a food, only encourage - this establishes a child's trust with the parents and takes the fear out of trying new foods. Encourage new foods but

Second, always try to have a fruit or vegetable on the plate at each meal time. Even if they don't eat it, it becomes a familiar food over time by just being on the plate; and familiar foods feel less scary to our little ones. Third, use fun, descriptive words to talk about the foods at meal or snack time such as "crunchy carrots", "pillowy potatoes", "cheery cherries" and so on.

Lastly, remember that toddlers, children and even adolescents are watching how adults view certain

Committees: Schiff, Swalwell and Griffith

The 118th Congress is underway, and committee assignments for the term are just about finalized. A process that is usually pretty routine, committee assignments have gotten some attention over the past couple of years and especially in the past few days. For some, it's as it was before. For others, not so straightforward.

While I'm thrilled to share the welcome news of retaining my committee and subcommittee memberships and receiving additional responsibilities for this Congress, not everyone received such good news.

Some members, like Adam Schiff and Eric Swalwell, saw their committee responsibilities diminished.

Speaker Kevin McCadecided that he would remove the two members from the House Per-9th District manent Select Representative Committee on Intelligence, or

'Intel" Committee, for the 118th Congress.

Speaker McCarthy spoke with reporters recently explaining his decision to remove Schiff, the former Chairman of the Intel Committee, after Schiff falsely claimed for years that he had proof of Russia colluding with former President Trump. "What Adam Schiff did was use his power as the Chairman and lie to the American public, even the Inspector General said it... when we had a laptop, he used it before an election to play politics and said that it was false. He said it was the Russians when he knew differently. He knew the intel.'

McCarthy also spoke with reporters about his decision to remove Swalwell, who engaged in a relationship with a Chinese spy, one that gave the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) pause. "The FBI was concerned about putting a member of Congress on the Intel Committee that has the right to see things others don't because of his knowledge and relationship with a Chinese spy," McCarthy said. Saying further, "Swalwell can't get a security clearance in the private sector. I'm not going to give him a government security clearance."

The Intel Committee provides oversight of the United States Intelligence Community, a critical component of our country's national security. Members on the Committee are given access to very sensitive, classified information that other Members of Congress don't have access to.

Both Schiff and Swalwell's situations are concerning. When it comes to the national security of our nation, there is no playing politics.

Unlike, Nancy Pelosi's decision to break precedent by rejecting the proposed slate of Republicans for the January 6 "Select Committee" and hand-picking Republicans that would not disagree with her position, McCarthy's decision to not seat Schiff or Swalwell was not political.

Americans must and should have confidence that all Members of the Intel Committee can pass the high scrutiny needed to be privy to the most classified, sensitive information in the nation.

In my opinion, our nation is now safer because of Speaker McCarthy's decision to remove them from the Committee.

Meanwhile, I was again chosen to serve on the House Energy and Commerce Committee, which I have served on since first joining Congress

This term, I have been asked to chair Energy and Commerce's Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations. Misplaced faith in big government

While most of the public and media attention the past two years has been focused on high prices and inflation, these issues take second place over the public's top concern, which is big government, according to a new Gallup poll. Concern over the uncontrolled southern border is in

Gallup reports "the government ranks as the top problem for both Republicans and Republican-leaning independents (24 percent) and Democrats and Democrat-leaning independents (18 percent)." That last figure may come as a surprise to some as Democrats are often regarded, at least by Republicans, as the party of government.

We have heard much of this before. People claim to hate big government, its intrusiveness, the entire tax system, overregulation of businesses and further loss of confidence in it by many following the displays of ineptitude during the COVID-19 pandemic. There are more reasons to dislike big government, but these are some of the most prominent ones.

Some Democrats often reply to statements about people who claim to dislike big government by saying "You may say you hate it, but when you need it, it's there." It's a clever rejoinder, but it misses the point. Government is no longer limited. as the Founders intended. It is everywhere, including and increasingly in decisions we used to make for ourselves. If you are old enough to remember drinking out of garden hoses and riding bikes without helmets you know what I mean.

