Grucci to expand in Pulaski County, add 45 new jobs

Governor Glenn Youngkin on Tuesday announced in Dublin that Fireworks by Grucci and Pyrotechnique by Grucci, the sixth-generation family business and worldwide fireworks design and performance company and manufacturer of fireworks and pyrotechnic devices for the U.S. military, will invest \$5.5 million to expand its assembly, storage, and distribution operations to Pulaski County.

The company will occupy the former Koinonia Tapes and Foams 30,000-square-foot facility in ShaeDawn Industrial Park off Route 100 in proximity to its manufacturing operation at the Radford Army Ammunition Plant.

Virginia successfully competed with New York for the project, which will create 45 new jobs.

'Magnificent displays of fireworks have brought generations of families together for more than a century because of pyrotechnics

Governor Glenn Youngkin. "The Commonwealth is a strategic gateway to markets served by a robust workforce, and we thank Fireworks by Grucci and Pyrotechnique by Grucci for recognizing these advantages and expanding their Virginia footprint into Pulaski County.'

Noting one of his favorite things to do as governor is making economic development announcements, Youngkin said "what is happening across Virginia is a fundamental shift and growth from years of somewhat stagnant growth to rapid growth. What we've seen over the course of the last 14 months is 150,000 Virginians working today verses where they were just 15 months ago in the largest labor force Virginia has had in 50 years. Labor participation is at a 10-year high. Virginians are back to work."

Youngkin, Virginia's 74th governor, noted that, "Here we are in Pulaski County with an opportunity to talk about great jobs for a great



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Thank A Farmer

I recently read an article in the Roanoke Times about a report done by Stacker.com listing the Virginia counties with the most farmland. According to Stacker, they compiled a list of the top 25 counties "using data from the Agriculture Department's Farm Service Agency. Farmers reported the data as mandated by participation in USDA income support programs, including Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage as well as loan assistance."

When I read this, I realized that their list does not give a full picture of agriculture in Virginia and the Ninth District. Washington County wasn't included in Stacker's top 25 list when that county is well known to be a top agriculture county in the state.

According to Stacker's list, four counties in the



top 25: Wythe Bed-(#14). and Russell (#16). But, as men-

tioned in the article, the list above only represents the farms and farmland that participate in USDA crop insurance and, therefore, leave out a significant chuck of farmland in the state. Particularly, it appears that it does not include land dedicated to livestock, so acres used for cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, etc. aren't included. Case in point, the report says Virginia has 3,074,491 acres of farmland. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the real number is around 7.7 million acres.

Having lived in Southwest Virginia most of my life and knowing that the agriculture profile of the region was inaccurate, I took it upon myself to do some research. The Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) gathers data every five years for their Census of Agriculture. According to the agency, it is the only source of uniform, comprehensive, and impartial agriculture data for every state and county in the nation.

As predicted, NASS' numbers actually look much different than reported by Stacker.

According to their 2017 Census of Agriculture, the most recent year in which data is available, Bedford is actually #5 in top agricultural counties in Virginia with 211,087 acres of farmland, not #14. Four other Ninth District counties are included in just the top 10. Washington County is #7 with 176,344 acres; Russell County is #8 with 170,285 acres; Franklin County is #9 with 156,254 counties; and Wythe is #10 with 151,563 acres. According to NASS, the next census, the 2022 Census of Agriculture, will be published in 2024.

(I should also note, Bedford and Franklin counties are currently in the Ninth District as redistricting took place last year. In 2017, they were not a part of the Ninth.)

While the census does give people a good picture of how much of the Ninth District is dedicated to agriculture, it's not just about acres of farmland. It is also about economic output. Virginia's agriculture industry is the largest private industry in the Commonwealth, providing an impact of over \$82 billion to our state's economy annually and almost 381,800 jobs. It is also the largest industry in the Ninth Congressional District. Based on the 2017 Census, the Ninth District ranks third overall in market value of agricultural products sold in the state and first in four different categories of agricultural products sold. In the crops category, the Ninth is first in 'cultivated Christmas trees and short rotation woody crops.' Grayson County produces a vast majority of the Christmas trees in the state, with more than three times the area dedicated to growing Christmas trees then the next closet county, Floyd County, which is also in the Ninth! In the livestock, poultry, and products category, the Ninth ranks first in 'cattle and calves.' Washington County has the most cattle and calves in the Ninth District with over 900 farms and 66,000 cattle and calves. Wythe is second with 573 farms and over 55,000 cattle and calves. The Ninth also ranks first in 'sheep, goats, wool, mohair, milk' and in 'other animals and animal products.' I look forward to seeing NASS' updated statistics to see how the agriculture profile of the Ninth District has changed. So, the point of all this data is that if you live in the Ninth Congressional District, be sure to thank a farmer this week. Besides providing food and other necessary products, farming families are the number one economic driver in this Congressional District. Neither you nor I should ever forget it. Dear Dave,



Well, the good news is, you have the rest of your life to never make this kind of mistake again. I'm really sorry you're going through all this, son. What a horrible thing to experience right after college.


