Investigation continues into Randolph Park blaze

Patriot Staff Report

An investigation continues into what caused the fire late last Friday afternoon that destroyed the Evelyn Alexander Waterpark facility at Randolph Park.

"Our Pulaski County Family saw something this evening that we never expected," said Shay Dunnigan, Director of Parks and Recreation for Pulaski County in an initial statement on the fire released late last Friday.

"The Evelyn Alexander Waterpark facilities were discovered to be on fire around 4:30 PM this evening. Our Parks and Recreation staff were able to call 911 and vacate the building without

our first responders, both within our community and from surrounding areas, who were quick to arrive and tackle this disaster with bravery and confidence," Dunnigan continued. "We are blessed to call you our friends and neighbors.'

Dunnigan said fire fighters fought "this aggressive fire" for approximately 2 hours and unfortunately, were unable to salvage any of the building itself.

"The fire spread too quickly and aggressively," he noted.

Dunnigan said last Friday that all other park-related activities would continue as early as the next day on Saturday.

Dunnigan said plans to rebuild

"We are incredibly grateful for would begin immediately, but "will take time with the goal of public pool access in 2024."

Later, Dunnigan issued another statement in the wee hours of Saturday morning with plans for operation of Randolph Park moving forward.

"We recognize that yesterday's events create a lot of questions from you regarding our Parks and Recreation operations. know that we are committed to serving our Pulaski County friends and neighbors and take that privilege seriously," Dunnigan said.

Area Republicans to gather in mass meeting to award party's nomination

Saturday is the big day for Republicans in the newly created 42nd House District that includes most of Pulaski County. That is the day a mass meeting at New River Community College will determine the party's House candidate in the November election.

The new 42nd District – created by the Virginia State Supreme Court during the state's last redistricting process – includes most of Pulaski County. Only the northwest portion of the county is not included. That portion resides in the newly formed 46th District.

Along with most of the county,

Montgomery County - including about 2,600 votes with 55 percent Christiansburg – and all of Giles County. It is a district with an estimated population of 84,571.

The new district also includes incumbent Delegate Jason Ballard of Giles County, who hopes to secure the GOP's nomination at Saturday's mass meeting in order to seek re-election in November.

Ballard has waged a strong advertising campaign over the last few months in an effort to inform voters within the new district of the mass meeting and how it

Ballard is seeking re-election to the House of Delegates after defeating former Delegate Chris the 42nd also includes the City of Hurst in 2021. Ballard won the Radford, the northwest portion of race in the old 12th District by

of the vote.

In seeking re-election, Ballard must first secure the Republican nomination during Saturday's mass meeting. He is being challenged for the nomination by

Radford's Jody Pyles. Pyles' campaign so far has centered around personal appearances and social media, as he is far behind Ballard in fund raising.

Holding a mass meeting such as Saturday's is not the traditional way of choosing a party's candidate. Other nearby House districts opted for the more normal primary run by state officials.

Such is the case in the new 47th District, where Del. Marie March



Hurricane season expected to be normal

From NOAA

National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) forecasters with the Climate Prediction Center, a division of the National Weather Service, predict near-normal hurricane activity in the Atlantic this year. NOAA's outlook for the 2023 Atlantic hurricane season, which goes from June 1 to November 30, predicts a 40% chance of a near-normal season, a 30% chance of an above-normal season and a 30% chance of a below-normal sea-

NOAA is forecasting a range of 12 to 17 total named storms (winds of 39 mph or higher). Of those, 5 to 9 could become hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or higher), including 1 to 4 major hurricanes (category 3, 4 or 5; with winds of 111 mph or higher). NOAA has a 70% confidence in these ranges.

Thanks to the Commerce Department and NOAA's critical investments this year in scientific and technological advancements in hurricane modeling, NOAA will be able to deliver even more accurate forecasts, helping ensure communities have the information they need to prepare for and respond to the destructive economic and ecological impacts of Atlantic hurricanes," said Secretary of Commerce Gina M. Raimondo.

The upcoming Atlantic hurricane season is expected to be less active than recent years, due to competing factors — some that suppress storm development and some that fuel it driving this year's overall forecast for a near-normal season.

After three hurricane seasons with La Nina present, NOAA scientists predict a high potential for El Nino to develop this summer, which can suppress Atlantic hurricane activity. El Nino's potential influence on storm development could be offset by favorable conditions local to the tropical Atlantic Basin. Those conditions include the potential for an above-normal west African monsoon, which produces African easterly waves and seeds some of the stronger and longer-lived Atlantic storms, and warmer-than-normal sea surface temperatures in the tropical Atlantic Ocean and Caribbean Sea which creates more energy to fuel storm development. These factors are part of the longer term variability in Atlantic atmospheric and oceanic conditions that are conducive to hurricane development known as the high-activity era for Atlantic hurricanes — which have been producing more active Atlantic hurricane seasons since 1995.

'With a changing climate, the data and expertise NOAA provides to emergency managers and partners to support decision-making before, during and after a hurricane has never been more crucial," said NOAA Administrator Rick Spinrad, Funeral services were held Ph.D. "To that end, this year we are operationalizing a new hurricane forecast model and extending the tropical cyclone outlook graphic from five to seven days, which will provide emergency managers and communities with more time to prepare for storms."