Cutting even the rate of spending increases, much less reducing actual spending, gets you slammed as uncaring about children and the poor. That has been a fraud perpetrated by some politicians to help preserve their careers in government, something else the Founders never intend-

ed. One suggestion for reducing the size and rising cost of government comes from Andrew Biggs, a senior fellow at the American Enterprise Institute. Writing in the Wall Street Journal, Biggs says this about Social Security, the largest federal spending program after Medicare: "Social Security is expensive because it's more than a safety net. The average new retiree in 2021 received an annual benefit of nearly \$21,000, 1.5 times the poverty threshold without counting their own savings.' The benefit will keep rising to \$59,234 by 2050. People with the highest incomes receive a monthly check, which is ridiculous. One no longer needs to be retired, as once was the case, to receive a government check.

Biggs writes that capping Social Security based on a person's savings and income would help reduce the national debt, though comprehensive reform is most needed.

The real problem is that too many Americans have come to rely on the government for what it was never created to do and less on themselves. Part of this is an outgrowth of the "entitlement mentality" that has turned government from a last resort to a first resource.

No modern president better addressed the dangers to personal and economic freedom than Ronald Reagan, who was part of a generation that endured the Great Depression and World War II. Some of his most famous quips were: "We who live in free market societies believe that growth, prosperity and ultimately human fulfillment, are created from the bottom up, not the government down." And "Government does not solve problems; it subsidizes them." And "I hope we once again have reminded people that man is not free unless government is limited. There's a clear cause and effect here that is as neat and predictable as a law of physics: As government expands, liberty contracts." That last one is the main point and it

is largely ignored by those who wish to keep on growing government, even as our liberties shrink.

The Trump-Biden embrace

America may not want a Trump-Biden rematch, but Donald Trump and Joe Biden sure do.

A CNN poll late last year showed that 6 in 10 Republicans and Republican-leaning independents want a different GOP nominee in 2024, and a roughly similar proportion of Democrats hope for a nominee other than Biden.

Not that either man is inclined to pay any attention.

Trump wants revenge against a president who humiliated him in 2020 and who, with an approval rating in the mid-40s, would seem ripe for the picking. Biden wants to run against a

persistently unpopular, controversy-plagued former president whom he beat once before and used to great effect as a foil in the 2022 midterms.

Trump's best argument is that his policies were better than Biden's.

Biden's best argument is that he's not Trump.

It's the weirdest, and most dispiriting, symbiotic relationship in politics. It's the career politician soaked in conventional politics versus the upstart developer with zero respect for rules. The establishmentarian versus the populist. Boring versus erratic. And ... unpopular versus unpopular, as well as, now that you mention it, old

If Biden stepped aside, Trump might feel a little less driven to run, whereas if Trump declined to run, Democrats would have to be much more nervous about how Biden would match up against a younger, less toxic

opponent. As it is, the weakness of each is a motivator and prop for the

Just consider: It's probably a good rule of thumb not to run a presidential candidate who's under federal investigation for mishandling classified documents. But does that rule hold when your candidate could well be running against another candidate also under federal investigation for mishandling

classified documents? Such are the imponderables that a potential Biden-Trump rematch presents. Both can point at the other and try to argue, in effect, "Hey, your special counsel investigation is much worse than my special counsel investigation."

Trump tucked into this debate in his characteristic fashion. In a Truth Social post, he mocked Biden for having classified documents "on the damp floor" of his "flimsy, unlocked, and unsecured" garage, whereas Mar-a-Lago is "a highly secured facility." (Of course, Biden famously insisted that his garage was locked -- he has a classic Corvette to protect, after all).

Biden's team and allies have made the opposite case that, in contrast to Trump, his mistakes were inadvertent and immediately reported to authorities. Regardless of the merits, there's no doubt that Biden's possession of classified documents materially assists Trump in his case; it might save him from indictment.

By the same token, Trump's

I will Love my Friends. I will hate no Man. I will forgive my enemies and pray to God for them. I will as much as in me keep all GOD's Holy Commandments."

The Puritan religion taught that it was necessary to be in a covenant relationship with God and with the people in their communities; and the children learned these foundational principles at home and in school.

