Streetscape next project for Downtown

As the West Main Waterline Project in Downtown Pulaski begins to wind down, thoughts now turn to the next project – the Streetscape.

At last week's meeting of Town Council, Town Manager Darlene Burcham reminded council the Streetscape project involves the replacement of curb, gutter and sidewalk in the downtown area.

"This is a project that is being funded by the Virginia Department of Transportation," Burcham said. "We actually received two grants [totaling more than \$1 million], one for Main Street North [the north side of the street] and one for Main Street South [the other side]. The engineer was put under contract back in February of last year. The design was completed last August. But we're still dealing with VDOT in terms of their review," she said, noting the review is said to be 90 percent complete.

"But because there are federal dollars involved, we have to have review," Burcham added.

We do intend to open up West

Main as soon as the water main is complete," Burcham said. When opened, the downtown portion of Main Street will be gravel at first.

"And then as soon as we have the go-ahead, we will start the construction of the streetscape – first on one side of the street and then when that's complete the other side, and not pave the street until that work is done.

"So, it is going to be another stretch of time and based upon contracts and how much money we have available. But all of these things are necessary and will be done to make sure that we have kept our commitment to the council and to the community that these activities are done and that they are done with as little financial commitment as possible from the town.

"We're constantly looking for financial resources to help," Burcham

On another front, Burcham told council an application for funding from the U.S. House Appropriations Committee had been submitted.

"You adopted a resolution in supboth a state review and a federal port of an application that we were

going to send to the House Appropriations Committee to have several waterlines replaced and, at that time, we had three that we had nominated," Burcham recalled.

"I'm pleased to report that that application has gone forward as a county application, which will provide funding if approved for one water main replacement in Dublin and two in the Town of Pulaski. We were one of 15 applications that Congressman [Morgan] Griffith forwarded and that's the maximum number that I guess each Congressman was allowed to submit. So,¬¬ we're very hopeful" for approval.

Burcham explained that the final application was submitted without requested funding for a water main replacement on Fifth Street in Pulaski.

"But we will be getting at least in the combination county application the lion's share of the money, and I do want to publicly express my appreciation to County Administrator Jonathan Sweet who worked with the congressman's office to put this combination applicounty. So, we'll keep our fingers crossed on that," she said.

On the recreation front, Burcham updated council on the planned new pickle ball courts at Sixth Street park.

"There have been some questions because of the length of time again, that it has taken for us to actually establish the new set of pickleball courts that are going to be going in on Sixth Street to replace the aging and in disrepair tennis courts. We've been told that, again based upon timing and other contracts that are already out there - it will be complete no later than the first of July. And at that same time that contractor will also do the striping on our new basketball courts that are located on First Street," Burcham said.

"There's lots going on in the community a lot of things that I wish I could wave a magic wand and they could go faster, but we're making progress and I think we just have to keep moving forward," she said.







Va. saw exports soar to \$5.1 billion in '22

(The Center Square) – Virginia's agricultural and forestry exports soared to a value of more than \$5.1 billion in 2022, according to new data released this week by the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

China is the state's top export destination by far, purchasing \$1.45 billion in agricultural and forestry products in 2022. Egypt, Taiwan, Venezuela and Canada are also in the top five destinations for Virginia's agricultural exports. Soybeans and soybean meal are the state's top exports, followed by pork, poultry and tobacco, according to data from VDACS.

The Lower Energy Cost Act

House Republicans recently passed H.R. 1, the Lower Energy Costs Act. By numbering this legislation as H.R. 1, Republicans recognize that unleashing American energy is one of Congress' top priorities and critical to the wellbeing of the American people and our economy.

In 2020, under President Trump, the United States achieved energy independence. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, the U.S. produced more petroleum than it consumed, the first year since at least 1949. Unfortunately, this energy comeback was short-

made in the last Administration, ones that severely hampered domestic oil and gas production. As a result, the American people have experienced exorbitant energy prices.

The Biden Administration made permitting new fossil fuel and nuclear energy projects very difficult. The New York Times recently reported that even thousands of renewable energy projects are delayed due to the current regulatory landscape.

In parts of Virginia gas prices reached record highs, close to \$5 a gallon in June 2022. The price of residential heating oil hit an all-time high in November, costing Virginians \$5.52 per gallon.

This has been especially burdensome for low-income households; some families in the 9th District have had to choose between paying their energy bills to keep their homes heated during the winter and other necessities.