This summer, NOAA will implement a series of upgrades and improvements. NOAA will expand the capacity of its operational supercomputing system by 20%. This increase in computing capability will enable NOAA to improve and run more complex forecast models, including significant model upgrades this hurricane season:

•In late June, the Hurricane Anal-

ysis and Forecast System (HAFS) will become operational. HAFS will run this season in tandem with the currently operational Hurricane Weather Research and Forecast Model System and Hurricanes in a Multi-scale Ocean-coupled Non-hydrostatic model, but eventually will become NOAA's primary hurricane model. Retrospective analysis of tropical storms and hur-

The Spy

On May 29th, we honor our fallen service men and women, having died while serving in the United States armed forces. Memorial Day is a chance for all Americans to reflect on the ultimate sacrifice made by their fellow citizens, many of whom being friends or family members.

With redistricting, the Ninth District has been expanded to include Bedford and Franklin Counties. During this Memorial Day, I am especially reminded of the Bedford Boys, otherwise known as the Virginia National Guard – Company A of the 116th Infantry Regiment, 29th Division, one of the American units at the forefront of the D-Day invasion of Normandy during World War II. When Company A stormed Omaha Beach on June 6, 1944, there were 35 soldiers from Bedford. By the end of the campaign, 23 would be dead, making Bedford, Virginia, the town with the highest per capita deaths.

Just thinking of the horror brings tears to my eyes. Thinking of their heroism makes me proud to be an American. I want to thank every serviceman and woman for

their service and sacrifice, and also the families and loved ones supporting our soldiers. Their sacrifice allows us to enjoy the freedoms and liberties we hold so dear.

Memorial Day also marks the unofficial start to summer. The weather is warm, schools are letting out, and baseball season is in full swing.

As a history buff, I find connections to our past all around us. In this case, I was thinking about Memorial Day and baseball and was reminded that the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum is in Cooperstown, New York. Cooperstown has an interesting connection to not only our country's founding, but also American literature.

Cooperstown was named after William Cooper, who owned the land and was a county judge in the late 18th century, later elected to the New York state assembly.

His son, James Fenimore Cooper, was an American writer, famous for his novels including colonial and Native American characters. His most famous novel, The Last of the Mohicans, was an instant bestseller. In 1992, it was famously adopted into the award-winning movie of the same name.

But the novel I want to talk about, written five years earlier than The Last of the Mohicans, was Cooper's The Spy. Set during the American Revolution, at "The Locusts", a home in Scarsdale, New York, the novel tells the story of homeowners, the Wharton family, and other characters who seek refuge, both loyalists and revolutionaries, whose allegiances are unknown to the family.

It is widely believed that The Spy was inspired by Cooper's family friend, John Jay. Jay, a Founding Father of the United States, and author of five of The Federalist Papers, served as the sixth President of the Continental Congress. Later he served as the first chief justice of the United States and as the second governor of New York.

He is also known as the "Founding Father of U.S. Counterintelligence." During the Revolutionary War, he played a key role directing clandestine operatives and running counterintelligence missions.

In 1776, he headed a New York state executive body called the Committee for Detecting and Defeating Conspiracies, recognized as the nation's first dedicated counterintelligence agency. While heading the committee, investigating a loyalist plan for a surprise attack on the core of the Continental Army in New York City, he uncovered a plot against General George Washington by his bodyguards. Having allied themselves with the British, the guards hoped to capture or assassinate Washington. Fortunately for Washington, Jay and his Committee foiled their plan.

After the war, Jay traveled to Great Britain in 1794 to settle unresolved issues between Great Britain and our fledgling country. These efforts resulted in the "Jay Treaty," which averted another war with Britain. Years later, Jay co-authored the New York State Constitution.

During this Memorial Day period, we should all think of patriots from 1776 to 2023, who we owe a debt of gratitude.

With the 2024 election cycle approaching, potential Presidential candidates are beginning to try to win the favor of voters. Some will be sincere in their desire to serve the nation while others will be deceptive and corrupt with personal profit as their goal.


Back in the old days (prior to 1954) when ministers would encourage their flock to vote responsibly, they gave Election Sermons to help their parishioners determine which candidates were worthy of their sacred vote. They understood that the moral character and political character of our nation were

intertwined and that civil government is founded on an agreement between God and citizens to establish political systems that promote the common good. Voters were instructed to support people of proven wisdom, integrity, justice, and holiness.

Dr. Matthias Burnett preached a typical Election Sermon on May 12, 1803, stating that voters should pay close attention to the character and qualifications of the candidate. He encouraged them to vote for candidates who cherish and cultivate a spirit of unity, promote virtue and good morals; and that the candidates should let the love of God, their country and mankind rule their heart and actuate their conduct.

Here is an actual excerpt from that sermon: "...They should be able men, such as fear God, men of truth,

The debt deal: Could it have been better?

It was either the best deal that could have been reached given the political makeup of the House. Senate and White House, or it was a bad deal that might have been much better had Speaker Kevin McCarthy and House Republicans held

Kevin Roberts, president of The Heritage Foundation, a conservative Washington, D.C., think tank, is on the side of those who think it could have been made better: "Most fiscally conservative and pro-growth policies contained in the House-passed (bill) were stripped out or diluted. When Americans last gave their representatives in Washington this much support to rein in the government in 2011, Congress signed into law the Budget Control Act, which cut discretionary spending roughly 15 times more than the deal in front of us today. The new agreement essentially leaves untouched Biden's slush fund for 87,000 new IRS agents to audit American families. Additionally, this bill will likely lead to increased overall spending levels next year, giving up on the \$132 billion in real upfront cuts promised by (the bill). In exchange, this bill would give the Biden administration and the federal bureaucracy a blank-check debt limit suspension for two years."