Virginia Senate panel defeats abortion bans

(The Center Square) – A panel of Virginia Senate lawmakers voted down Republican-backed bills seeking to enact bans on abortion in the commonwealth last Thursday, including a 15-week ban backed by Gov. Glenn Youngkin.

The Senate Education and Health Committee voted to defeat a bill making it unlawful for physicians to perform an abortion after 15 weeks of pregnancy unless the life of the mother is at risk, or the pregnancy is as a result of rape

The committee also voted down a bill banning abortion unless the life of the mother is at risk, or if the gestational age of the unborn child is 20 weeks or less, and the cause of pregnancy is rape or incest with an "official police re-

committee would have limited capacity to experience pain until today we reaffirmed that there abortions to the second trimester and sought to abolish lawful abortion during the third trimester, unless the life of the mother is at risk. Under existing Virginia law, the state allows abortion through the second trimester, and only allows third trimester abortions when three physicians agree a continuation of the pregnancy is likely to result in the death of the pregnant individual or "substantially and irremediably" harm their mental health.

Republican lawmakers and Youngkin voiced support for restrictions on abortions after 15-weeks with certain exceptions, contending the bill would cut off abortion at the point "when a baby can feel pain." According to the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, "science conclusively establishes that Another bill defeated by the a human fetus does not have the after at least 24-25 weeks."

Democrats in the General Assembly have vowed repeatedly to block attempts to restrict abortion in the commonwealth. A win in a special election earlier this month flipped a Virginia Beach state Senate seat, bolstering the Democratic majority in the Senate.

"Despite Gov. Youngkin and his allies' relentless efforts to undermine our health and rights,

is no place for abortion bans in Virginia," Jamie Lockhart, executive director of Planned Parenthood Virginia, said in a statement. "All three of the dangerous anti-abortion proposals before this committee represented grave threats to Virginians' health and rights, and we are thrilled to now celebrate their defeat."

Continued from Page A6 possession of classified documents materially assists Biden in his case: the discovery of the documents in Biden's various unsecure locations may be a fiasco, but not one as drawn out and legally fraught as the Mar-a-Lago drama.

It's a little like both parties running candidates in the 1972 campaign who had authorized break-ins, or in a 1980 campaign who had presided over double-digit inflation.

Now, it's entirely possible that the second season of Trump versus Biden never makes it to production. Despite all signs indicating that he wants to run again, Biden might pull up short because he doesn't feel up for it. For his part, Trump has a significant chance of winning the Re-

publican nomination, yet it isn't a gimme, and it shouldn't help him that Biden and the Democrats so obviously want to run against him, just as they wanted to run against so many of his acolytes last November.

If the prospect of returning to 2020 is unappealing, look on the bright side: We never really left.

Trump has never let us forget that he lost to Biden (although he prefers to refer to it as getting the election stolen from him), while Biden has never let us forget that Trump is waiting in the wings.


Despite their enmity, both men want and need each other politically, whether that's what the country is interested in or deserves, or not.

Though not widely known, the decision to evict the SWVA Gov School from Northwood Elementary School building came several months ago, well before securing a new location for the Gov school.

Bill Hickam, who served on the SWVA Gov School Foundation board, only learned about PCPS divesting from the SWVA Governor's School through his contacts at Radford University, where he taught chemistry for 35

"The plan was to use the Chemistry Department at RU as part of the Governor's School for the other counties," said Hickam, who lives within sight of the Northwood Elementary School building. "When I talked to people about putting it in Radford, the people involved with it have no idea what they're talking about. They said they haven't told us beans so what are we supposed to do about scheduling?"

Years ago, Hickam and others suggested the SWVA Gov School be moved to Northwood Elementary School, which had fallen into disuse due to consolidation. In 2006, the SWVA Gov School moved from PCHS to Northwood. Bill and Lydia Hickam's daughter, Georgie, attended the SWVA Gov School.

No member of the Pulaski County School Board has replied to emails inquiring about the future of the SWVA Governor's school with Superintendent Siers referring all inquiries to the newly formed Public Relations Department, headed by David Gravely.

