Mrs. Becky Blevins will be the new principal at Pulaski County Middle School beginning with the 2024-25 school year.

Blevins' appointment was announced Tuesday during a meeting of the School Board.

Blevins replaces Rebecah Smith who will transfer to the position of Elementary Instructional Coach/Specialist effective July 1. Smith had served as principal at the middle school since the school opened in September 2020.

Mrs. Blevins comes to PCMS from Pulaski County High School where she has served as assistant principal since 2020.

In making the announcement, School Board Chairman Josh Taylor thanked Smith for her "hard work and dedication in getting Pulaski County Middle Blevins graduated from Patrick

She moved to Pulaski County High School in 2012 before returning to Dublin Middle as an assistant principal in 2017.

PCEA budget priorities presented to school board

The Pulaski County Education Association made its annual presentation on budget priorities during Tuesday's public hearing on the 2024-25 school budget.

The budget hearing led off the monthly school board meeting, which included a variety of presentations, information and action items - including finalizing plans for testing days for students and early release for students due to an expected solar eclipse.

PCEA President Candy Castelluccio said she feels optimistic about the proposed budgets in Richmond, where a large portion of Pulaski

County's school funding comes our employees offset the effects from.

Castelluccio spoke on three budget priorities established by the PCEA - teacher and staff raises, insurance costs and the need for an additional art and music teacher at the elementary level.

"We all know that having highly qualified experienced teachers is a critical component of student success," Castelluccio stated. "In the recent past, the school system and former school board did a great job of working to ensure raises were given each year. This has helped

insurance On costs. Castelluccio said, "It is amazing and rare that our county has held insurance premiums steady or actually lower in the past seven years. Keeping insurance premiums low for our employees means that our loved ones have access to the insurance care they need."

As for the need for an additional art and music teacher at the elementary level, Castelluccio said, "there are numerous studies that show

students have higher reading levels and better test scores when they have frequent access to the fine arts."

She continued that the additional teachers will also help ensure elementary teachers get the planning time they need to do their job more effectively.

priorities "These are important to the members of the local education association. We appreciate the work this board, the Board of Supervisors and the county administrator will do to ensure that our students and staff have access to the best resources we can offer," she added.

Michael Reis, a Pulaski resident and member of Pulaski Town Council, addressed the school board on what he called, "future priorities."

"Sometime during this year, the high school will be 50 years old," Reis stated. "I'm very heartened to see that we have continued the work of doing things like replacing doors and roofs. That's very important and much appreciated."

But most importantly, Reis continued, is thinking about the high school for the next 50 years.

"What are we going to look like in the next 50 years when that high school is 100 years old." he asked.

"What I want to encourage you to do between now and then is to think about the legacy that you all want to leave when it comes to the high school. Think about what you as a board can do today that will resonate throughout the next two, three, four or five decades," Reis said.

He continued that, as of right now, school debt has declined by \$1 million since 2017 excluding of course the debt from the construction of the new middle school.

Reis asked how that money will be spent in the next several years to ensure that high school facilities remain state of the art as they were in 1974 when PCHS was built.

Reis asked the board to think about what needs to be done to improve the high school over the next 50 years to ensure that it continues to be a place "where the people we want to see move to the county view it as an investment and not a problem.

Solar Eclipse

According to Graham, on Monday, April 8 a total solar eclipse will cross North America - passing over Mexico, the U.S. and Canada. That just so happens to be the same day schools in Pulaski County re-open after Spring Break.

Graham said several meetings have been held loally to consider the possibility of April 8 being a "beautiful day."

"The time-line here is for the eclipse to happen right as we're getting out of school and buses will be on the roads, and it will be difficult to see," Graham said, adding that the schools can't guarantee that students won't be looking at the eclipse as they go home.

He said he had discussed the situation with other school superintendents in the region and about half are considering early release for students that day.

Some of the school districts, he noted, are even considering buying solar eclipse glasses for students.

"That would be about \$6,000 for us for basically about 10 minutes use. I'm not sure that would be the smartest use of our money," Graham said.

"But I do worry about our students and those who are taking buses home during this period of time," he said.

Acknowledging it could be cloudy that day or raining even, Graham said it is his recommendation that schools close early that day.

The board approved a threehour early release.

According to internet research, one of the biggest risks associated with staring at the sun during a solar eclipse is retinopathy, which can occur when solar radiation damages the retinas of the eyes.