On the other side is The Wall Street Journal, which editorialized: "The deal is a significant victory for GOP priorities, in return for raising the debt ceiling that had to be raised anyway. Mr. Biden tried to jam the GOP into a clean debt increase, but Republicans forced him to the table when they passed the Limit, Save, Grow bill. The lesson is that political unity pays."

There are some good provisions in the agreement, including capping non-defense spending at \$704 billion for fiscal 2024, which is higher than Republicans said they wanted when they proposed a return to 2022 spending levels. "Clawing back" unspent COVID-19 funds is helpful, but will members find a way to spend it on other things instead of applying it to debt reduction? I am doubtful. There are work

requirements for some able-bodied people now receiving food assistance.

Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas, mocked the deal and Speaker McCarthy's claim that the agreement "did not have one thing for Democrats." Cruz said "There are \$4 trillion" things in the deal for Democrats. He was likely referring to an estimated figure of the amount the debt has to increase in order for the country to extend borrowing for two years. Reuters reported the deal lifts the cap by \$4 trillion.

As mentioned many times in this column, the federal government does not suffer from a lack of revenue; it suffers from a lack of discipline. It spends more than it takes in, but keeps asking for more. How many times do we have to hear from Democrats that "the rich" aren't paying their "fair share"? Why shouldn't that be turned around and they be forced to defend their wasteful spending and refusal to reform entitlement programs?

The agreement is likely to be changed by the time it reaches the president's desk, if it gets there in time to ward off a default, which itself is a construct that needs to be reformed. The debt ceiling isn't a ceiling. It is an open roof with the sky being the limit for politicians to spend

Maybe the agreement is a first step and maybe more steps toward fiscal responsibility will be taken should a Republicans win the White House and a congressional majority in the next election.

Let's not forget, though, that Republicans don't have clean hands when it comes to spending. As The Wall Street Journal editorial reminds, Donald Trump "joined Mr. Biden in attacking entitlement reform."

It's not yet a done deal. Plenty more could happen before the measure is approved, or not. Whether approved in the current or another form, given past scenarios it is more likely to benefit the politicians and their careers than a majority of overburdened and fed-up taxpayers.

Daniel Penny wasn't a vigilante

Pretty much everything you need to know about the Daniel Penny case you can learn from the "Death Wish" movies.

Or so you might conclude if you took seriously the left's analysis of the tragic incident in a New York City subway car last month that led to Penny, a former Marine, getting charged with second-degree manslaugh-

The upshot of this commentary is that conservatives favor "vigilantism" and support it, of course, because it's a bulwark of white supremacy.

"The Republican Embrace of Vigilantism Is No Accident," according to New York Times columnist Jamelle Bouie.

Greg Sargent and Paul Waldman rapped Ron DeSantis in The Washington Post for his support of Penny: "DeSantis's celebration of vigilantism is a new low in MAGA extremism."

"Daniel Penny shows how much the right loves white vigilante violence," averred the headline on a piece at the Public Notice Substack.

Jon Marshall, an associate professor at Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism, was quoted in another Washington Post piece, "What we're seeing now for Daniel Penny after he killed Jordan Neely is that he fits within a long, ugly history of some media and politicians glorifying vigilante violence."

There are many problems with this line of argumentation, beginning with the fact that Daniel Penny wasn't a vigilante.

Merriam-Webster defines a vigilante as "a member of a volunteer committee organized to suppress and punish crime summarily (as when the processes of law are viewed as inadequate)."

There can be loner vigilantes, of course. If, say, someone Penny cared about was harmed by a mentally ill homeless man, and he started riding the subways looking for mentally ill homeless men like Neely to take vengeance on, that'd be vigilantism.

This is a version of the scenario that set the Charles Bronson character Paul Kersey on his path of blowing away New York City's muggers and lowlifes in the series of movies.

By contrast, conservatives are, as a general matter, viewing Penny as a defender of himself and, most importantly, those around him -- not an avenging angel administering the justice that Alvin Bragg refuses to.

Indications are that Penny (and his fellow passengers) sincerely believed Jordan Neely, suffering from untreated mental illness, was a threat to people on the train. There's still much we need to know about the particulars of the case, but the impulse to protect others is deeply admirable and rare.

Most people intuit this, and presumably even more so if they have ever been in the confined space of a subway car, with the cops nowhere to be found and

hating covetousness...men of good natural understanding and competent...men acting under the belief and awe of God as their inspector and judge...truly honest and upright in their principles and views, not governed by the sordid motives of self-interest...but by a sincere regard for the public good."

Evangelist Charles Finney was a fiery orator during the Great Awakening in America. He explained the connection between religion and politics: "The Church must take right ground in regard to politics... Politics are a part of a religion in such a country as this, and Christians must do their duty to the country as part of their duty to God...(God) will bless or curse this nation according to the course (Christians) take in politics.'

For the first 250 years in our nation's history, America's religious leaders believed it was their right to speak their conscience on issues of politics and morality from the pulpit. But all that changed in July 1954 when D-Texas Senator Lyndon B. Johnson's amendment to a 1954 tax bill allowed the Internal Revenue Service into the churches, restricting what they can and cannot say. The bill prohibits all 501©(3) non-profit organizations from endorsing or opposing political candidates.