So, you're \$10,000 upside down on a vehicle you owe \$21,000 on, right? The truth is, you're kind of stuck. If you're serious about getting out of this mess


Is There Any Good News in America?

President Joe Biden's fall at the end of the Air Force Academy graduation ceremony was a brief event. He tripped, got helped up, and walked off under his own power.

Sometimes, though, a small thing is fraught with meaning -and with peril.

Biden's stumbles are not minor incidents, or a laughing matter. We aren't talking about a manufactured narrative about President Jerry Ford's alleged clumsiness played up on "Saturday Night Live." Biden is 80 years old, is in decline, and has a stiff, shuffling gait that makes you hold your breath when he's negotiating stairs or any place with potential obstacles. At his age, once the falls start, they usually don't stop.

It explains, "In the context of majority world Christianity, moves of God tend to happen in places of poverty, persecution, upheaval, and desperation. They are mostly removed from news cameras and since they unfold outside the Anglosphere, they tend to be off the map for the vast majority of Christians in the West."

Could we experience a similar Revival in the NRV if our churches came together in unity, with the purpose of seeing Gen-Z, as well as all age groups, experience the joyous love of God? Wouldn't it be amazing to have thousands of people baptized in Claytor Lake and then share the Good News throughout Virgina? With churches in unity, it could happen here!

Swimming pools, hot tubs, splash pads, oceans, lakes, and rivers are often contaminated with germs that can lead to swimming-related illnesses. The most common symptoms are diarrhea, skin rashes, ear pain, cough or congestion, and eye pain.

Individuals are at risk if you swallow, have contact with, or breathe in mists or aerosols from water contaminated with germs. You can also get them by having contact with chemicals that are in the water or that evaporate from the water and turn into gas in the

those with health problems/compromised immune systems are most at risk for swimming-related illnesses. To protect yourself from the most common illnesses, keep water out of your mouth and dry your ears after you swim.

If you have your own pool or hot tub, check the pH of the water with test strips after disinfecting to reduce the most germs. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), one of their studies found that more than 10% of routine inspections of public pools and water playgrounds led to immediate closure because of serious violations, such as improper pH levels.

Robert Graham had indeed worked in Pulaski County Public Schools previously.

In 2003, Graham moved from northern Virginia to Radford and began his career in PCPS as Principal at a pre-school. He then served as Assistant Principal at Dublin Elementary School for a two-year stint. He subsequently took a position in PCPS's central office as Coordinator of Student Instruction under Linda Hill. Dr. Sowers was the PCPS Superintendent at that time.

In 2006, Graham was hired as Principal of an elementary school in Radford, where he remained until 2010. When a new Superintendent was hired that year, Graham took the post of Assistant Superintendent of Radford City Schools. When that Superintendent retired in 2015, Graham was appointed as Radford City Public School Superintendent and rerecent resignation.

After signing his contract, Graham addressed the audience. He began by stating that his professional life had recently become "difficult and challenging," and that he had sought the council of his mother regarding his career.

"She said Robby, when one door closes another one will open," Graham recounted. "Well, she was partially right. If she said Robby, when one door closes another very special door will open, then she would have been 100 percent correct."

"I'm absolutely thrilled to be back in Pulaski County Public Schools," Graham continued. "I want to thank Dr. Sears for encouraging me to apply for this position and also for being a very dear friend over these last very difficult six months in RCPS."

opened up, I thought, why not finish my career where I started my career?

Graham finished his speech by thanking the board and the citizens of Pulaski County who have "showered me with great support over the last few days."

"Lastly, I want you to know that I'm going to make some unintentional mistakes in Pulaski," Graham said. "We're all human but I do also want you to know that the decisions that I make will always be in the best interest of the children in this special division and that I will do everything that I can to provide for them the best education possible."

A reception was held in the school's dining area after the meeting was adjourned.