Many people stricken with solar retinopathy will recover in three to six months, but permanent damage can occur.

Only those with eclipse glasses or solar viewers can look safely at the eclipse, and say sunglasses experts qualify. A total solar eclipse occurs At the request of School when the moon passes between the Earth and the sun, completely blocking the sun's face. Astronomers say this is the last such event until August 2044.

Flood Awareness Week observed

RICHMOND - Governor Glenn Youngkin has declared March 10-16 Virginia Flood Awareness Week. It's a time for Virginians to prepare for potential flooding ahead of spring rains, summer downpours and the upcoming hurricane season.

"Floods are the most common natural disaster and can happen without warning across the commonwealth. We encourage Virginians to take proactive steps to protect themselves and their property by assessing their flood risk and with flood insurance coverage," said Department of Conservation and Recreation Director Matthew Wells.

DCR coordinates flood-protection activities across the state and helps communities comply with the National Flood Insurance Program, which allows homeowners to purchase federally backed flood insurance regardless of flood zone.

Virginians can input their address into DCR's Virginia Flood Risk Information System (VFRIS) to assess their property's flood risk. The online platform was recently updated for mobile compatibility and new features include 3D visualization and the Flood Stories tool.

Tik Tok


Everyone knows TikTok is the video sharing application ("app") that people of all ages use, especially younger people. In fact, according to TikTok, 170 million Americans use the social media app

Unlike other popular social media sites (Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, etc.), TikTok is linked to the Chinese Communist Party (CCP). In China, the Communist Party runs the government.

TikTok is currently owned by its Chinese parent company ByteDance.

The CCP requires companies like ByteDance to cooperate with their government, share information, etc.

According to Axios, former ByteDance executive Yintao Yu claimed that ByteDance "has served as a useful propaganda tool for the Chinese Communist



The Energy and Commerce E & C) Committee, on done a lot of work Congress this

to investigate this issue and figure out legislative solutions.

Last March, TikTok's CEO Shou Chew came in to testify before the Committee. It was clear throughout the hearing that despite claims to the contrary, TikTok, through ByteDance, is closely connected to the CCP.

As a long-standing member of the legal community, I was particularly appalled that Mr. Chew on the one hand said TikTok was completely separate from ByteDance, and on the other, was totally unabashed that TikTok and ByteDance have the same lawyers.

The Committee recently considered H.R. 7521, the Protecting Americans from Foreign Adversary Controlled Applications Act, designed to tackle national security threats like the one posed by TikTok.

The legislation is aimed at protecting the United States of America by preventing foreign adversaries, specifically, China, Iran, North Korea, or Russia, from targeting and surveilling U.S. citizens and manipulating American public opinion and policy through their apps, like TikTok.

Make no mistake, TikTok can be informative and a lot of fun, but it can also be used nefariously by the Chinese Communist Party.

In the bill, if an app is determined to be owned by a company controlled by a foreign adversary, the app must be divested (i.e. sold off) by the foreign adversary's company or the app will be prohibited in the United States. But, once sold, the app would be allowed for use in the United States.

I attended security briefings on the legislation. Also, at a previous public hearing before a different committee, former U.S. National Security Agency Director Paul Nakasone testified about TikTok. He stated the app "...provides a foreign nation a platform for information operations, a platform for surveillance ... "

Before the bill was introduced, I was asked to review the draft language and helped to craft the final product.

Two Heroines from Georgia

There couldn't be a bigger contrast between two women from the state of Georgia, who many consider heroines. Both have an element of fiction to their stories. Both were living in challenging times of war in America. Both were strong and independent. The difference is that one of them was based on historical fiction, and the other is an actual historical figure, with possibly some fiction mixed in.

You may have guessed - I'm thinking of Scarlett O'Hara from Gone With the Wind; and Ann "Nancy" Morgan Hart, from Wilkes County, Georgia.

Unlike Scarlett O'Hara who grew up in a opulent society, Nancy Hart's early life was of pioneer stock. She grew up along the western frontier in North Carolina and learned traditional life skills for women such as housekeeping, cooking, sewing and raising children. As part of a family who depended on the land to survive, she also learned how to hunt, fish and farm. These were lifesaving skills she would need later while raising eight children on the frontier.