"In 1954, Senator Lyndon Johnson added language to pending tax legislation to prevent two non-profit groups that opposed him in 1948 from speaking out against him in his 1954 re-election. The vexing perception is that the IRS is empowered with sweeping powers to strip a church's tax-exempt status if clergymen express particular views on a candidate," explained representatives of the 107th Congress.

According to testimony by D-Rep from Tennessee, Bob Clement regarding the Johnson Amendment, "There were no hearings. Rather, restrictions were imposed on people of faith as revolutionaries began their quest to remove any reference to a Creator from our one nation under God. The restrictions ban all forms of political expression, which has prompted some churches to avoid distributing voter guides and from taking positions on issues that are debated in political campaigns."

cessful attempts have been made to overturn the Johnson Amendment. In June 2001 during the 107th Congress, NC Rep. Walter B. Jones introduced HR2357 "The Houses of Worship Political Speech Protection Act" which was written to restore the rights of all religious organizations to determine for themselves what they can and cannot teach from their pulpits or communicate to their congregations and the public without fear that their tax status may be in jeopardy."

Former Rep. J.C. Watts R-Oklahoma "I am pleased to be a co-sponsor of this legislation to stop harassing churches and other places of worship when someone mentions politics. Those of us who support this bill are not advocating turning religious organizations into political parties. Rather, the legislation before us would permit the occasional discussion of issues of importance to congregations comprised of voting citizens. The gag rule on pastors, priests, rabbis and other religious leaders was not part of the Bill Of Rights.

On May 4, 2017, President Donald J. Trump signed an Executive Order 13798 to defend the freedom of religion and speech for the purpose of easing the Johnson Amendment's restrictions. While this Executive Order does not overturn the Johnson Amendment or exempt religious organizations from the restrictions on political campaign activity, it does direct the government (IRS) to not take adverse action against religious organizations or other similar 501©(3) organizations.

Section 1. Policy. It shall be the policy of the executive branch to vigorously enforce Federal law's robust protections for religious freedom. The Founders envisioned a Nation in which religious voices and views were integral to a vibrant public square, and in which religious people and institutions were free to practice their faith without fear of discrimination or retaliation by the Federal Government. Federal law protects the freedom of Americans and their organizations to exercise religion and participate fully in civic life without undue interference by the Federal Government.

Sec. 2. Respecting Religious and Political Speech. All executive departments and agencies shall... respect and protect the freedom of persons and organizations...to engage in religious and political speech. In particular, the Secretary of the Treasury shall ensure, to the extent permitted by law, that

the Department of the Treasury does not take any adverse action against any individual, house of worship, or other religious organization on the basis that such individual or organization speaks or has spoken about moral or political issues from a religious

However, numerous common sense Executive Orders initiated by President Trump were on the chopping block during Biden's first 30-days in office. A document authored by the Freedom From Religion Foundation, entitled "Secular Agenda for the 117th Congress & Biden Administration" proposed changes or recinding several Trump EO's regarding religious freedom, including EO 13798. Members of the FFRF include atheists, humanists, nonbelievers, secular (religious) organizations and freethinkers.

Here are a few of the FFRF proposed actions:

Draft a new regulation that would not allow for religious services exemptions in the event of a public health emergency

Modify or Repeal (Trump's) Executive Orders 13798 and

EO 13798, Promoting Free Speech and Religious Liberty which rolled back restrictions on religious institutions, particularly surrounding political speech and birth control.

EO 13831, Establishment of a White House Faith and Opportunity Initiative which has made it easier for faith-based organizations to access government funds, and directed this initiative to consult various faith leaders on government issues.

As former Rep. J. C. Watts articulated, "Churches have integrity. They are sacred places, protected under law and deserving of the liberties afforded to the rest of our great nation. The First Amendment rights of our consitituents shouldn't be curtailed because they happen to be sitting in a pew or on bended

Kaine wants answers from postal service on delivery delays

(The Center Square) – Sen. Tim Kaine is pressuring the U.S. Postal Service to address mail delivery issues plaguing some regions of Virginia.

Kaine is pressing for answers regarding "persistent issues" with mail delivery across the commonwealth and how the postal service plans to fix them.

"I am concerned that Virginia communities as far-flung as Smyth County in southwest Virginia, the Richmond area (nearly 300 miles away from Chilhowie by highway), and Arlington, across the river from Washington, D.C., are all experiencing missing bills, medications, tax documents, and days/weeks without mail," said Kaine.

In Kaine's letter to Scott Slusher, director of government liaison for the postal service, the senator cites varying complaints his office has received from constituents regarding significant delays in mail

The senator highlighted instances his office was alerted to mail delivery issues. In February, Thomas Bridge Water Corp. in Marion reported more than 1,800 households waited over two weeks to receive their bills.

When the senator's office followed up, at least half of the company's customers reported significant delays in receiving their March bills, leading to many customers complaining the issues led to repeated late charges.

"[Delayed mail delivery] has caused issues not only for us as a company, but also for our customers who are upset over past due/ late fee charges caused by the delay in delivery. We are constantly receiving phone calls from customers, complaining about these issues. We have not shut any one's water off but penalties and fees are most definitely an issue," the letter from Thomas Bridge Water Corp. reads.

