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PSA obtains Red Carpet Inn for new convenience center

The Pulaski County Public Service Authority has purchased the old Red Carpet Inn property on Old Route 100 outside Pulaski for the site of its newest convenience center.

Jared Linkous, Executive Director of the PSA announced the move Monday night during the February meeting of the Pulaski County Board of Supervisors.

The old motel will be demolished by county crews and the site will be transformed into the PSA's third convenience center.

Linkous explained that the PSA has for some time operated three convenience centers spread across the county (Dublin, Fairlawn and Pulaski on Dora Highway).

At the start of the year, when the Town of Pulaski went in a new direction for garbage pickup, the PSA lost the Pulaski center on Dora Highway, and Linkous said a search has been ongoing to find a way to "plug that gap" in convenience center service.

That search led the PSA to purchase the old Red Carpet Inn site

the Town of Pulaski.

He said the PSA has been in the process of cleaning that site up and is having lead and asbestos tested to determine if they will need to do an asbestos abatement process or go straight into the tear down.

He said if an abatement process is required after testing, a third party will be brought in for that work before demolition begins.

"It's exciting news to share," Linkous said, noting how the Red Carpet Inn site has fallen into disrepair in the last several years.

Linkous said in the 12 years he has been with the county the property has changed hands three times.

He explained the motel historically has operated its own sewage treatment system, discharging into a small stream near the site. He said each time the property has changed hands, the discharge limits have changed resulting in the motel no longer being able to operate its treatment system.

He noted that area does not have county sewer available.

"People buy this property at auction, then find out they don't have

sewer service there and then it goes

just off Routes 99 and 100 outside into a period of just sitting there, with lost revenue on the tax side, then they sell it again. That's gone on two or three times now," Linkous said.

> He explained the PSA, five or six years ago, had received two allocations of a half-million dollars for improvements to the Fairlawn and Pulaski convenience centers to make those sites resemble the Dub-

"The Dublin Convenience Center is the PSA's goal for what our convenience centers should look like," Linkous said. "We have high expectations for what the convenience centers will look like in our community and for them to really serve our community much better.'

Linkous said about half the residents on the south side of Claytor Lake will be able to more easily access the convenience center at Red Carpet Inn after crossing the Lighthouse Bridge.

"We're excited about it. We think it's a great opportunity. We think it serves many purposes for the community. It takes a building that has been deemed by our building officials and code department

Like the centers in Dublin and Fairlawn, the new one on Old Route 100 will be available for PSA customers to bring their large items and brush.

The PSA is developing a new bar code system, which will allow only PSA customers access to the sites. The bar code will be on PSA customers' bill.

Linkous said the convenience centers are funded totally by the PSA's residential customers.

Everything. His statement:

Throughout last year's campaign for Pulaski County Board of Supervisors and during my time in office, I have pledged to the citizens of the Cloyd District that I would represent them with openness, honesty, and above all, integrity.

In that spirit and as the Board of Supervisors is about to begin its budget process, I voluntarily sought an advisory opinion from Pulaski County Commonwealth's Attorney Justin Griffith to provide guidance on my involvement as it relates to the 2023-2024 county budget.

I have been fully aware that my employment with Pulaski County Public Schools would affect my involvement in the upcoming budget process, as it relates to school funding, until my retirement from the school system which will be effective June 30, 2023.

Based on my analysis, and it also being fully consistent with Mr. Griffith's advisory opinion, my role in the county's 2023-2024 budget process shall be as

1. I will not participate in Board of Supervisors discussions and activities that solely involve school funding requests while I remain an employee of the school

2. I will participate in Board of Supervisors budget discussions

and activities involving all nonschool budget related matters without exception.

3. I will participate in Board of Supervisors discussions and activities involving school budget related matters when such discussions and activities also include at least two additional entities (or the overall county budget) and that I will make all required disclosures concerning my employment prior to each such discussion and/or ac-

please contact me or the Office of the Commonwealth's Attorney.

Also, I wish to announce that in March and April 2023, I will be holding community meetings in the Cloyd District. The schedule with dates, times, and locations will be available soon. During Monday night's meeting of the Pulaski County Board of Supervisors - in honor of Black History Month - County Administrator Jonathan Sweet made a presentation on the life and works of Mary Sue Montgomery (1894-

In 1954, Sweet said, Montgomery erected a nursing home at 147 Magazine Street in Pulaski to serve the needs of the elderly and indigent of both races during the Jim Crow era.