Her appearance is described as sixfoot tall, red-haired and with her face scarred by small-pox. Although she couldn't read or write, she developed other skills as an excellent hunter, skilled markswoman, and a knowledgeable



It is traditionally thought herbalist. that she is related to Daniel Boone and Brigadier General Daniel Morgan, commander of the most successful rifle corps of the American Revolution.


Around age 25, she married a farmer named Benjamin Hart. At first, they attempted to settle in several areas in the Carolinas, but finally made their home in the Colony of George, along the Broad River. As the American Revolution began, Benjamin joined the Georgia militia and fought for the Patriots.

At times, Nancy was left to care for the family and the farm by herself. There is a story of Nancy's heroism, which supposedly took place during the absence of her husband during the Revolution. It has several versions but this was the one published in a book in 1848, "The Women of the American Revolution" by Elizabeth Fries Ellett.

The rise of Trump nostalgia

Donald Trump obviously left office on a sour note in January 2021, written off by many opinion-makers and political professionals. Then, President Biden happened.

The most remarkable phenomenon of the 2024 election cycle so far is the rise of Trump nostalgia. It's difficult for anyone to have a new opinion about former President Trump, who is so well-known, so in-your-face, and so polarizing. Yet, people have a new, more favorable attitude toward his presidency in retrospect, certainly compared to the current occupant of the White House.

After about 36 months of President Biden, in other words, people yearn for the halcyon Trump years.

Consider the latest CBS News poll. It found that, looking back, 46% of people consider Trump's administration excellent or good, about 5 points higher than his average job approval when he left office. Only 33% say the same about Biden's time in office.

Even more starkly, on the economy, 65% think the economy was good under Trump, and only 28% think it was bad. In almost a mirror image, only 38% think the economy is good under Biden and 59 think it is bad.

By the end of his term, Trump didn't rate nearly as high. After the disruptions of the pandemic, about 51% of people approved of Trump's handling of the economy.

According to a November 2020 Economist/YouGov poll, people were split, 42-42 whether the economy would get better or worse under a President Biden. This was about even with Trump's ratings -- 45% thought the economy would get better if he was reelected, 40% worse.

ban TikTok, we just want its ties to the CCP severed permanently and irrevocably.

Immediately prior to the bill being brought up in Committee, E&C Members were part of a 4-hour executive session/classified hearing.

Because it was a classified hearing, I cannot discuss the details. But even without the classified hearing, it is clear that many in our intelligence community believe TikTok is a national security threat.

The information we learned was alarming enough to bring Republicans and Democrats together in the defense of the United States.

The legislation passed Committee unanimously (50-0!) and will next be considered by the full House.

When TikTok caught wind that the Committee was considering this legislation, their online disinformation campaign against the legislation was robust, and quite astonishing.

Targeted American users who tried to access TikTok were compelled to call their Congressman before they could even access the app's features.

TikTok also released a false statement on social media stating that the bill was "an outright ban of TikTok."

As explained above, if TikTok is sold by ByteDance, it is free to operate in the United States. But clearly, the CCP does not want to give up their ability to spy and manipulate.

Further, they stated that the bill "tramples the First Amendment rights" of Americans (like China really cares about free speech).

I believe saying this bill would violate the First Amendment is incorrect. The Supreme Court makes a distinction between laws based on the content of speech vs. conduct. Laws based on conduct, which threatens national security, particularly when likely orchestrated by a foreign power, are not "per se' violations of the First Amendment.

Content placed on TikTok by American citizens is not the issue. Conduct is.

America is at risk!

While I can not share everything I know, I am convinced TikTok, while owned by ByteDance, a Beijing Company, and directed by the CCP, can be used to damage American security.

Last week, the Virginia General Assembly gaveled out of the 2024 legislative session, officially adjourning on Saturday, March 9th after much debate on the Commonwealth's budget put forth by House and Senate Democrats. Governor Glenn Youngkin provided the General Assembly a responsible budget that was supposed to be the framework by which the Democratic-controlled Appropriations Committees worked toward the shared priorities of all Virginians. Instead, the product presented by Democrats to the General Assembly was stripped of tax breaks and meaningful public safety spending, and it substituted those items for others on the left's wish list. It was a disappointing development, and it's why I joined the majority of my Republican colleagues in voting against the budget.

First, the budget contains a tax hike of more than \$2 billion over the course of

two years – with no offsetting tax breaks - in the form of new sales taxes on digital goods and services. This means that the online subscriptions most of us have come to enjoy and rely on, such as videostreaming, downloads, cloud storage, and other services may soon be getting more expensive. This is particularly tone-deaf when the cost of living continues to rise with inflation.