Residents in Chilhowie notified the senator's office regarding utility bills delivered past the due date, despite being sent out two weeks prior. Similar complaints were fielded in the following two

In addition, a company in Henrico reported they failed to receive mail for two weeks, while a resident in Roanoke only received mail twice a week. Some Virginians even experienced significant

such as medications.

Kaine's office noted they received a response from the local post office apologizing for issues, blaming the delays on intermitent staffing problems.

Kaine added that delayed deliveries weren't the only issue plaguing the postal service in Virginia. Some residents reported never receiving vital items.

"Not only are Virginians waiting long periods of time for their deliveries, I've heard from some who have noticed that critical items are never delivered at all,' Kaine wrote in the letter.

"A Virginian in Arlington repeatedly went several days without mail over the period of several months and did not receive specific items, including a Virginia Auto Registration from the DMV and a Virginia driver's license," Kaine said.

Kaine noted in previous correspondence from the postal service that problems stemmed from staffing shortages, specifically due to the pandemic. The senator wants to know why staffing remains a problem three years post-pandemic. He also asks the postal service to identify specific regions of the commonwealth with "bottlenecks" of service and how they plan to address the challenges.

"I request that you review these concerns, provide information on how these are being addressed, and share what factors are causing what appear to be systemic challenges with processing mail promptly and getting it successfully to the right place," Kaine concluded.

The Center Square reached out to the postal service for comment, which had yet to respond at the time of publication.

Of course, if Penny had reacted the same way countering a perceived threat from a white man, the tragic event would be a blip; it's the catnip of a purported racial incident and the opportunity to put Penny, with no justification, in the company of long-ago racists acting extralegally to intimidate and kill Black people that makes the case irresistible for progres-

Penny's appointed role is to be an archetype, the "white vigilante," with no room for nuance or complication -- or even an accurate definition of vigilantism.

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The man and the mansion


Bluefield Entrepreneur Chris Disibbio sells historic Fort Chiswell Mansion

On a hill above the crossroads of one of the most traveled roadways in the east, a massive colonnaded brick house overlooks the merger of Interstates I-81 and I-77, as these highways pass by the town of Fort Chiswell, Virginia. This imposing antebellum structure, which is on Virginia's historical register, is known as the Fort Chiswell Mansion.

The town's name is derived from the fort built by Colonel James Chiswell back in 1758. Soon after the fort was completed, James McGavock who had recently immigrated from Ireland, joined the militia and found himself stationed at Fort Chiswell. McGavock eventually settled in the area and prospered in his newly adopted home. McGavock is known to be a signer of the Fincastle Resolutions of 1775, which are widely regarded as the precursor to the Declaration of Independence.





Stephan and Joseph McGavock, inherited the property and built the Fort Chiswell Mansion in the Greek Revival style. Today, the white columns adorning the front of the mansion can still be seen from the interstate. When the Fort Chiswell

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1840, travelers passed through this same valley on their way westward on the Great Wilderness Road.

The Fort Chiswell Mansion remained in the McGavock family until 1918, when it was eventually sold. Since then, there have been

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only a handful of owners and until recently, Chris Disibbio, a native of Bluefield, West Virginia, could include himself on this list.

In 1998, Chris Disibbio owned two gas stations, as well as a fair amount of heavy equipment, and several very large trucks. In addition to this, Disibbio was the owner/operator/chef of the trendy Key Ingredients Restaurant in Bluefield, West Virginia.

Business in Bluefield was good and Disibbio was thinking of expanding his Key Ingredients restaurant to a second location. It was during this time that he found that the Fort Chiswell Mansion was up for auction.

"I figured that the visibility with this place, particularly where it was situated at the crossroads of two interstates, would be a good place to establish my food concepts," said Disibbio. "Here I could do it in a setting that lended itself to my high quality, nutrient-dense, freshly prepared food."

'On top of that, I always passed the place as a kid when traveling from Bluefield to Claytor Lake,' Disibbio continued. "I saw it up here on the hill ... It's a landmark that has always fascinated me. When I realized that I may have the opportunity to own it, I wanted to see if I could make it happen."

Chris Disibbio did indeed 'make it happen' by bidding \$250,000 for the mansion and the five-acres of land that make up the grounds. After his successful bid, Disibbio found himself to be the new owner of one of Southwestern Virginia's most significant historic structures.

"There was a lot more work that went into it than what I had initially realized," admitted Disibbio. "I just knew that I was willing to do whatever it took to create my vision."

Aside from the McGavock brothers themselves, it's doubtful that any previous owner of the Fort Chiswell Mansion took as much time and effort to restore and even improve on this stately structure and its grounds. The owner prior to Disibbio was a woman named Arvella Brown. Coincidentally, Brown was also restauranteur, who came to Virginia from Washington D.C. to retire. When she died, she left the mansion to the church she attended in Wytheville.

"Arvella left the place to the Petunia Christian Church, which was charged with her final wishes of creating somewhat of a museum or a place that the public could come and see," stated Disibbio. "She always wanted to open it to the pub-

Upon completing a feasibility study, the church determined that there was no way of coming up with the resources to make Arvella's dream into a reality or of even maintaining the historic mansion. It was determined that church had to sell the property and Disibbio was at the right place at the right

time to make the purchase. "So, I continued on my quest to accomplish my goals, which were coincidentally what Arvella Brown had wished to see happen at the place," said Disibbio. "That made me feel good about what I

was doing, as well." What he was doing was a complete renovation and restoration of the structure, so that it could be made ready for the public.