Siers' resignation was not anticipated. The Pulaski County School Board extended Superintendent Kevin Siers' contract in January 2022, so that instead of expiring in July 2023, it was set to expire in the summer of 2026. At that time, Siers' salary was set at \$148,938. This included a motor vehicle allowance of \$750 per month, full insurance benefits and reimbursement of business-related travel expenses for distances greater than 50 miles, among other perks.

As per his contract, Siers' salary was raised by 5% that same year to reflect the same increase to teacher's salaries in the subsequent 2022-2023 budget. The Superintendent's amended salary is \$156,385.

The 2023-2024 school budget included another 5% increase in teacher's salaries, so that had Kevin Siers remained, his annual salary would have been raised to \$164,204.

According to Chris Calfee of the Radford City School Board, Robert Graham's annual salary as Superintendent was approximately \$154,000 when he resigned. Radford City teachers will be remained in that position until his ceiving a pay increase of 5 to 7 of this year.

percent for the next fiscal year and, just as in Pulaski County Schools, this will directly affect the Superintendent's salary. If the \$154,000 figure is accurate, a five percent increase would raise the Radford Superintendent's salary to \$161,700 annually. A seven percent increase would up the Radford Supervisor's annual salary to \$164,780.

As of the morning of Wednesday June 14, Robert Graham's new contract had yet to be posted in the PCPS Board Docs website. After a FOIA request was made to view the contract, the PCPS administration wrote back to sav that the new contract could now be viewed on Board Docs under the June 8 meeting agenda.

The contract reveals that Robert Graham's annual salary will be \$175.000 and that his contract extends to July 1, 2027. In addition, in June of each year, the school board has agreed to contribute \$5,000 for the Superintendent's benefit to a tax-sheltered annuity. As before, the Superintendent's salary will be adjusted upwards to reflect any increases in teacher's salaries during his tenure. All benefits listed above in the former Superintendent's contract will also remain in place.

Outgoing Superintendent Kevin Siers' contract for the Superintendent position in the Franklin County School system has not been released to the public but it seems likely that he will receive a substantial pay increase, as well.

Robert Graham will begin his term as Superintendent for Pulaski County Public Schools on July 1, 2023. The school board members Graham will be working with in 2024 is yet to be determined, as all seats on the Pulaski County School Board are up for election on November 7

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

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains/wetlands and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Commenters are encouraged to offer alternative sites outside of the floodplain/wetland, alternative methods to serve the same project purpose, and methods to minimize and mitigate impacts. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information and request for public comment about floodplains/wetlands can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks and impacts associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains/wetlands, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.





In case you were wondering the third Golden Spikes finalist, it's LSU's star ace Paul Skenes. He's truly a spectacle on the mound, overpowering hitters with triple-digit fastballs and then fooling them with his strikeout pitches.

Even when the ball isn't in Skenes' hand, it doesn't get any easier against the LSU bullpen.

Oral Roberts (51-12)

How the season went: The Golden Eagles are possibly the hottest team in baseball. They won their final 15 games of the regular season to win the Summit League regular season title, won three to win the conference tournament, then swept the Stillwater Regional.

Winners of 21 in a row, they took an eight-run lead against Oregon in the Super Regional opener — in the first inning. Then proceeded to blow it, losing on a walk-off.

With their season on the line, the Eagles flipped the script, walking off the Ducks to force a Game 3 they would win 11-6 to become just the third regional 4-seed to ever reach Omaha.

Who stood out: The Eagles may have lost their 21-game win streak, but Jonah Cox's 47-game hitting streak remains. It's the third-longest in DI baseball history, and with one win at the MCWS, could reach the 50-game mark.

Oral Roberts has three spectacular starters with one absolutely unhittable reliever: Cade Denton. The big right-hander can close out any lead as well as he can provide some long relief, all while keeping batters to a .210 average.

Stanford (44-18)

How the season went: The Cardinal has been the class of the Pac-12 all season, taking eight of 10 conference series. Stanford was blitzed out of the conference tournament but still earned the No. 8 seed.

After fighting back from a loss in the regional to move on, the Cardinal met Texas in the Super Regional. A Game 1 loss at home meant another comeback needed to happen — and those two wins will live on forever.

With the season on the line, Quinn Mathews hurled 156 pitches and struck out 16 batters in a complete game win for the ages. Then, in the winner-take-all, an all-time wacky finish.

Who stood out: Mathews is no stranger to marathon outings, even if the 156 smashed his previous career high. He's thrown over 100 pitches in all but two starts this season and racked up 120 innings nearly double anyone else on the staff.

The Cardinal's lineup is highlighted by Alberto Rios, the Pac-12 Player of the Year and leader in several statistical categories. He has been the dynamic bat at the center of many of Stanford's offensive showcases this season. Expect him to do the same in Omaha.