We can do better.

H.R. 1 incorporates 25 individual pieces of legislation from across three different standing House committees to address the energy issues we have experienced over the past few years.

As a member of the Energy and Commerce Committee and the Energy Subcommittee, I have been proud to be one of the people working to make H.R. 1 a good bill.

H.R. 1 aims to increase domestic energy production and alleviate some of the cost increases at the pump, by reversing Biden's anti-energy policies.

It includes legislation to disapprove of Biden's canceling of the Keystone XL pipeline, which cost the United States 11,000 American jobs and could have had a positive economic impact of between \$3.4-9.6 billion. The additional oil would have been cheaper to transport to American refineries by pipeline, rather than moving the oil by truck or train. This would have kept gasoline prices from rising as much.

The legislation also requires the Department of the Interior to resume lease sales on federal lands and waters and repeals many restrictions on the import and export of natural gas, including LNG.

About half of the homes in the United States use natural gas for space heating and water heating. Included in H.R.1 is legislation to repeal President Biden's natural gas production tax. This tax has played a hand in increasing household energy bills across the country.

H.R. 1 reforms the country's permitting process through changes to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) permitting process. These changes will streamline federal environmental reviews for all sectors of our economy by ensuring that NEPA review challenges are substantive and by setting deadlines for completion of the NEPA reviews.

This energy package also repeals Section 134 of the Clean Air Act, relating to the greenhouse gas reduction fund. This \$27 billion 'green bank' was implemented as part of the so-called Inflation Reduction Act to advance the bad policies of the Green New Deal.

The legislation also addresses our need for domestic production of critical minerals. In the left's rush to green energy, America has become too reliant on volatile Chinese supply chains, and in some cases, the use of slave labor. The Department of Energy reported that, among other things, China controls 80% of the world's rare earths production and refining which is needed to manufacture wind turbines and 60% of lithium refining needed for electric vehicles and battery storage.

I believe in an all-of-the-above energy approach, including renewables, but it shouldn't be at the expense of our national security. This legislation boosts the mining and processing of hardrock minerals, including critical minerals needed to ramp-up production of renewable energy components, maximizing our domestic energy production. It also requires the Department of Energy to identify resources that are particularly vulnerable to supply disrup-

Unfortunately, before the House passed H.R. 1, President Biden threatened to veto the legislation, to the detriment of all Americans.

Hopefully the Senate will work with us to get a bill that

Politics then and now

From the beginning politics has always been a contact sport with competing interests attempting to achieve power over each other. A friend recently said to me he has never seen it so bad as it is today.

The friend appears to be in his 50s, so he missed the divisions caused by the Vietnam War, the assassinations of John F. Kennedy, Bobby Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jr., the racial riots of the '60s and '70s and he may have not studied divisions that led to the Civil War.

Those of us longing for a more civil approach than today's political warfare should watch a speech given by Ronald Reagan at a dinner at Boston College honoring then-Speaker of the House Thomas "Tip" O'Neill. It was March 17, 1986, St. Patrick's Day.

Reagan invoked his and O'Neill's Irish ancestry, but he did more than that. Reagan spoke of a man he respected and even admired in spite of their political differences. As has been frequently noted, they often worked out those differences over drinks at the White House.

Reagan began his remarks as usual with a joke: "I've always known that Tip was behind me, even if it was only at the State of the Union Address. As I made each proposal, I could hear Tip whispering to (Vice President) George Bush 'no way, forget it, fat chance." (loud laughter and applause)

There is a kindness in Reagan on display at the event, even when he was kidding and especially when he kidded O'Neill.

Reagan used self-deprecating humor about his age as he did to great success in his 1984 debate with Walter Mondale: "(Tip) said since it was March 17 it was only fitting that someone drop by who had actually known St. Patrick.

Noting the two had been kidding each other for some time, Reagan said he

hoped that would continue for years to

come. Then he said something unheard of in today's political discourse: "A little kidding is after all a sign of affection, the sort of thing that friends do to each other. And, Mr. Speaker, I'm grateful you have permitted me in the past, and I hope in the future, that singular honor, the honor of calling you my friend."

Can anyone hear Donald Trump or any other candidate for or in public office saying things like that in 2023?