"We updated the entrances and roads," Disibbio recounted. "We repaired the stone walls and did the landscaping and planted trees. We rebuilt all of the columns on the house. We put in gas fireplaces and did all the plaster work. We redid the roof. We redid sashes and woodwork and all the porches."

In addition, Disibbio added a third-floor bathroom to the mansion as well as a commercial kitchen, an ice cream shop and retail

store in the outlying buildings. These renovations occurred over several years but in the meantime Disibbio utilized the mansion and its grounds for special events. Disibbio hosted two Seed To Soul Festivals, which promoted the growing of wholesome foods, while providing food and entertainment to festival goers. Disibbio also used the mansion to host to weddings, car shows, barbeques, future Farmers of America meetings and even Healthy Foods Foundation conferences, which featured lectures delivered by Virginia Tech professors.

To bolster the idea that nutrient dense foods are a key ingredient to a healthy lifestyle, Disibbio built a huge, and period appropriate, timber frame structure adjacent to the mansion.

"We originally built the timber frame for the Key Ingredients for Life nonprofit organization to establish the Farmer's Market, so that local farmers and food growers would have a place to come and sell their goods on my site,' Disibbio explained. "One of the biggest challenges that I was incurring, was sourcing food for my restaurants."

Though Disibbio staged several events at the Fort Chiswell Mansion through the years, the economic anchor for his business there was that of serving food, something that Disibbio has been dedicated to for most of his adult life.

"Except for one day that I went to a funeral, I prepared every single plate of food that was served here for 10 years," said he.

In addition to the food, those venturing to the Fort Chiswell Mansion, often from the interstate, were eager to tour the historic venue. Disibbio hired amateur historians, Rupert Hill and Davy Davis, to conduct these house tours. Davis can trace his ancestry all the way back to the McGavock brothers.

"Davy Davis and Rupert Hill were here one day when I was cooking in the kitchen and I had told them a story about my grandmother, whose maiden name was Massey," Disibbio recounted. "She was related to Judge Massey, who was shot in the Carroll County Courthouse in 1912. Davy, being the historian that he is, went and sat with Rupert for about 15 minutes. Then he came back into the kitchen and said 'Chris, you are a McGavock. As a matter of fact, you are more of a McGavock than I am!' He drew out the entire family tree, from the Masseys down to me."

"Wow ... that was a chilling moment," Disibbio continued "So, a lot of the time along the way, through some of the struggles, I questioned 'Why am I here? Why am I doing this? Why am I taking all these years and money to ac-

complish this?' I knew it was something that was in me. I don't know how to really describe the relationship in my mind that I have with my predecessors, who lived and resided and built this place. I suppose no one will really understand. I just felt compelled to do it."

And yet, after nearly a quarter century of ownership and, by his own estimate, more than a million dollars invested in renovations, Chris Disibbio decided to sell the Mansion.

Why?

"COVID," he answered. "COVID crushed my dream. I stayed open for seven months during the COVID crisis and finally realized that it just didn't make any sense to try ... to try to remain open. All of our business came from groups and gatherings and weddings and tour buses and the restaurant. These were the revenue arteries for my business. Everything was heavily impacted by COVID."

After a pause, Disibbio continued to recount events of his recent past.

"I had several things that for years I've been saying I needed to do but never had time to do them," he said. "So, I finally decided that if I'm not able to be productive here, then maybe I should go ahead and focus on doing some of these other unfinished projects in Bluefield."

After having applied for several COVID related grants, Disibbio managed to secure only one Economic Injury Disaster Loan. This helped some, but not enough to keep the property economically viable.

"At that time, I had just about paid everything off," Disibbio stated. "All the renovations, the restorations, the upfitting ... I was paying for it as I as I went. I only owed a total of about \$120,000 on the entire property and I found myself in a situation where I wasn't cash flowing. Then I came to terms with the idea that ... maybe I will have to sell this place."

With that, Chris Disibbio put the Fort Chiswell Mansion up for sale and he soon received an offer for the full asking price.

"I had an opportunity to sell the place to an individual that is in the adult entertainment business ... strip clubs," Disibbio recounted. "I declined to negotiate or sell simply because of the purpose that he wanted the place for."

Three months later, another interested buyer came calling in the form of Will Adkins. He, along with his twin brother Mark, formed the Waterfront Group, which owns properties in several states.

"Will ... Mr. Adkins, arrived by his helicopter and landed here at the mansion and we spent three or four hours together that day," Disibbio recounted. "Shortly after then, we made a deal."

Towards the end of the meeting, Chris Disibbio accepted Will Adkins offer of \$2.5 million for the iconic 19th Century structure. But Adkins wasn't quite finished with Disibbio.

"I figured that I would gather up my personal belongings and go on my way and see what the next stage in my life was supposed to be," Disibbio recounted. "Then Mr. Adkins told me that he wanted me to work for him. I told him I didn't know that I wanted to work for anybody and offered to work for free for six months just to help him through the transition period. I'd never worked as someone's employee before but Mr. Adkins is very, very, very persistent when he wants something and ultimately wound up hiring me. I agreed to work for six months, so it's now 13 months later and we plan to open the mansion up again sometime this year."