TCU (42-22)

How the season went: TCU is a tale of two seasons. Sitting at 23-20 on May 1, the Frogs have won all but two games since and rode their red-hot offense to a Big 12 Tournament title.

TCU has yet to lose in the postseason and come to Omaha on an 11-game winning streak, giving Oral Roberts a run for the title of the hottest team.

Who stood out: The power comes from Brayden Taylor, but the baserunners are by committee. Seven different Frogs sport an onbase percentage over .400. Cole Fontenelle is perhaps the best allaround bat in the lineup.

The TCU pitching rotation has seen plenty of adjustments throughout a tumultuous season. The one constant presence has been Kole Klecker, the Frogs' ace. His numbers are strong all around, none more than his .209 opponent batting average.

Tennessee (43-20)

How the season went: These Vols ran hot and cold all season. Long win streaks seemed as common as three or four losses in quick succession. They lasted just one day in the SEC Tournament.

On the road in the regional, Tennessee swept the field, including an all-time wild win over No. 3 Clemson in 14 innings.

On the road again in the next round, the Vols fought back from a Game 1 loss and several weather delays to reach Omaha at the expense of Southern Miss.

Who stood out: In such a well-balanced offense, it's hard to pick just one name, but Christian Moore is well-rounded, hitting for average, power and disciplined at the plate, too. There's plenty of power spread around the lineup, though the brute force of a Blake Burke home run is quite the spectacle.

The Vols have some electric talent in the bullpen, too. Chase Burns has shifted from the rotation to be a stellar reliever with triple-digit heat. Andrew Lindsay has been Tennessee's best starter after stepping in midseason to join a good 1-2 punch in Drew Beam and Chase Dollander.

Virginia (50-13)

How the season went: The Hoos have reached the 50-win mark for the fifth time and the first since 2014. They have been around the top of the ACC all season and won

the Coastal Division regular-season title, but bowed out to North Carolina in the ACC Tournament.

After sweeping its home regional, Virginia dropped the first super regional game to ACC foe Duke. But the Hoos' bats turned up to flip the script, winning Games 2 and 3 by 10 runs each to advance.

Who stood out: UVA has six starters who have yet to miss a game this season, a great mark of consistency. The standout of the group is Kyle Teel, the nation's best catcher and one of the best players period. It's saying something to stand out among six other hitters hitting .300.

On the mound, all three UVA starters are money, which means the bullpen must be gold. Jake Berry, Jay Woolfolk, Evan Blanco - all three are dynamite in relief. Most leads are safe in the hands of these three.

Wake Forest (52-10)

How the season went: The nation's No. 1 seed has been playing like it for months now. Wake Forest overtook LSU for top spot late in the season, but the Deacons have been playing like the team to beat for months.

There are too many program records to list here, but this should summarize it well: this team is likely the best in program history and has been on a historic tear. The team's +59 run differential in the NCAA Tournament is the best of all-time entering the MCWS.

Who stood out: The name is Rhett Lowder. Wake Forest's ace on the mound has befuddled batters all season. The Deacons have yet to lose a game he has started, and he's completed six innings in all but two. He's racked up accolades as the leader of an allaround dominant pitching staff.

At the plate, there are two names to mention: Nick Kurtz and Brock Wilken. Both get on base in more than half of their atbats. The former leads the team in average, the latter in home runs and RBIs.

Alongside them are Pierce Bennett and Justin Johnson, who each have driven in 60+ runs this season.



Then Jesus asked the second and more important question. "But whom say YE that I am?" And old outspoken Peter hit the nail right on the head. He said "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." I'm sure the other disciples heard it and also believed.

Sometimes we have the tendency to ignore what some who talk a lot have to say. And we shut them out because frankly we get tired of listening to their constant speaking. But every once in a while, they have something to say that is worth listening to like Peter did on this occasion.

The biggest compliment we can ever give to others is to listen to what they have to say.

A lot of times, when we are discussing a matter with someone else, while they are speaking to us, we are so busy thinking about what we are going to say next, we don't even hear what they have to say.

So if you want to improve yourselves, as most of us do, why not try becoming more of a listener, and less of a talker. My dad said to me one time, "Son when you are in a group of people who are talking back and forth, you stay quiet and listen to what they are saying, and when it's over, you'll know more than they do, because you'll know what you know and you'll know what they know too." And I found out that that bit of wisdom has helped me to become a better listener. We all need to listen more and talk less.