When asked if making necessary repairs to the Gov School building constitute an excessive financial burden on the finances of PCPS, the Public Relations Department simply replied, "yes."

Pulaski County Public Schools uses money from various sources for 'Capital Improvements,' which include building repairs. PCPS recently received \$16 million in COVID relief money from the Federal Government, 80% of which went to capital improvements.

In addition, a recently enacted tobacco tax puts upwards of \$600,000 in PCPS coffers for capital improvements each year. Millions of Federal dollars have been used to repair school buildings throughout the county but none of this money was allocated to fix the roof at Northwood Elementary School.

Each locality that participates in the SWVA Gov School program chooses how many students to send. In recent years Pulaski County High School has sent fewer and fewer students, whereas Giles County High School, which has about half the number of students as PCHS, sends 20 students to Gov School annually ... and more would like to attend. In 2017-2018 school year, Pulaski County sent 27 students to SWVA Gov. School. According to Phillips, nine PCHS students attended last year and only seven currently are enrolled

As mentioned, the new location Gravely also mentioned that of the Southwest Virginia Governor's School has yet to be determined. Early on, Radford University seemed to be the favored location but SWVA Gov School board members from southwestern localities objected because Gov School at RU would result in longer commute times.

Another possibility involves splitting the SWVA Governor's School into two campuses. In this scenario Gov School students would take classes at both NRCC and Wytheville Community College. This arrangement may include a virtual learning element for Gov School students.

Wythe County's wishes are

not to be discounted, as Wythe County sends more students to Governor's School than any other locality. Giles sends the second most with Montgomery County a close third. The Southwest Virginia Governor's School Board will decide on what form the Gov School will take at their next meeting on Wednesday, February 15.

As such, which courses and teachers will be available for classes next fall is yet to be determined.

"I can't guarantee who's going to be there," said Gov School Superintendent-In-Charge, Terry Arbogast. "It's going to be up to the teachers. If they split the sites then it's going to be whether they're up to traveling. The course load will depend on what teachers are available."

While attendance at SWVA Governor's School has declined in recent years, attendance at Dual Enrollment classes remains high. Since both can count for college courses, they are often considered to be equivalent but admissions requirements tell a different story.


A high school student who wishes to attend Gov School must score in the 90th percentile on PSAT/SAT, 500 or greater on SOL tests, as well as maintaining a very high grade point average, in math and sciences courses in particular. They must also collect recommendations from both teachers and counselors to

In the past, students wishing to enroll for dual enrollment classes had to score high on Virginia Placement Tests for English and plete but as of last year, these requirements were dropped and now a student merely needs to maintain a 2.5 grade point average in high school to take Dual Enrollment classes.

"I do think Governor's school is on a whole other level than Dual Enrollment classes," said Tyler Clontz. "At Gov School you have science fair projects to complete aside from your normal schoolwork and that's a multiweek experiment that you have to conduct yourself with papers to go along with it. One of my math professors went on to head the math department at Virginia Tech. Gov School is definitely a different experience and based on my knowledge, I'd say there's

nothing equivalent to it." Another unanswered question relating to Pulaski County Public Schools divestment from the SWVA Gov School, is what will become of the Northwood Elementary School building. According to the PCPS Public Relations department the fate of later time."

When Pulaski and Dublin Middle Schools became obsolete thanks to the construction of Pulaski County Middle School, PCPS donated these buildings to the county. The same might hold true for the Northwood Elementary School building but in that case, the county would have to either pay for a new roof or pay for the demolition of the building.

Another possibility is that after PCPS evicts the Governor's School, they may decide to move the school board offices from the bank building downtown to the Northwood Elementary School building. This could be justified by declaring that money saved on rent could then be used to repair the roof.

"It's about time for somebody to find out what's going on," said Hickam. "I'm uncomfortable with rats over there because somebody's got to fix the roof!"

Though many view divesting from the SWVA Gov School as being a major change in priorities, no official action, nor official announcement is forthcoming.