Sweet read that Montgomery traveled to New York City to appear on "Strike it Rich," a game show that was broadcast on American radio and television.

Participants on the show answered four questions in an effort to win money for someone in need of medical treatment or some other

Montgomery competed on the nationwide program in an effort to raise funds to keep her nursing

"She answered all the questions asked during the show and received \$170," Sweet read. "She used the money to erect the steel for the first floor of a new cinderblock home that at the time was being built next to the existing

Montgomery was also honored as Pulaski's Woman of the Year by the Business and Professional

Woman's Club, Sweet added.

In announcing Ms. Montgomery's award, Mrs. George T. Carnahan – who won the award in 1952 – called Montgomery's work with her nursing home "a true monument of faith and love the county should be proud of."

In accepting her award, Montgomery said, "The people of Pulaski County are the most wonderful people on the face of the earth. They are the salt of the earth."

Sweet noted that Montgomery passed away in 1967 at her nursing

"She will be forever remembered as a beacon of service in Pulaski County," Sweet added.

UMGC now offers classes to military service personnel and their families at more than 180 locations in more than 20 countries. More than half of the university's students are active-duty military personnel.

Legislation I Have Filed So Far

I have hit the ground running in the new legislative session of Congress and will review a part of my agenda today. Obviously, over the two years of this Congress I will introduce more bills to best represent the people of the 9th Congressional District.

2nd Amendment

Last month, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF) finalized a rule to expand the definition of "short-barreled rifles", or barrels of less than 16 inches, to include any and every pistol that has an arm brace affixed to it. This arbitrary definition unfairly penalizes

competitive shooters and pistol enthusiasts generally. To counteract this invasive final rule, I have introduced the Home Defense and Competi-

tive Shooting Act, H.R.173, to remove all short-barreled rifle registration requirements under the National Firearms Act (NFA) of 1934.

I have also introduced legislation, H.R.168, to more comprehensively address interstate transportation of firearms or ammunition. My legislation allows individuals to securely transport a firearm or ammunition between two places (e.g., states) where it is legal to possess, carry, or transport a firearm, without fear of being harassed by an anti-second amendment city.

Health Care & Public Health

Americans need greater access to life-saving drugs. I have introduced legislation to ensure critical patient access to compounded medications when a drug is facing a shortage. The Patient Access to Urgent-Use Pharmacy Compounding Act, H.R.167, creates a regulatory pathway for certain compounding pharmacies to prepare medications for hospitals and physician offices if there's an urgent need or the drug is in shortage.

The opioid crisis continues to devastate families across the country, made worse by fentanyl and its analogues. I've introduced the Halt All Lethal Trafficking of (HALT) Fentanyl Act, H.R.467, to address the permanent scheduling of fentanyl analogues, while also granting researchers the ability to conduct studies on these substances and provide for exemption of individual analogues when evidence demonstrates it is appropriate.

The COVID-19 pandemic taught us that we can no longer be reliant upon foreign suppliers for personal protective equipment (PPE). Our national security and public health demand that we have a stable domestic supply of this equipment. The Domestic SUPPLY Act, H.R. 170, would direct the federal government to establish a domestic supply of PPE, require eligible domestic manufacturers to be headquartered in the U.S., manufacture in the U.S. 100% of the products they would supply, and be ma-

jority owned and operated by American citizens. Environment & Deregulation

In January, the Federal Register published the Biden Administration's final Waters of the United States, or WO-TUS, rule. This rule makes sweeping changes to the federal government's authority to regulate what's considered a navigable water, placing enormous burdens on small businesses, manufacturers, farmers, and private property owners. I have co-sponsored a House Joint Resolution, H.J.Res.27, to terminate the Biden WOTUS rulemaking through the Congressional Review Act (CRA), which provides a mechanism for Congress to overturn certain final agency actions.

Due to burdensome regulations from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the current New Source Review (NSR) program, originally meant to protect against pollution emissions from industrial facilities, discourages facilities from making upgrades that would ultimately lead to lower emissions. My New Source Review Permitting Improvement Act, H.R. 165, would reform these counterproductive rules so manufacturers, power plants, refiners, and others can make pollution-reducing upgrades to their facilities without running afoul of the EPA's misguided interpretation.