The budget also reintroduces Virginia to the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), which is a multistate compact of mostly northeastern states that seeks to limit - and eventually eliminate – all electricity generation that is not produced by so-called renewable energy sources. While solar and wind power certainly have a place in production of electricity, it is baffling that Democrats continue to believe that Virginia's energy needs can be met by these sources alone while making our current energy sources less available and more expensive. All the while, our household energy bills continue to rise due in part to these arbitrary limitations.

Alarmingly, the Commonwealth's budget makes harmful cuts to public

safety by eliminating funding to recruit law enforcement and cutting funding for school security, and it also allows for the early release of violent criminals. The Youngkin administration has worked for the last two years on Operation Bold Blue Line to recruit law enforcement officers back to the job. The budget passed by General Assembly Democrats cuts \$18 million in funding to recruit law enforcement officers. This is in addition to \$10 million in cuts in funding for critical school resources officers that keep our students safe in school. Perhaps most mind-boggling is budget language that would allow over 8,000 inmates to have their sentences reduced, 99% of which have been convicted of a violent felony (to include murder, rape, and sex offenders). I could not in good conscience vote for a budget that makes Virginia less safe.

The Commonwealth's budget is the preeminent barometer of the state's priorities, both philosophically and pragmatically. Not all is bad; the budget contains - and I do support - raises for teachers and law enforcement. These are items that I will fight hard to keep in the final budget product. But when taken as a whole, Virginians don't want to return to an era of increased tax burden, reduced public safety, and higher energy costs. The passed-budget will now be considered by Governor Youngkin, who will offer line item amendments or vetoes to any portion of it. The General Assembly will reconvene in mid-April to vote on the Governor's recommendations, and it is my sincere hope that House and Senate Democrats seriously consider tax relief for Virginians while responsibly investing in the core functions of government.

In today's context, those are numbers from another universe, and would materially improve Biden's chances of re-election if they still held.

Of course, it was Trump's conduct after the 2020 election that blighted his image such that it seemed hard to come back from. In January 2021, according to another Economist/YouGov poll, 55% of people thought Trump shouldn't be allowed to run again, and 50% thought he should be removed from office.

Now, according to CBS, 52% of people are supporting him for president, and the democracy issue is a wash. Thirty-four percent think democracy will be safe only if Biden wins and 33% only if Trump wins.

What has created the afterthe-fact fondness for Trump?

Most fundamentally, Joe Biden has eased his 1967 Corvette Stingray out of his garage in Wilmington, Delaware, and driven it straight into a ditch. His presidency is such a wide-ranging failure that he'd make almost any predecessor look better. In the 2020 election, Biden benefited from the question "compared to whom?" Sure, he was an undistinguished, uninteresting, aged politician, but compared to Trump he seemed like reassuring normalcy. In 2024, Trump is benefiting from the same question. Sure, he's a radioactive figure whose

presidency was unnecessarily chaotic and controversial, but compared to Biden he seems competent and effective.

Also, Trump has been a little less prominent. He's not flying under the radar, but every social media post doesn't create its own news cycle the way it did when he was president. This makes it easier for people to focus on what they liked rather than the latest outrage.

Finally, another way to look at it is that Trump would have won re-election in 2020 if it hadn't been for the pandemic. Now that the pandemic is in the rear-view mirror and looks more like an event beyond the control of any officeholder, Trump is bouncing back to where he was prior to its onset -- and has improved his chances of winning election again.

TITLE: None of this is to deny that Trump has vulnerabilities, and Biden still has cards to play. But it's no small thing that Biden's record is found wanting when matched up with that of the man who occupied the office just three years ago. Trump nostalgia, in short, is a clear and present danger to Biden's presidency.



Dollar Tree to close nearly 1,000 stores after loss

Dollar Tree swung to a surprise fourth-quarter loss and will close nearly 1,000 stores after the discount retailer slashed the value of a rival chain it acquired almost a decade ago.

Dollar Tree acquired Family Dollar for more than \$8 billion in 2015 after a bidding war with rival Dollar General, but it has had difficulty absorbing the chain.

On Wednesday, Dollar Tree said that it would record a \$950 million impairment against the trade name Family Dollar, on top of a \$1.07 billion goodwill charge. Family Dollar will spend more than \$594 million closing or rebranding stores, essentially erasing profits from the holiday season.