Reagan went on to make an important point that seems to have been lost between then and now: "I think the fact of our friendship is testimony to the political system we're part of and the country we live in, a country that permits two not so shy and not so retiring Irishmen to have it out on the issues, rather than have it out on each other, or their countrymen.'

Reagan said he "saluted" O'Neill "for his years of dedication and devotion to the country." He said he had been a "vital and forceful part of America's political tradition, a tradition that he has truly enriched."

If you are a Republican, you might read these words, watch the entire address and think that's all well and good, but have you ever heard a modern Democrat say anything comparable about a Republican, except perhaps at their funeral?

That's not the point. Kindness and praise for one's political opponent can affect others, especially voters. As Abraham Lincoln said about the South: "We are not enemies, but friends. We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained, it must not break our bonds of affection."

Is anyone listening?

Don't valorize January 6

The philosopher Eric Hoffer famously wrote, "Every great cause begins as a movement, becomes a business, and eventually degenerates into a racket."

What he evidently didn't count on was great outrages becoming causes.

From the perspective of the immediate aftermath of Jan. 6, it was hard enough to believe that Donald Trump would survive the event, let alone make it a plank in a powerful comeback bid just a few years later.

But there was Trump in Waco, Texas, opening his inaugural rally of the 2024 campaign with a recording of the song "Justice for All" that he performed with the J6 Prison Choir, with some scenes of Jan. 6 playing on the jumbotrons.

Among those favorably inclined toward it, the riot at the Capitol has progressed from something to be minimized closer to something to be celebrated, almost, if not quite, "Stop the Steal's" Bastille Day.

For Trump, a master at appropriating the catch lines and attacks of the other side, reversing the meaning of Jan. 6 would be his most audacious move yet. How long is it before that day becomes "the perfect protest?"

Trump still hews to the two premises of the Jan. 6 riot -that, as a general proposition, the 2020 election was stolen and, more particularly, that Vice President Mike Pence could have stopped the counting of the electoral votes if he weren't so weak.

Trump has talked about pardoning the rioters, who are "great patriots," and floated the idea of the government apologizing to many of them.

Now, it is true that the Justice Department has gone out of its way to run up the number of prosecutions to make a political point about the seriousness of the event, and defendants have been denied bail in a highly

unusual manner. That said, making excuses for or valorizing Jan. 6 is deeply wrong.

First, there's the matter of principle. Riots are bad and never justified. They hurt people and destroy property, while achieving nothing or setting back the cause they were supposed to advance. Disorder at the heart of the U.S. government, disrupting a longstanding ritual connected to the peaceful transfer of power, is particularly egregious.

Second, justifying or excusing political violence has a deranging influence on the republic. The more reasons both sides have to physically fear each other, the easier it is to justify extreme measures in response.

Third, it's simply terrible politics. If the other side is desperate to portray you as in bed with fanatics and rioters, it's best not to go out of your way to prove them right. It's perverse that just as the Jan. 6 Committee is no longer in a position to constantly remind the public of Jan. 6, here comes Donald Trump to remind people.

It'd be a little like Richard Nixon running for the 1976

that figuratively brought our community closer together, paradoxically, as it literally forced us apart.

Be on the lookout for those folks who wish to dig a hole and place the County in it. It is a choice to think positively, speak positively and engage positively, and I am asking the community to come together in this time of historic global, political and economic uncertainties and work together for the common good of Pulaski County and all those who call

"Virginia-grown agricultural goods reach the world through the Port of Virginia," Harris added.

The Port of Virginia also handles agricultural exports from outside the state, including goods coming from the Midwest, Harris

"We find that more and more [agricultural] exporters are looking to move over the Port of Virginia because of our efficiency, our ability to handle trains, trucks and ships all very quickly and get that stuff moving to market," Harris said. "We're seeing this area of business for us grown, and we don't anticipate it slowing down."

In addition to agricultural products, the state saw a 1,300% increase in the export of wood pellets in 2022 compared to 2022, which was "likely driven by increased demand in Europe and Asia," according to the governor's office.

On top of his natural inclinations, Trump may be making a calculation that in a primary race with Ron DeSantis to be the most "MAGA" Republican candidate, he can't lose by staking out a pro-Jan. 6 position. That's not a crazy bet, but if Trump is going to be beaten it will probably be, in part, on grounds that he carries too much baggage and is an electability risk. By embracing rather than skirting one of his major vulnerabilities, he gives his adversaries more ammunition on both counts.