Government Reform

Democrats have made recent attempts to make the District of Columbia our nation's 51st state, saying residents are not properly represented. However, the Founders intended for our capitol to be on neutral ground, distinct and distinguished from the rest of the states. That's why I introduced H.R.980 to retrocede D.C. to Maryland, returning the residential areas of D.C. to Maryland, while leaving the National Capitol Service Area, the National Mall and federal buildings like the Capitol, as the District of Columbia. Retrocession would give D.C. residents representation in the federal government, while maintaining an independent federal district to conduct the nation's business.

There is still ample opportunity to introduce legislation to benefit the constituents of the Ninth District. If you'd like to provide feedback on the work we are doing or talk to us about legislation you'd like us to consider, each month my staff is available at various locations in the district, where constituents can receive help in person. Information on our traveling office hours is inside.

Foundational Principles

During the previous year, public school education has been a hot topic with differing opinions on whose values, type of curriculum and social ideaology should be taught. One criticism is that public education has been dummed-down compared to previous generations of students.

An example of this theory was presented by Christopher Hitchens in which he summarizes some facts. Fourth-grade students average age is 9-10 years old. 59 percent of 4th graders do not

know why Pilgrims and Puritans first voyaged to America.

68 percent of 4th graders can't name the first 13 colonies.

Several years ago, Lamar Alexander addressed this issue. According to him, the National Assessment of Education Progress reported that three-quarters of 4th, 8th and 12th graders are not proficient in civics knowledge, and one-third of them do not have basic knowledge, making one-third of our students "civic



illiterates."

Many of our Founders received what we would consider higher education at Harvard, Princeton or Yale which accepted students in their early teens. Some were accepted as early as 8-years old, but their parents deferred sending them until they reached 12-years. Students read through the Bible at an early age, memorized scripture to win contests, and were fluent in several languages before the age of 12. John Quincy Adams (when he was 11-years

Pay any price? Bear any burden?

"...we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe to assure the survival and success of liberty." – John F. Kennedy Inaugural Address Jan. 20, 1961

Those were simpler, though not less dangerous times. The Soviet Union was seen as America's number one enemy. China had not begun to challenge its position as the world's most powerful nation. Foreign policy then was mostly nonpartisan.

After a year of supporting Ukraine in its attempt to push back the Russian invasion and hold Vladimir Putin accountable for what Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has charged are war crimes, it's time to ask some hard questions.

First among them is, what is our goal? If it is not victory (and victory defined) what is it? Since America's last victory in World War II, we have been engaged in either stalemates or defeat. First in Korea, which to this day is still called a conflict that ended in a draw, resulting in more than 33,000 American battle deaths.

Then there was Vietnam, where 58,220 U.S. soldiers perished. We lost that one to the communist North. People still argue over the reason.

Iraq for a time seemed more of a success, but its government remains shaky. "Only" 4,487 American troops were killed in that war. The earlier Operation Desert Storm was less a war than a quick invasion to roll back Iraqi troops from Kuwait. In battle, 154 military personnel were killed and 65 died from nonbattle causes.

Afghanistan, America's longest war, saw more than 2,000 American service members killed. An additional 3,800 U.S. contractors lost their lives. Not only has the Taliban returned to rule, that war cost an estimated \$2 trillion, in addition to the expense of military equipment left behind.

And now Ukraine. No U.S. troops have been sent there (yet), but again, what is our goal? Is it victory and if not, what is it? Putin is a dictator, not responsive to voters. Once again, it's the United States that

is bearing most of the financial burden in a war that is sapping resources we don't have as our debt is now over \$31 trillion and counting with interest piling on daily. President Biden has promised another \$500 million in aid to Ukraine. Are there controls on this money? Will it be used for its intended purpose, or will it sink into the black hole that has been defined by the country's history of corruption?

There are strong arguments in favor of continuing to help Ukraine push back against Putin, but those arguments become weak if our intentions are not made clear and our military aid continues to resemble an installment plan.

Former Joint Chiefs Chairman General Colin Powell viewed the purpose of the military - certainly ours and it could be argued Ukraine's - as winning with overwhelming force. Former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger shared Powell's views in a 1984 speech in which Weinberger outlined what should be considered before American forces (and I would argue resources) are sent anywhere: "Vital national interests are at stake, the nation is prepared to commit enough forces to win, clear political and military objectives have been established, forces are sized to achieve those objectives, there is reasonable assurance of support of the American people and Congress.'

Most Members of Congress and a majority of the public continue to support Ukraine, though lately some bipartisan doubts have been raised along the lines I mentioned.