'This dramatic cull is the coup de grâce in the rather botched acquisition of the Family Dollar chain, which has caused Dollar Tree nothing but hassle since it was completed back in 2015," wrote Neil Saunders, managing director of GlobalData. "Basically, almost ten years on,

the mess it inherited and has not been able to completely turn around," Saunders said.

Saunders said in an emailed statement that nearly 12% of current Family Dollar stores will be closing over the next three years.

of Dollar Tree Shares tumbled 14% at the opening bell Wednesday.

For the three months ended Feb. 3, Dollar Tree lost \$1.71 billion, or \$7.85 per share. A year earlier the Chesapeake, Virginia, company earned \$452.2 million, or \$2.04 per share.

Stripping out certain items, earnings were \$2.55 per share, which is still short of the per-share earnings of \$2.67 expected on Wall Street, according to a survey by Zacks Investment Research.

Revenue climbed to \$8.64 billion from \$7.72 billion, a bit below Wall Street's estimate of \$8.67 billion.

Dollar Tree has been attracting consumers that have been stung by inflation as they seek to cut spending. During the quarter, sales at Dollar Tree stores open at least a year climbed 6.3%, with traffic up 7.1%. While more shoppers were heading to stores, they were closely watching how much they spent, with average ticket down 0.7%.

At Family Dollar, sales at stores open at least a year slipped 1.2%. Traffic edged up 0.7%, but average ticket fell 2%.

For fiscal 2024, Dollar Tree anticipates earnings between \$6.70 and \$7.30 per share.



Peter explains why these things happen when he says, our "Adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour." Evangelical Christians war-time volunteers in Israel

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) When Shawn Landis, an evangelical Christian from Pennsylvania, heard about the Oct. 7 Hamas attack on southern Israel, he knew he would come to Israel to volunteer as soon as it was safe.

Five months later, he was chopping vegetables in a Tel Aviv kitchen, preparing meals for Israeli soldiers.

Evangelicals have been among Israel's fiercest foreign supporters for years, particularly in the United States, where their significant political influence has helped shape the Israel policy of recent Republican administrations.

They believe Israel is key to an end-times prophecy that will bring about the return of the Christian Messiah. Many of these Christians support Israel due to

FSU knocks Hokies out of ACC Tourney

WASHINGTON (AP) - Jamir Watkins scored 12 of his career-high 34 points in the final three minutes, Jalen Warley added 18 points and No. 9 seed Florida State pulled away in the second half to beat No. 8 seed Virginia Tech 86-76 on Wednesday in the second round of the ACC Tournament.

Watkins was 9 of 15 from the field and 14 of 17 at the free-throw line to set a program record for points in an ACC Tournament game. He also had 11 rebounds and four steals. Warley made 8 of his 10 shots as Florida State shot 54% from the field.

Virginia Tech was 4-of-17 shooting in the opening 17 minutes of the second half. The Hokies also finished with 13 turnovers, leading to 25 points for the Seminoles.

Florida State (17-15) advances to play top-seeded and fourth-ranked North Carolina in the quarterfinals on Thursday. The Seminoles dropped both regularseason meetings with the Tar Heels, 78-70 on the road and 75-68 at home. Florida State hasn't beaten North Carolina since the 2020-21 season.

Tyler Nickel sank a long 3-pointer with 7:28 left to tie it at 57-all, but Virginia Tech did not make another field goal until Sean Pedulla's basket with 2:42 left to pull within 71-62.

Florida State took advantage of back-toback Virginia Tech turnovers with layups by Warley and Primo Spears to take a 63-58 lead with 5:01 left. Another steal under the basket led to Warley's fast-break layup to make it 68-58 at 3:06.

Each team turned it over on an inbounds play and Watkins was fouled before making two free throws at 2:49. Watkins added two more free throws at 2:30 and had an alleyoop dunk at 2:11 for a 74-65 lead.

Spears finished with 10 points for the Seminoles.

Pedulla scored 24 points, Nickel added 18 and MJ Collins had 15 for Virginia Tech (18-14).