Jan. 6 is an outrage that shouldn't become a cause.

(The Center Square) - An expanding list of lawmakers in the politically-divided Virginia General Assembly have announced they will not seek re-election or will seek another office under new district lines this election cycle.

Come this November, all 140 seats in the General Assembly will be on the ballot. The upcoming election cycle will be the first one under new maps drawn via the independent redistricting process in

The new maps drawn by consultants appointed by the Virginia Supreme Court in 2021 did not take into account where current legislators reside, resulting in several lawmakers either being drawn out of the district where they currently live or drawn into a district where they would have to run head to head against another one or more incumbent lawmakers.

As of Thursday, 18 members of the House of Delegates have announced they would not be seeking re-election this year, while an additional 14 have launched campaigns to fill a seat in the state Senate, according to the Virginia Political Access Project. On the Senate side, 10 lawmakers as of Thursday had announced their retirement.

As a result of redistricting, 46 lawmakers in the House of Delegates and 19 lawmakers in the state Senate were drawn into a district with one or more incumbents, according to tracking from VPAP.

Some lawmakers have indicated that going head to head with another incumbent was a primary motivator for retiring. In a statement announcing he would not seek re-election, Del. Glenn Davis, R-Virginia Beach, said the newly created 98th House of Delegates district ended up grouping he and Del. Barry Knight, a Republican from Virginia Beach and chair of the House Appropriations Committee, into the same district.

continue serving the citizens of Virginia beach in the House of Delegates and leading our education agenda, there is no doubt that the City I represent, as well as the Hampton Roads Region as a whole,

has benefited greatly from having the Chairman of Appropriations as its representative," Davis said in a statement Tuesday. "It is for this reason that I will not be running for re-election to the Virginia House of Delegates."

Due to the new district lines, some lawmakers were drawn out of their original districts, leaving them to consider moving to a new area to continue representing their constituents.

That was a determining factor for Sen. Emmett Hanger, R-Augusta, who released a statement Thursday announcing he would not be running for election in the new Senate District 3.

"While I currently represent, or have represented in the past, at least half of the new Senate District 3, I do not live within those boundaries," Hanger said. "Where I have lived all of my life, went to school, college, commanded a National Guard Infantry Company, my Church, my Ruritan Club, my business where 6 of my 16 grandchildren live; in essence 'my community,' are all in Senate District

Hanger said he "went so far as to locate a house to purchase in SD3," but said he "decided not to move away from my current community."


A handful of lawmakers have indicated their decision to not seek re-election this year was out of a desire to retire after decades in the Legislature. In announcing his retirement, Sen. Richard Saslaw, a Democrat from Fairfax who spent 48 years in the General Assembly, said: "Fish gotta swim. Birds gotta fly. And Saslaw's gotta move on."

an assistant professor of political science at Virginia Commonwealth University. Keena said the new district maps are "an example of a set of maps that doesn't have gerrymandering bias."

"This is a huge difference from the process we saw 10 years ago when it was just years and years of court battles, racial gerrymandering, partisan gerrymandering and vote dilution cases," Keena told The Center Square, noting that the new maps represent "massive changes" to existing district boundaries.

Keena said in some ways, the new district lines "inject a lot more uncertainty into the elections than we typically have" because of the amount of incumbents who have chosen to retire instead of challenge another incumbent. But he also noted the new maps create new opportunities as the new boundaries are "reshaping the power that's distributed in each of the parties.'

'Neither of the parties really have a baked-in advantage in the way that the districts are drawn," Keena said, adding it is largely a "question mark" on how the balance of power could shift in the General Assembly after the upcom-

Heading into the election, Republicans hold a 52-48 majority in the House of Delegates and Democrats hold a 22-18 majority in the Senate. Given the slim majorities in both chambers and the new district boundary lines, it appears "control of both chambers is legitimately at stake this year," said Kyle Kondik, a political analyst with the Center for Politics at the University of Vir-

Kondik, who writes about U.S. elections as managing editor of Sabato's Crystal Ball, noted that seeing an increase in lawmaker retirements in Congress is "not uncommon" in the election cycle after redistricting. He said it's likely the same applies at the state level.

"In years immediately after a redistricting cycle, you do just tend to see more open seats, partially because sometimes two members will get thrown in the same district with one another or there's just more members who are retiring because they see their constituencies change," Kondik said.