Where and when will it end? Putin clearly believes the U.S. will grow tired of the expense and draw back its support. President Biden has promised we will support Ukraine for "as long as it takes."

The president should explain the goal and in the meantime ask European nations to step up their aid to Kyiv.

Attacks on Nikki Haley

Only in 21st-century America can you call yourself the "proud daughter of Indian immigrants" and get accused of whitewashing your background.

For the left, the verdict is in and has been for a long time -- Nikki Haley is not Indian American enough.

The offenses of the former South Carolina governor are myriad, from using an easily pronounceable name to converting to Christianity, to once checking "white" on a voter registration card, to touting the value of hard work in getting ahead, to defending America against charges of racism.

This has subjected her to ignorant, highly personal, racially charged attacks.

The NAACP activist (and pastor!) Talbert Swan tweeted that she said say her "real" name and asked if she's too afraid of "white folks" to do it.

This is long-running criticism. When Haley came on an episode of "The View" last year, Sunny Hostin asked derisively, "What is her real name again?" Hostin, whose given name is Asuncion, called her a "chameleon" and remarked that it might be different "if she leaned into being someone of color."

This is dumb and ill-informed. As a USA Today fact-check noted, Haley's name at birth was Nimrata Nikki Randhawa. Rather than being a westernization, "Nikki" is a common nickname in Punjab, where her parents are from. She used the name Nikki since she was young, and then took the last name of her husband Michael Haley, in what is still the common practice in the

All that aside, the Hostin critique gets to the bottom of the real indictment of Haley from the race obsessives -- she's not obsessed with race enough. Or, as "South Asian American experts" cited by NBC News put it, she has "an on-and-off relation-

ship with their Indian identity."
What does "on-and-off" mean except that, while expressing pride in her background, she doesn't let it wholly define her? In what world is this not a healthy, well-adjusted attitude?

Was her announcement video, which did acknowledge the difficulties of growing up as an Indian American in the South Carolina of that time, supposed to be a screed about all the terrible things that have been done to her by the country her parents chose to come to?

The answer for her woke critics is basically "yes." Again and again, critiques of Haley mention that she's perpetuating the "model minority myth," by which they mean she extols up-from-the-bootstraps hard work instead of painting a picture of immigrant futility in a fundamentally racist country.

The other charges against Haley are as meritless. She reportedly checked "white" on a voter registration card more than 20 years ago. Apparently, the card only offered the options of white, Black/African American, Asian, Hispanic, Native Ameri-

Variety of bills on way to the Governor

(The Center Square) - Virginia lawmakers in the General Assembly wrapped up a sprint of a 46-day session over the weekend, gaveling out after culling legislative proposals and forwarding off measures to the governor's desk.

Lawmakers in the politically-divided General Assembly spent weeks this session discussing and debating myriad issues ranging from regulations for electric utilities to proposed tax cuts. While the session was marked by contentious debates on several headline issues, including guns and abortion, lawmakers did find bipartisan consensus on a range of issues.

According to Lt. Gov. Winsome Sears' office, the General Assembly passed 1,687 bills out of the 2,863 introduced. Here's a look at a few of the bills sent to Youngkin's desk this legislative session.

REGULATIONS ON HEMP PRODUCTS

Lawmakers in both the House and Senate voted in favor of a bill that will set tighter regulations on sales of hemp-derived products, which include THC - the main psychoactive chemical from the cannabis plant that gives users the feeling of "high."

The bill specifically outlines that anyone who manufactures or sells an "industrial hemp extract"

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or food containing an industrial hemp extract must obtain a permit from the state. Additionally, the bill limits those products to containing up to 0.3% THC and no more than 2 milligrams per package. A person could be fined up to \$10,000 per day for violations.

The proposal also lays out specific labeling and packaging requirements for products or food containing an "industrial hemp extract," including that the ingredients contained in the product are "in a font no less than 1/16th of an inch."

The bill does not move the state closer to establishing a retail market for sales of marijuana. While marijuana was legalized in Virginia in 2021, the state still has yet to set up a retail framework for legal sales.

Proponents of the bill to regulate hemp products argued it is a key step to regulating the industrial hemp market and protecting Virginians – particularly children and teens. The bill was introduced following reports of children becoming sick after eating gummies without knowing they were infused with Delta-8 THC.