Before the Fort Chiswell Mansion again opens to the public, this time under new ownership, Disibbio was tasked with completing several additional improvements to the property, such as enlarging the timber frame that stands adjacent to the Mansion. Adkins also wants to resurface the road entering the property and to connect to the county's water line before he makes the Mansion available for public events but no reopening date has been set.

But that's not all. Adkins has also tasked Disibbio with managing and renovating properties within the Waterfront Group, which owns vineyards, golf courses and several high-end residential developments.

"So, in my position ... although I never got a job description, I could be doing anything from maintenance work on one of our properties to designing buildings or buying land or selling land or negotiating deals," Disibbio explained.

One might say that Chris Disibbio came out ahead with his venture into this historically significant structure. But though he'll be working to open the Fort Chiswell Mansion to the public again, he'll be doing so as an employee and not an owner.

For the last decade or so, this Wythe County property has been at the forefront of Chris Disibbio's thoughts and actions. No doubt the sale of the Fort Chiswell Mansion was a bittersweet experience for this Bluefield born entrepreneur but perhaps, too, the sale imparted some sense of relief to the former owner.

"Any restaurant done right is more than a 40-hour full time job, especially in a setting like this and especially when you set a high standard for food," Disibbio opined. "The age of the structure means



If I wasn't doing the landscaping or mowing the grass or trimming the trees or pruning the apple trees or planting a garden or repairing shutters or preparing to paint the place or working on the timber frame or booking events or talking to customers or acquiring the food, prepping the food, cooking the food ... then I was repairing plumbing and electrical and just constant ... you know, maintenance work."


Still, it sounds as though Disibbio will be plenty busy under the direction of his new his new employer. When he isn't working, Chris lives with his wife Rhonda in Mooresville, North Carolina.

All those years ago, when Chris Disibbio decided to place a bid on the Fort Chiswell Mansion, he had a vision of providing people with a deliciously unique experience in a fabulous setting. He made that happen and by most any standard, Disibbio left this historical jewel in better shape than he found it. He is now permanently part of the legacy of the Fort Chiswell Mansion.

"Anything I've owned in the past ... I've never thought twice about selling," Disibbio confided. "I'm not saying that I'm thinking twice about this but ... it's rewarding to think that the mansion will continue to evolve in a manner that would be befitting of the place."





BLACKSBURG - The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame has added to its prestige this week, as it announced its seven newest members as part of the 2023 class on Tuesday.

The 2023 class of inductees includes:

Bob Bowman, a three-sport athlete that earned 12 varsity letters at Virginia Tech and claimed two Southern Conference wrestling titles.

Malcolm Delaney, a two-time All-American (honorable mention) that currently ranks third in program history in career assists and points.

Kyle Fuller, an All-American in 2013 with All-ACC recognition in three seasons and the No. 14 overall pick in the 2014 NFL

Carrie Mason, a four-year starter for the Hokies that finished her career as the school's all-time leader in 3-pointers made and games started at the time.

Jazmine Reeves, an integral piece of the Hokies' 2013 College Cup side that was the first Hermann Trophy semifinalist and first-team NSCAA All-American in program history.

David Wilson, the 2011 ACC Player of the Year and second-team All-American that still holds the program's single-season rushing yards record.

Alexander Ziegler, a three-time NCAA champion and seven-time All-American that claimed four ACC titles in his career at Tech.

The seven-member class will be honored during the Tech vs. Purdue football game weekend. The hall of fame dinner and ceremony is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 8 at The Inn at Virginia Tech. NASCAR heads back out west

After an outstanding debut last season, the NASCAR Cup Series will be returning to the World Wide Technology Raceway for this weekend's Enjoy Illinois 300 presented by TicketSmarter this Sunday, June 4 at 3:30 p.m. ET on FS1, MRN and SiriusXM NASCAR Radio – the 15th race of the 26-race regular season.

World Wide Technology Raceway, located in Madison, Illinois just outside St. Louis, was originally built as a drag strip and road course in 1985 and was originally known as St. Louis International Raceway Park. In 1994, new See ACC, page B4 ownership acquired the track. The existing tracks (drag strip and road course) were demolished over the course of 1995-1996 and a new oval speedway and drag strip were constructed.

The current 1.25-mile oval that is World Wide Technology Raceway has a unique shape and different degrees of banking in each set of turns. The backstretch is confined to run parallel with Illinois Route 203, making Turns 1 & 2 a tighter radius than Turns 3 & 4. Turns 1 & 2 have similar characteristics to New Hampshire Motor Speedway while Turns 3 & 4 are similar to Phoenix Raceway. The track's egg shape mimics the legendary Darlington Raceway. The facility now has more than 700 acres welcoming fans this weekend.

The first NASCAR national series race held at World Wide Technology Raceway was a NASCAR Xfinity Series race held on June 26, 1997 - Elliott Sadler won the event.

Though this will only be the second NASCAR Cup Series event this weekend at the 1.25-mile track, World Wide Technology Raceway has hosted 15 NASCAR Xfinity Series races from 1997-2010 and 22 NASCAR CRAFTSMAN Truck Series races from 1998-2010 and 2014-2022.