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





Ring That Bell: Christopher Bell jumps to standings lead with **Bristol Dirt victory**

Rising like a rocket into the atmosphere, Joe Gibbs Racing's Christopher Bell has soared to the NASCAR Cup Series standings lead following his first win of the 2023 season at Bristol Motor Speedway Dirt. The win was the fifth of his career and his first at the half-mile track. Now, for the third consecutive season (2021-2023), the 28-year-old Oklahoma native has locked himself into the Playoffs and has also earned a spot in the NASCAR Cup Series All-Star Race that will be held on May 21 at the historic North Wilkesboro Speedway.

Atop the standings, Bell holds a 13-point lead over Trackhouse Racing's Ross Chastain in second and a 26-point lead over Stewart-Haas Racing's veteran Kevin Harvick in third. Through eight race this season, Bell has put up one win (Bristol Dirt), five top fives (series-most) and six top 10s (tied with Alex Bowman for series-most). Bell is the seventh different winner and the fourth different points leader through the first eight races of the season.

"We knew this was going to be a good stretch of races," said Bell. "Obviously wanted to capitalize

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

NASCAR Cup Series' short track swing culminates at **Martinsville Speedway**

Amid a short track swing on the 2023 season schedule, the NA-SCAR Cup Series heads to the halfmile Martinsville Speedway for the NOCO 400 this Sunday, April 16 at 3 p.m. ET on FS1, MRN and SiriusXM NASCAR Radio - the third of three consecutive tracks measuring less than a mile (Richmond, Bristol and Martinsville).

Martinsville Speedway, at 0.526mile in length, is the longest continuously running track on the NA-SCAR Cup Series schedule, and the only currently active track that was a part of the inaugural NASCAR Cup Series season in 1949. Martinsville Speedway was originally a dirt track and the facility hosted 12

NASCAR Cup Series races on the then dirt surface before paving the track in the late summer months of 1955, between the track's two Cup races that season.

In total, there have been 148 NASCAR Cup Series races held at Martinsville Speedway, one race in the inaugural year (1949) and two races per year since 1950. The first NASCAR Cup Series race at Martinsville Speedway was on September 25, 1949 and won by NASCAR Hall of Famer Red Byron driving an Oldsmobile for car owner Raymond Parks. The first 500-lap Cup Series event at Martinsville Speedway was in 1956 and the event was won by NASCAR Hall of Famer Buck Baker from the pole position. Baker was driving a 1956 Dodge for car owner Carl Kiekhaefer. The now famous concrete corners were added atop asphalt in 1976 making the already uniquely 'paperclip' shaped track that much more one-

• Then, decide if you'd rather complete sales by meeting buyers at a public place or shipping items from the post office. There's no right or wrong way—just do what's convenient for you.

Where to Sell Stuff Online

Here are a few of my favorite resale sites in no particular order:

- 1. Facebook Marketplace: Facebook Marketplace is free (thanks, Zuck), and on top of that, you can list your items in local buy/sell groups to expand your reach. With local pickup and shipping options, people can find and buy your listings from just about anywhere and you can vet them before meet-
- 2. eBay: eBay is awesome for selling collectible items, electronics and vintage or antique pieces—like the Beanie Babies stuffed under the bed. With auction and Buy Now options, you choose how buyers purchase your goods. Heads up: There are some fees with eBay, so read the fine print and list wisely, my friends.
- 3. ThredUP: ThredUP is a consignment style site where you mail them your items, then they do all the work and give you a cut of the sale. My wife loves ThredUP because she can pack up a giant box of old clothes (and by old, I mean last season, which is apparently already out of style), and it conveniently gets picked up from your front door.
- 4. Decluttr: Decluttr is a fast and free way to sell cell phones, tech, CDs, DVDs and games. The website uses a price generator for listings so you can turn old gadgets into new dollars—and purge your junk drawer of dusty, early generation iPods while you're at it.
- 5. Mercari: Mercari helps millions of people across the U.S. buy and sell just about anything. With options for prepaid shipping labels and profits added right to your account, this app makes selling clothes, beauty items, shoes and household stuff super easy.

Now, wherever you end up selling your stuff, remember two important words: safety first. Scammers want to take advantage you, so make sure you take precautions. Examine buyer profiles, question details that don't add up, never mail a product without getting paid first, and meet at a safe, public place. Also, never share your personal information with strangers. Instead, communicate through the app or selling website—not your cell phone or email.