"I would emphasize that this is an important bill in that we are witnessing a proliferation of these products - primarily these hemp-derived products that are synthetic in nature - that are

Lessons learned from the 'One Bag Challenge'

The weather on the last Wednesday of February, 2023 turned out to be unseasonably warm with temps in the 60's. This spate of fair weather prompted Gina Paine, my wife, to strongly suggest that we take up Pulaski County's One Bag Challenge, which asks the citizenry to pick up at least one bag of roadside litter for the betterment of the community.

I couldn't think of a legitimate excuse for not wanting to spend my afternoon picking up other people's trash, A.K.A, "Giving back to the Community," and so I agreed to help.

As I looked for my heavy leather gloves, I told myself that I'd done this before, but that wasn't exactly true. I'd written artices about people picking up trash for volunteer organizations, but I hadn't actually done the work. I soon realized, there's a big difference between shooting photos of people picking up trash and actually picking up hundreds of pieces of refuse and stuffing them in a huge orange bag.

Gina picked up those orange trash bags, dayglo vests and gloves from the county administration building that morning. The county also provided trigger operated pincer devices, which turned out to be invaluable for reaching into the deep brush and more important still, for eliminating the necessity of bending over when picking up trash off the roadside

Gina and I do our share of volunteer work, but we'd never actually committed to cleaning up a section of highway, so it was a learning experience for both of us.

We figured we'd clean up Wilderness Road between State Park Road and Newbern Road, which is just about a two-mile stretch. We figured we'd need about 10 bags.

Looking back, we were comically ambitious in our goals. The first thing we learned was that the amount of trash along the roadside increases exponentially, the closer one gets to the roadside. In other words, there is way more trash along the roadside than we noticed from the window of our car while travelling 40 miles per hour.

Sure, there's lots of stuff right next to the roadway, but there's even more bottles, plastic bags, paper cups and soda cans 10 to 15 feet off to the side of the road and

it's inevitably surrounded by briars. I didn't envision myself clawing through dense underbrush to retrieve a can of Bud Light from underneath a thorn bush, but if we were going to "adopt" this piece of roadway, we couldn't just leave it

It was here that my wife learned that wearing spandex pants was less than ideal when delving deep into a briar patch. Gina relayed this information to me in no uncertain terms, though it was I who suggested she wear a pair of jeans for our afternoon outing.

So more often than not, you're going to fight through the brambles to grab that shiny can with your county provided pincer ... even if the carcass of a dead dear lays near-

There's another thing we learned. When picking up trash along a rural roadway, expect to find some dead things. During our cleaning endeavor, we stumbled upon one highly decomposed deer carcass, the remains of a fawn which still retained its fur and the lower part of a deer's leg which lay isolated from its other parts on the side of



Emmett Hanger, R-Augusta, said Friday in support of the measure.

Lawmakers who voted against the measure raised concern about the regulatory structure of the bill, particularly when it came to the departments with authority over regulations. Speaking in opposition to the bill, Sen. Scott Surrovell noted that under the legislation, the Cannabis Control Authority will be regulating marijuana and the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services regulating Delta-8 "even though they have the identical effect on human beings."

"This is a first step towards a complete mess. That's what this is," Surrovell said Friday. "This is like saying we're going to have ABC regulate liquor and we're going to have the Department of Health regulate beer."

Surrovell and a few other Democratic lawmakers raised concern they will have to "undo" the code language in coming legislative ses-

The bill ultimately passed out of the House in a 85-9 vote and the Senate in a 23-17 vote.

JURY DUTY PAY

On the second-to-last day of the legislative session, lawmakers in both the House and Senate voted to pass measures that will increase Virginia's per-day jury duty pay from \$30 to \$50.

Two bills originating in the House and Senate - SB 789 and HB 2317 – initially proposed raising jury duty pay to \$100 per day when first introduced, which would have likely made Virginia's per-day jury pay the highest in the

causing tremendous amounts of nation. Lawmakers ultimately setincrease in emergency hospital tled on a \$50 per day rate, which visits, particularly from children, puts Virginia in line with a handful from ingesting these edibles," Sen. of other states who pay this rate as the maximum compensation, according to an analysis by the National Center for State Courts.

Del. Angelia Williams-Graves, D-Norfolk, told The Center Square the compromise on the measures ultimately came down to funding in the budget. The delegate said even though \$50 per day jury duty pay "does not keep up with inflation," it's "much better" than the current

"Thirty dollars is just unbelievably low," Williams-Graves said. "We want people to do their civic duty, but we also don't want to cause any financial harm for doing

"The increase to \$50 is not what we wanted, but it was a major move in the right direction to help to make it just a little bit more bearable for jury duty service," the delegate later added.