"The school board will not be voting on this issue," the PCPS Public Relations Department stated. "There never was a memorandum of understanding or

contract approved that would establish the terms and conditions of use for this facility,"

Whether the SWVA Gov School will secure a more ironclad contract with its new host is yet to be determined but if the agreement resembles the one maintained by PCPS and the Gov School, the the building will be "decided at a future of this singular secondary learning institution is seemingly uncertain. Will the SWVA Gov School be forced to change locations again going forward and more importantly, will there even be a Gov School 5 years in the fu-

> "I can't guarantee where we're gonna be five minutes from now," said Superintendent Arbogast. "I can't guarantee anything.'

> If the SWVA Gov School is moved to New River Community College, some, including Adam Farris, believe that it could turn out to be a positive for Gov School students. However, splitting the Gov School campus in two between Wytheville Community College and NRCC will necessitate longer commutes and the likely introduction of virtual learning classes, which are not generally well regarded in the teaching community.

> "Gifted children need to be stimulated and pushed so that they can flourish and become everything that they're capable of becoming and if you do not offer them that opportunity, then frequently they become bored and maybe even problematic," stated Adam Farris. "Everyone that I kept in contact with who attended Governor's School are all making waves in society. They're en-

gineers, architects, physicians, lawyers, vice presidents of international companies ... you name

"It was definitely a benefit," declared Tyler Clontz. "I went into college with 43 credits, most of which were from the Governor's School. I would have regretted it if I had the chance to do it and didn't do it."

'The kids do not attend Governor's School simply because they want college credits," said Farris. "There's a whole culture and there's a vibe at the school that is preparing them as a transitional stage before going into college. I hope my kids can attend Gov School. It was the highlight of my high school career."

According to Superintendent Arbogast, the SWVA Gov School board must come to a decision at the Feb. 15 meeting, so that the chosen college can prepare for the transition.

One thing is for sure, wherever the new location of the SWVA Governor's School will be, much effort will be necessary to make ready for the fall semester. What isn't clear is the logistics and costs involved, neither is it clear who will be teaching and what courses will be offered.

All of these uncertainties have now come to the fore, because PCPS could not find a way to pay for a new roof at Northwood School.



Bad half dooms Cougars vs. BBurg

The Pulaski County Cougars, playing and looking for a region berth, came out in the first half and played terrible at Blacksburg. The half proved to be the Cougars' downfall as they were beaten by the Bruins, 71-61.

How bad was the opening of the game? The Bruins found themselves up 13-0 before the Cougars could get on the score-

Tootie O'Dell hit a runner in the lane for their first bucket at the 2:51 mark of the opening

Blacksburg led 17-6 at the end of the quarter as the Cougars played hot potato with the ball. They committed eight turnovers and scored only six points.

The second quarter wasn't much better as the Bruins went into halftime with a 34-18 advantage over the visiting Cougars – 18 points and 15 turnovers with a region berth on the line.

It was a bad showing and Coach Tyler Cannoy used his entire roster trying to find someone that would handle, rebound, and defend the basketball.

The halftime message must have gotten to the players, however, as they would at least battle in the second half, but were still down, 52-35 after the third

The Cougars would cut the Bruin lead to seven, 58-51 with 3:28 left in the game. That was as close as they would get, though as the Bruins would hit 10 of 12 free throws in the last three minutes to salt the game away and all but eliminate the Cougars from

post-season play. "We didn't handle the ball, we didn't play defense and we didn't rebound the ball in the first half," said a disappointed and frustrated Cougar head coach. "We had almost as many turnovers as points for the first half. We are not talented enough to play like that and win games. We have to play hard all the time to compete and this team sometimes seems to not understand

that." When asked about the playoffs, Cannoy remarked, "Hey we have three games left in the regular season and once again we just need to play hard and see what happens."

Blacksburg placed four players into double figures. Chan-dler Montgomery and Wade Bland both contributed 16 points apiece. Spencer Campbell finished with 15 and Xavier Bland chipped in with 14. So, Montgomery and Xavier Bland combined for 30 points coming off the bench for the Bruins.