Team Penske's Joey Logano is the defending winner of the inaugural NASCAR Cup Series race at World Wide Technology Raceway - one of 19 different

tracks the Connecticut native has won at in the series. Eight other drivers entered this weekend have won in either the NASCAR Xfinity Series or the NASCAR CRAFTSMAN Truck Series at World Wide Technology Raceway, led by Kevin Harvick with three NASCAR national series wins at the 1.25-mile track (NXS 2000, 2001 and NCTS 2010); followed by Christopher Bell (NCTS 2016), Kyle Busch (NXS 2009), Ross Chastain (NCTS 2019), Justin Haley (NCTS 2018), Brad Keselowski (NXS 2010), Martin Truex Jr. (NXS 2004) and Bubba Wallace (NCTS 2014) each with one

All the on-track action begins for the NASCAR Cup Series this weekend with practice and Busch Light Pole Qualifying on Saturday, June 3 at 10 a.m. ET on FS1.

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

This is to give notice that the New River Valley Regional Commission (NRVRC) under 24 CFR part 58 has determined that the following proposed action under the Appalachian Regional Commission POWER grant program and the Department of Housing and Community Development Project (22-PW-02A) is located in the 100-year floodplain and a riverine, and the NRVRC will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating the action in the floodplain/wetland and the potential impacts on the floodplain/wetland from the proposed action, as required by both Executive Order 11988 and 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands. The proposed project area includes the development of a new concrete boat launch on the bank of the New River in Pulaski County off Hazel Hollow Rd. The project area is approximately .75 acres, located entirely within the 100-year Floodplain and partially within a riverine. The project provides motorized and non-motorized boat access to the New River at Sheffey Park, thus expanding the recreational opportunities for Pulaski County residents and tourists. This project will benefit the livability of our region and the burgeoning outdoor recreation economy. The Pulaski County boat launch at Sheffey Park is one of four new/ enhanced boat launches that will extend the existing 37 miles of the New River Water Trail (Giles County) to the rest of the region, totaling 61 miles upon completion. The project includes several related components: construction of a boat launch, parking suitable for vehicles with trailers, and a foot path connecting Smith Farm Park (currently being developed). The project is located at 7422 Hazel Hollow Rd, New River, VA 24141.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains/wetlands and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Nine killed in seven crashes on Virginia highways over holiday

RICHMOND – The 2023 Memorial Day weekend proved deadly for nine drivers and passengers, to include four motorcyclists.* The holiday statistical counting period began Friday, May 26, 2023, at 12:01 a.m. and concluded at midnight Monday, May 29, 2023. The Virginia State Police not only participated in the nationwide, state-sponsored Operation Crash Awareness Reduction Effort (C.A.R.E.) during the Memorial Day weekend, but also the annual Click It or Ticket seat belt education and enforcement campaign. During the designated statistical counting period, Virginia Troopers cited 771 seat belt violations and 136 child restraint violations.

We are in the midst of schools letting out and summer travel plans Settle, Virginia State Police Superintendent. "If this past Memorial Day weekend is any indication of what Virginia's highways may look like during the coming summer months, then we desperately need drivers and passengers to make a committed effort to buckle up everyone in a vehicle, share the road responsibly with motorcycles, and drive distraction free. Responsible, safe, and sober driving saves lives. It is really that simple.'

The Church, **Persecuted But Not** Destroyed

Part One Acts Chapter 12 in a very thought provoking and fascinating book in the Bible. In this Chapter we see the harsh, cruel persecution of the Church growing with each passing day. It became so intense that the turn out to Church Services in Jerusalem was declining. The Jews hated the Christians and were persecuting them on every hand. To add to the utter dismay of the Christians, King Herod Aggripa, the puppet king of the Roman Empire, joined in with more oppression.

The Christians however faced the fiery trial of their faith by leaning on God and receiving renewed courage and strength to stand firm against intimidation and maltreatment.

Our God is an ever present help in times of trouble. He's always there for us to help us get through the difficult times in our lives. When we run into opposition, adversity, persecution, or any other fiery trials of our faith, we can call upon God and our prayer answering God will send help from above. We can look unto the hills from whence cometh out help. Our help cometh from the Lord Which made Heaven and Earth. (Psalm 121:1) And God, Who never leaves us or forsakes us will always be there for us to help us through the lowest places of our lives. When we lift up our eyes

towards heaven, the place of the habitation of our God, and call upon His holy Name for help, we can expect to receive the deliverance that we need. Prayer changes things. God changes things. There is great power in heartfelt prayer and we ought to pray always. I came upon this great saying posted by Jennifer Flanders who is one of many who have also quoted it. King Herod Aggripa began a severe persecution of the Church in Jerusalem. He had James killed. James was an Apostle and one of the chief leaders of the Church at Jerusalem. When Aggripa saw that it pleased the Jews, meaning the Jewish Religious Establishment, those who had plotted against Jesus and caused Him to be crucified, he had Peter captured and locked up in a prison. The Church had already been suffering persecution by the Jewish Religious Leaders, and now they were also persecuted by the civil Authority.

The word [persecute] means to hurt; to mistreat; to harass; to subject someone to hostility and ill-treatment; to oppress; and to trouble persistently.

His main target was the Leaders of the Church. James was the brother of John, one of the sons of Zebedee, and Herod had him executed. Next he went after Peter. He wanted to execute Peter as well. He thought if he could cut off the head, the body of Christ would die. If he could destroy the pillars of the Church, the Apostles, that the whole building would fall. However, the Apostles were not the real head of the Church. Jesus Christ, our resurrected Lord, is the head of the body of