Williams-Graves said in the future she would like to see future increases to Virginia's jury duty pay, noting the ideal situation would be tying the pay to an annual increase.

TAX CREDIT FOR GUN SAFETY PURCHASE

While most gun-related measures proposed during the legislative session were defeated, one measure in particular received bipartisan support.

House Bill 2387 by Del. Alfonso Lopez, D-Arlington, establishes a nonrefundable income tax credit of up to \$300 for taxable years 2023 through 2027 for individuals who purchase firearm safety devices, like gun safes or lock boxes. The bill was supported by both the National Rifle Association and gun safety groups like Everytown for Gun Safety and Giffords.

Mary and Martha

Mary, Martha and Lazarus were three Siblings. Two sisters and a brother who developed a close relationship with Jesus. So close, Jesus often stayed at their home in the town of Bethany, near Jerusalem.

Luke 10:38. "Now it came to pass, as they went, that He entered into a small village: and a certain woman named Martha received Him into her house. And she had a sister called Mary, which also sat at Jesus' feet, and heard His word."



Q: No wonder Christmas is a more favored holiday than Easter. Christmas speaks of a new life [the infant Jesus] that brought joy. Easter brings thoughts of death [His gruesome death], yet there is the new life found in resurrection, which is curious. What does the Bible verse mean when it says that death is swallowed up in victory?

A: Think about the holes children make when they dig in the sand on the seashore. When the waves come in, the holes are

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



Busch gets milestone NASCAR Cup victory in Fontana finale

FONTANA, Calif. - The Kyle Busch era at Richard Childress Racing began three weeks ago at the Los Angeles Coliseum, but the coronation was reserved for Sunday's Pala Casino 400 in the last NASCAR Cup Series race at 2.0mile Auto Club Speedway.

Busch grabbed the lead from Ross Chastain on Lap 165 and regained it on Lap 180 at the end of a cycle of green-flag pit stops, as the race ran under green for the final 55 laps. He crossed the finish line on Lap 200 with a 2.998-second advantage over runner-up Chase Elliott.

The victory was the 61st of Busch's career, most among active drivers and ninth all-time. For the 19th straight season, Busch has won at least one NASCAR Cup Series race, breaking a tie with seven-time champion Richard Pet-

ty for the series record.

Kyle and Kurt Busch now hold the record for most combined Cup victories by brothers with 95, one more than the total accumulated by Bobby and Donnie Allison.

Coincidentally, Busch claimed the first Cup win of his career at Auto Club, the bulk of whose property was recently sold—with plans to replace the 2.0-mile speedway with a half-mile short track.

Busch's victory at Auto Club came in his second start in the No. 8 Chevrolet for RCR, the team he joined after 15 seasons and two series championships with Joe Gibbs

"I can't thank Richard and Judy (Childress) enough, Austin (Dillon) for calling me and getting me talking and getting me the opportunity to come over here to RCR," said Busch, who had to overcome a pit road speeding penalty under caution on Lap 43.

Class A Contractor

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"The guys did a great job. (Crew chief) Randall (Burnett)-everybody that worked so hard in the offseason. We did a lot of sim stuff, a lot of testing in general, just trying to get up to speed. There is nothing more rewarding than being able to go to Victory Lane...

"You put yourself in a different situation and you're able to reward your guys. It's not about me always winning, but about the guys. I've worked with a lot of great people who've given me a lot of great opportunities in my career. It's awesome to be able to reward them."

With qualifying rained out on Saturday, Elliott started 31st according to a metric formula based on owner points and performance in the previous race (the DAYTO-NA 500). Throughout the race, Elliott's crew made the No. 9 Chevrolet better. By race's end, it was competitive with the fastest cars in the field.

'Yeah, just really proud of our team," Elliott said. "We obviously didn't run very good there toward the end of the year last year, and just everybody really went to work hard over the winter to try and get

"Obviously, I think we still have some work to do, but it was really nice to just see a lot of that hard work pay off and have the car driving like we were wanting it to do. So that's always a good thing...

I wouldn't do it that way

Dear Dave,

I have an uncle who wants to gift some property to one of his sons, myself and my sister. The property is about two-anda-half acres, and it's probably worth around \$125,000.