Pulaski County got a gamehigh 22 points from Lane Nester, with 16 of those coming after intermission. Kyle O'Neal knocked down 16 points with 12 of those coming in the second half.

The Cougars (5-14) scored 43 second half points and turned the ball over just six times in the second half. If only that Cougar team in the second half would have played in the first half.

The Cougars traveled to Salem on Thursday night and close out



CORAL GABLES, Fl. - Virginia Tech and No. 23 Miami provided onlookers another entertaining matchup on Tuesday night, as the Hurricanes used a late spark from Nijel Pack to down the Hokies, 92-83.

Sean Pedulla and Hunter Cattoor led Tech in what could be considered one of team's better offensive outings of the season. Both members of the backcourt pair accounted for 20 points apiece on 6-10 shooting. Grant Basile had his fifth straight game of double-digit scoring and seven-or-more rebounds 17 points and seven boards. Justyn Mutts added in 10 points with all coming in the second half.

Unfortunately for Tech, its explosive night on offense was matched by Miami. The Hurri-

canes' 58.3-percent shooting was their second best total of the season, while Miami's 42.1-percent outing from deep was noticeably above its season average entering the game (35.6-percent).





Sheriff, prosecutor provide details on fatal Baptist Hollow incident on Monday

from Sheriff Mike Worrell and Commonwealth Attorney Justin Griffith, of the Baptist Hollow Road incident from Jan. 30,

On Jan. 20, 2023, an employee from New River Valley Community Services was conducting a home visit to a client at a residence in the 6000 block of Baptist Hollow Road in the Hiwassee area of Pulaski County.

Shortly before 11:00 a.m., Pulaski County Joint Communications Center received the first of two 911 calls from the employee. The employee stated that he had been attacked by being stabbed multiple times by the client and proceeded to name the client.

Service was lost and the first call was disconnected.

The employee was able to call 911 a second time, and again stated that he needed help.

Deputies from Pulaski County Sheriff's Office arrived on scene during the course of the second call, and immediately evacuated the employee to safety and secured a perimeter around the residence.

After attempting several times to get anyone inside the residence to come out, entry was made into the residence, and the client was found deceased from wounds sustained in the altercation with the employee.

During the investigation, it was determined that the employee was aggressively attacked and stabbed multiple times. released at this time.

Updated joint press release The employee defended himself by fighting back and stabbed the client multiple times before being able to get off the front porch of the residence and to his vehicle.

When deputies arrived on scene, the employee was going in and out of consciousness due to blood loss from his wounds, and so they made the decision to use a Sheriff's Office vehicle to transport the employee to a nearby am-

From there, the employee was transported to a hospital in Roanoke due to the severity of his wounds.

It was felt that this was an isolated incident and there was no danger to the community at large, but out of an abundance of caution, the School Resource Officer at Snowville Elementary School was notified and extra patrols were conducted throughout the community during the course of the incident.

Pulaski County Commonwealth's Attorney Justin Griffith has said that due to the employee exercising his right to self-defense, it was a justifiable homicide, and no charges would be filed against him.

Sheriff Worrell would like to express his sincere thanks to Virginia State Police, Radford City Police Department, and Pulaski County Public Safety for their assistance over the course of this incident.

Lessons of Life From Solomon

Proverbs is one of the three wisdom books of the Bible. Solomon was one of the wisest men who ever lived, and in this chapter he gives us bits of wisdom concerning finances and various other things.

Finances are addressed in the bible in many places. Finances are an important part of our lives. The bible teaches us how to live our lives in the most beneficial way possible.

Proverbs 6:6-12. "Go to the ant, thou sluggard; consider her ways, and be wise: Which having no guide, overseer or ruler, provideth her meat in the summer, and gathereth her food in the harvest. How long wilt thou sleep? Yet a little sleep, a little slumber a little folding of the hands to sleep: So shall thy poverty come as one that travelleth, and thy want as an armed man. So shall thy poverty come as one that travelleth, and thy want as an armed man."

A sluggard is a lazy person. A slothful person. A slacker. A loafer. A shirker. A freeloader. So this scripture, first of all, is warning those who are too lazy to work that they will experience difficult times in finances.