Both teams shot 55% or better from the field in the first half. Virginia Tech shot 64% (16 of 25), despite going 4 of 11 from 3-point range, in the first half before finishing at 49%.

finalist for the Jerry West Award for the top shooting guard in the country. Davis has scored at least 20 points 19 times this season, which is the most 20-point games in a season by a Tar Heel since Justin Jackson also had 19 in 40 games in 2016-17, which also marked UNC's last ACC Player of the Year honoree. He is on pace to become the first Tar Heel to lead the ACC in scoring since Tyler Hansbrough in 2007-08 and record UNC's highest scoring average since Hansbrough averaged 22.6 that same season.

In his third season at the helm of his alma mater, Hubert Davis led the Tar Heels to their first outright ACC regular-season title since the 2016-17 campaign. He is UNC's first ACC Coach of the Year honoree since Roy Williams in 2011. The Tar Heels have racked up a 25-6 record, including a 17-3 mark in league play, and hold the No. 1 seed in the ACC Tournament this week. UNC's 17 ACC wins tied the ACC record for regular-season wins (Virginia was 17-1 in 2018-19).

Beekman became just the third player to earn back-toback Defensive Player of the Year honors since the award was instituted in 2005, joining Duke's Shelden Williams (2005-06) and North Carolina's John Henson (2011-12). He is the sixth Cavalier to win the award in the last 10 seasons. A senior from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Beekman ranks second in the ACC in steals (66 total, 2.13 per game) while leading the ACC's top-ranked scoring defense at 59.1 points per game. Also named a Second-Team All-ACC honoree, he averaged 14.3 points per game (14th in ACC) and a leagueleading 6.0 assists per game.

The first member of the Fighting Irish to earn ACC Rookie of the Year, Burton has scored a Notre Dame freshman record 535 points this season, averaging 17.3 points per game, which is sixth overall in the ACC and third nationally among all freshmen. He also is averaging 4.3 assists per game, which ranks sixth in the ACC, and 2.0 assists per game, which is fourth in the ACC. The Mishawaka, Indiana, native Burton could potentially become the first player in program history to finish a season averaging at

least 17.0 points, 4.0 assists and 2.0 steals per game and currently is the only freshman in the nation to boast those averages.

Schieffelin has been a key part of Clemson's strong season, averaging 9.7 points and 9.6 rebounds per game. The junior Georgia, from Loganville, currently ranks third in the ACC in rebounding. He has more than doubled his rebounding totals from a year ago, when averaged 4.1 boards per game and has raised his scoring from 5.5 points per game as a sophomore. He also has become one of the Tigers' top threats from 3-point range, shooting 19-of-36 (52.8%). He hit on 33.3 percent of his attempts last season.

Leggett is the second straight Panther to earn the nod as ACC Sixth Man of the Year, joining Nike Sibande in 2023. The junior from Prince George's County, Maryland, has averaged 11.9 points, 5.5 rebounds and 2.1 assists per game this season. He leads the Panthers in rebounding and steals (36), while ranking third in scoring and assists. He has scored in double figures 22 times, including 11 of the past 14 games off the bench.

The All-ACC first, second and third teams showed incredible balance, with 12 schools representing the 15 players selected. North Carolina (3) and Duke (2) were the only schools to have multiple players on the teams.

A grey squirrel jumped onto a beech snag in front of us and he told me to take the shot. I had a Model 37 as well, but mine was a Winchester single barrel .410. (Boy, do I wish I still had that gun) I looked up and saw the squirrel scramble out on a limb over our head. "Shoot at this head," Dad said. I did and the rest is history.

Get ready for another discussion/sermon that could have you arguing, fighting, or hopefully just having a good dialog around the water cooler at work, the barber shop, or maybe the counter at your local gun shop. How old should kids be to start taking them hunting? We don't seem to have much controversy about when we start them fishing, and that's OK, as we don't usually deal with firearms in the fishing world. Firearms safety is a big part of when we will actually let a youngster carry a gun in the field.

Most of us in the boomer age group didn't even think about

this when we started down the hunting trail. We went with Dad or Grandad or Uncle Bill every time they allowed us to join them. First, Toyota introduced a new body style in the NASCAR Cup Series this season. Second, NASCAR debuted a new shorttrack competition package in Sunday's race. Third, the Toyotas unloaded for Friday's 50-minute practice with consistent speed—allowing them to test their long-run prowess.

That combination of factors conjured up a decisive victory for Bell at a track where Toyota drivers had led a total of 15 laps in four Next-Gen-era races for fuel and tires on Lap 272, combined.


Well-meaning, but Misguided