Please indulge me as I refer to an old story about the ant and the grasshopper from Aesop's Fables. Although the story is only a fable, it teaches the virtues of hard work and planning for the future. I promise not to try to make this fable a part of the word of God, because it is not and never can be. I use it in this chapter because it does make a good point about the value of work.

The ant worked hard storing up food for a time when food wouldn't be growing. The grasshopper fiddled around, doing nothing to lay back food for times of a lean season. The grasshopper watched the ant at work, and laughed at the ant which was working. All the while he was singing his song, dancing, and fiddling his life away. When a season came around when food wasn't readily available, the grasshopper became very hungry and was about to starve to death. He begged the ant to give him some of the food the ant had stored away. The ant rebuked him for his idleness and basically told him, you sang and danced all summer long, so dance through the winter. The moral of the story is idleness brings want. If we will not work today, we are sure to hunger

The bible teaches us not to be slothful in business. Paul told some loafers in 2 Thes. 3: 11, 12, "For we hear that there are some which walk among you disorderly, working not at all, but are busybodies. Now them that are such, we command and exhort by the Lord Jesus Christ, that with quietness they work and eat their own bread."

Proverbs 20:4 says "The sluggard will not plow by reason of the cold: therefore shall he beg in harvest, and have nothing."

The ant knew that if it didn't work during the summer, it would have no food in the winter. It had no boss. It had no one to make it work. But what it did have was an instinct for survival that motivated it to work. The work ethic of the ant is an excellent one for us to follow.

"Consider the ways of the ant." An ant will climb precipitous walls, will venture into hazardous places, search barns, caves and gardens, often at their own peril, to lay up stores for themselves to draw from when the season of plenty expires.



We are to work to earn our own living, if we are able to work, and not allow ourselves to become a burden on others. If we lay around sleeping our lives away, while we should be out earning a living for ourselves and our families, we're going to end up in poverty.

Many make lame excuses for not working, such as the ones in Proverbs 26:13. "The slothful man says, there is a lion in the way: a lion in the streets. As the door turneth upon his hinges, so doth the slothful person upon his bed. The slothful hideth his hand in his bosom; it grieveth him to bring it again to his mouth. The sluggard is wiser in his own conceit than seven men that can render a reason."

We can convince ourselves of almost anything if we have a mind to do so. To me, there is no good excuse for being too lazy to work for a living.

Here's a flimsy excuse, "There's a lion in the streets." This example is of a man who is too lazy to go to work and his excuse is, there's a lion in the streets and if I go out there, he'll devour me. Lions live in the jungle, not in the streets or among civilized society. A weak excuse such as this to prevent one from working to earn a living, will lead to poverty.

Paul looked at a person who is too lazy to work as not being worthy of receiving food from others. "If a man will not work, neither shall he eat." (2 Thes: 3:10) Someone once said, "Some excuse is better than none." But I disagree. A lame excuse shows the senselessness of the person using it. He is even too lazy to think up a believable excuse. He is too feeble minded to know that others will not accept a lame excuse as a valid excuse.

I'm single, and I make \$35,000 a year. Next year, my salary and bonuses should be around \$50,000. I have a little over \$30,000 in debt right now, including student loans, and I'm not sure how I'll be able to keep up with bills and everything else right now if I have to save \$1,000 for a starter emergency fund like you recommend. Can I get by with a starter emergency fund of \$500?

Dear Jonas,

I really think you're making this whole thing sound a lot harder than it really is. They key is making and living on a budget, and that's not rocket science. It's a simple, written planning process where you give a name and a job to every dollar you make before the month begins.

Food, shelter, clothing, transportation and utilities are necessities, so they come first. After that, make sure you're current on your debts. Once all that is out of the way, put every spare dollar you can into your emergency fund. If you do this with a sense of urgency, and limit spending to necessities, you'll be surprised by how fast it will happen. And you'll love the newfound sense of security.

The truth is you really need a starter emergency fund of \$1,000 if you're at a point in life where student loans and other debts are in the picture. That may seem like an im-
